





School Sets Bond Election May 29

Report On City Dump Ground Work

Modern society with all its ecological and many pollution hang-ups causes a lot of changes in our so-called every day lives. One of the oldest landmarks to be found in any city, and our city is no exception, is the area commonly known as "the City Dump." 1972 terminology calls it the municiple sanitary landfill. But a quick inspection of ours will explain why it is still called the

city dump.

There is no argument against almost anything anyone says about it. There is no argument that many improvements need to be made. There are prescribed corrections that are being accomplished at the present and others will surely

These changes are going to necessitate many alterations to the way the area is supervised and what can be hauled there for disposal. The city has been officially notified by the Texas State Health Department to fence the area and lock the gate when there is no attendant on duty. The fence is nearly complete and, as soon as it is, the regulation will be in effect. This is going to cause considerable inconvenience and much unhappiness by those who go all the way out there only to find

it locked. A stringent effort is going to be made to stop those who are in the habit of dumping their trash and garbage in the ditch or road near the designated area. The city is presently spending a great deal of money keeping the road open to traftruckload has been dumped in the roadway itself. We are sure this was someone from another

area, not from Abernathy.

Currently the area is undergoing somewhat of a face lifting, and to use the term loosely, beautification. At least as much as possible is being bur-ied and rearranged so that it looks at least a little less unpleasant.

Some changes that will be instituted very shortly will be: No more car bodies, tractors, refrigerators, stoves or any other large objects will be accepted. No more huge pieces of broken concrete. No more trees. In fact, about what will be accepted is anything one would normally put in his trash barrel. One notable exception to this would be grass and shrub clippings and tree limbs small enough to be lifted and moved by one man. The reason for this drastic change is that everything accepted must be buried and it would be impossible to bury these large objects. The job is almost impossible for the City as it will be under these

vastly changed rules. The question arises immediately. "What is to be done with these large objects that obviously must go some-where?" The City's answer must be that, unfortunately, they do not have an answer. They have a pile out there now that is going to be an overwhelming problem for them to

About half of the lower portion of the area has been cleared and will be used for burying. The area looks large but it will be used up all too soon and then another area suitable and acceptable to about five state and federal agencies will have to be located. This will be most difficult for the restrictions are many and hard to

All city officials are constantly aware of this tremendous problem facing them. Efforts have been made to cope with the situation and to correct those that are within the realm of possibility. Currently much trash and

garbage is being hauled to the

dump from surrounding com-

munities. There is no way to allow this to continue. A fee could be charged to help defray the expense. But this would not solve the problem. The real problem is what to do with it after it is deposited on the pile. The City respectfully requests that all parties concern-

ed cooperate with the new reg-ulations and restrictions. This is not something they have decided. It is going to increase their work load and supervision costs. Another old land-mark

Your editor visited Dr. Webb, Superintendent, and asked him to state and answer the most pertinent questions that had been raised regarding

the proposed issue.

How long an issue will this
be? ANSWER: Twelve years (Ed. the average issue for school

buildings is 20 years.) Will a tax increase be necessary? ANSWER: If the bonds were sold today, No; should the bond market go up before the bonds are sold the rate might be increased two or three cents, but this would be only for a four

year period. Does this mean that school taxes will not be increased in future years? ANSWER: No, we can only forecast operational cost one year at a time; it does mean that rates would not be increased unless minimally, to pay for school buildings. As stated previously, this being en-tirely dependent upon the bond

market. Will \$750,000 do everything that needs to be done? ANSWER: Dut It WIII major portion of the existing

academic needs. Why is an underground school being considered? AN-SWER: The learning environment would be as efficient and as effective as a building on ground level. The climate of the building would be more easily controlled. It would serve as a shelter during school hours for all of our students and for the community when it is needed during tornado season. An underground school would be less subject to vandalism and would carry much lower insur-

Would the purchase of additional land be necessary? AN-SWER: No, it would be built on the present school grounds.

Are we out of classrooms? ANSWER: Yes, all available classrooms are being utilized and we are also using some of the libraries for classrooms. Has school enrollment in-creased? A NSWER: No, the total

enrollment grades 1-12 has not

increased. If you include the 75

students in kindergarten, then, we have increased. What grades do you anticipate will be in the new building? ANSWER: Grades 6-7-8 in the classroom part. Grades 4-5 would then go to the present Junior High. The library Academic Center would be used by all students, more extensively

by grades 9-12.

When would the building program be completed? ANSWER: We would hope that construction would start this fall and be completed in 1973. Where can a person get answers in case they have addi-tional questions? ANSWER:

From any school administrator or Board Member. Will new courses be added to the curriculum? ANSWER: Yes. it is anticipated that a number of new courses will be added, many of these on an individual basis.

Any final questions or comments? ANSWER: I would like to thank the Review for its support of the school system and urge all voters to vote for better educational opportunities and facilities on May 29th.



School Sets Bond Election May 29

Report On City Dump Ground Work

Modern society with all its ecological and many pollution hang-ups causes a lot of changes in our so-called every day lives. One of the oldest landmarks to be found in any city, and our city is no exception, is the area commonly known as "the City Dump."

1972 terminology calls it the municiple sanitary landfill. But a quick inspection of ours will explain why it is still called the

city dump.

