

ter said, "It is a once in a life time offer as TSTI is one of an opportunity that couldn't be turned down." Currently there are about 900 students enrolled in 33 voca-



Mr. Thompson became a cooperator with the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District in 1957. In 1966 he entered into a Great Plains Conservation program contract on the 693 acre farm which he owns. With the assistance of the Great Plains Conservation program, he converted 350 acres of dry cropland into pastureland, thirty-five acres of land leveling, shaped and established a three-acre waterway to grass, and installed 1200 feet of underground irrigation pipe, making a total of 7994 feet of underground irrigation pipe installed on the farm. Mr. Thompson is carrying on an excellent cropping system seeding small grain seeding in his cotton in late August or September as the high residue crop needed to control wind erosic and add or -