There is no argument against almost anything anyone says about it. There is no argument that many improvements need to be made. There are prescribed corrections that are being accomplished at the present and others will surely

These changes are going to necessitate many alterations to the way the area is supervised and what can be hauled there for disposal. The city has been officially notified by the Texas State Health Department to fence the area and lock the gate when there is no attendant on duty. The fence is nearly complete and, as soon as it is, the regulation will be in effect. This is going to cause considerable inconvenience and much unhappiness by those who go all

the way out there only to find it locked. A stringent effort is going to be made to stop those who are in the habit of dumping their trash and garbage in the ditch or road near the designated area. The city is presently spending a great deal of money keeping the road open to traffic. Several times an entire the roadway itself. We are sure this was someone from another

area, not from Abernathy. Currently the area is undergoing somewhat of a face lifting, and to use the term loosely, beautification. At least as much as possible is being buried and rearranged so that it looks at least a little less unpleasant.

Some changes that will be instituted very shortly will be: No more car bodies, tractors, refrigerators, stoves or any other large objects will be accepted. No more huge pieces of broken concrete. No more trees. In fact, about what will be accepted is anything one would normally put in his trash barrel. One notable exception to this would be grass and shrub clippings and tree limbs small enough to be lifted and moved by one man. The reason for this drastic change is that everything accepted must be buried and it would be impossible to bury these large objects. The job is almost impossible for the City as it will be under these vastly changed rules.

The question arises immediately. "What is to be done with these large objects that obviously must go some-where?" The City's answer must be that, unfortunately, they do not have an answer. They have a pile out there now that is going to be an over-whelming problem for them to

About half of the lower portion of the area has been cleared and will be used for burying. The area looks large but it will be used up all too soon and then another area suitable and acceptable to about five state and federal agencies will have to be located. This will be most difficult for the restrictions are many and hard to

All city officials are constantly aware of this tremendous problem facing them. Efforts have been made to cope with the situation and to correct those that are within the realm of possibility.

Currently much trash and garbage is being hauled to the dump from surrounding communities. There is no way to allow this to continue. A fee could be charged to help defray the expense. But this would not solve the problem. The real problem is what to do with it after it is deposited on the pile.

The City respectfully requests that all parties concerned cooperate with the new reg-ulations and restrictions. This is not something they have decided. It is going to increase their work load and supervision costs. Another old land-mark

Following is a question and answer interview, providing voters further information on

the bond election: The Abernathy Weekly Review has always supported the local schools and the Board of Education in providing programs and facilities in maintaining the fine educational system we have. The Review will continue its support by endorsing and asking for passage of the \$750,000 bond issue. May 29th. Your editor visited Dr. Webb, Superintendent, and asked him to state and answer the most pertinent questions that had been raised regarding the proposed issue.

How long an issue will this be? ANSWER: Twelve years (Ed. the average issue for school

buildings is 20 years.) Will a tax increase be necessary? ANSWER: If the bonds were sold today, No; should the bond market go up before the bonds are sold the rate might be increased two or three cents, but this would be only for a four

Does this mean that school taxes will not be increased in future years? ANSWER: No. we can only forecast operational cost one year at a time; it does mean that rates would not be increased unless minimally, to pay for school buildings. As stated previously, this being entirely dependent upon the bond

Will \$750,000 do everything that needs to be done? ANSWER: No, but it will take care of a major portion of the academic needs.

Why is an underground school being considered? AN-SWER: The learning environment would be as efficient and as effective as a building on ground level. The climate of the building would be more easily controlled. It would serve as a shelter during school hours for all of our students and for the community when it is needed during tornado season. An underground school would be less subject to vandalism and would carry much lower insurance rates.

Would the purchase of additional land be necessary? AN-SWER: No, it would be built on the present school grounds.

Are we out of classrooms? ANSWER: Yes, all available classrooms are being utilized and we are also using some of the libraries for classrooms. Has school enrollment in-

creased? A NSWER: No, the total

enrollment grades 1-12 has not

increased. If you include the 75

students in kindergarten, then, we have increased. What grades do you anticipate will be in the new building? ANSWER: Grades 6-7-8 in the classroom part. Grades 4-5 would then go to the present Junior High. The library Academic Center would be used by all students, more extensively

by grades 9-12. When would the building program be completed? AN-SWER: We would hope that construction would start this fall and be completed in 1973.

Where can a person get answers in case they have additional questions? ANSWER: From any school administrator or Board Member. Will new courses be added to

the curriculum? ANSWER: Yes. it is anticipated that a number many of these on an individual

Any final questions or comments? ANSWER: I would like to thank the Review for its sup-port of the school system and urge all voters to vote for better educational opportunities and facilities on May 29th.



Deadline For School Transfer

AUSTIN--Parents who wish to transfer children from their home school to a nearby district for the 1972-73 academic year must submit their requests to the receiving school district by June 1, 1972, according to an announcement from the

Texas Education Agency.
Once approved by the receiving school board of trustees, the request must then be cleared by the Texas Education Agency. This state approval is a requirement of the order is-sued by the U.S. District Court in Tyler.

The order, related to the desegregation of schools in Texas, states in part that the Texas Education Agency "shall not permit, make arrangements for or give support of any kind to student transfers, between school districts, when the cumulative effect in either the sending or receiving school or school districts will be to reduce or impede desegregation, or to reinforce, renew, or encourage the continuation of acts and practices resulting in students on the grounds of race, color, or national origin."
Only hardship cases will be

considered for transfer approval after June I, according to Leon R. Graham, Texas Education Agency assistant com-missioner for administration. Any late application must state specifically the exact nature of the hardship and why the application was not filed with the receiving school by the June I

We expect to approve few late transfer requests and those must definitely be hardship cases," Graham added.


