July Celebration

Action, interest and activities are beginning to characterize the upcoming July 1st festivities. The Country Garden Club will decorate the display window of the old Harp building, north of First State Bank. The Hobby Club will decorate the Teen Center display windows. The Sunshine Club and the City Garden Club are also planning floats and activities. Each display promises to be interesting and decorative, so watch for these window displays.

The steering committee met Friday morning, June 9, and the following additional events will be added to the program. It was voted to add an "Old Fiddlers Contest" to our program. Hale Center will not have an old fiddlers contest or a celebration of any type this year. The committee appointed Pete Thompson, Dan Ward, and Rudolph Struve to handle this event. Pete Thompson is chairman. This committee has already mailed 40 letters to old fiddlers from the Hale Center mailing list. This event will be conducted from about 11:00 to 3:00 while other activities are underway. The location will be under the trees between the jail and the water tower. There will be a bandstand and sound system. Incidentally, more chairs and tables will be placed under the trees this year than last year.

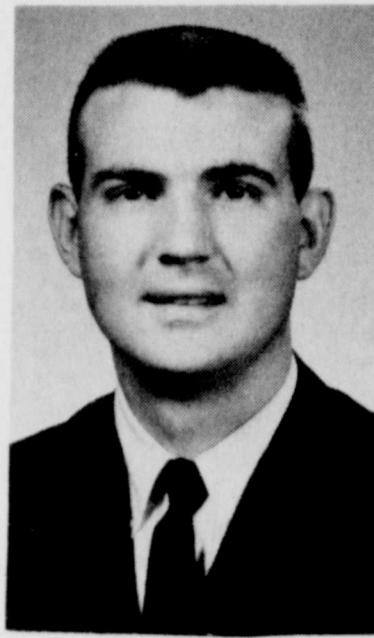

GEORGE REED DIES in DeLEON

DeLEON, Texas (Special)-George W. Reed, 77, died about 9 a.m. Friday at his home in DeLeon after suffering an apparent heart attack.

Funeral rites were held Saturday in a DeLeon funeral home chapel, with burial in the DeLeon Cemetery.

Mr. Reed was a former Abernathy resident and businessman. He and his wife operated the Nu-Vue Theatre and the Antelope Drive-In Theatre here for several years, before the advent of television killed the small-town movie business in this area.

A native of Comanche County, Reed is survived by his wife and three sisters, Mrs. Nannie Holloway of San Antonio, Mrs. Ruby Lee Moody of Abernathy and Mrs. Gladys Smith of Eastland.

From The Desk of the City Manager

Did you ever wonder what the world would be like without some of us in it? Very few are able to perform the miracle of pleasing everyone so it is not surprising that some of our finest and best providers are sometimes criticized while they are in the very act of helping.

Our fine Hale County Commissioner, Jack Eason, has been most generous in assisting us in the vital field of mosquito control. He has gone the second and third mile and we are most grateful to him. We will all be femis in our duty if we do not make a special effort to let him know how much he is appreciated.

This mosquito problem is not one that City personnel can solve alone. We will do the very best we can and will do all we can with the people and equipment that we have. We urgently solicit your help in getting it all done. Many of us have piles or boxes or sacks of grass clippings and other trash in our alleys that are breeding places for mosquitos. The City has an open truck in which they pick up this sort of thing on a "as time permits" basis. Usually this is Thursday and Friday of each week. But if an emergency pops up, as it often does, the trash hauling must wait. This means that sometimes we do not pick up any leaves, grass or tree and shrub limbs during a week.

The City dump will be open to receive this sort of trash seven days a week during most daylight hours. We urge all who can to help us help you keep our City as free as possible from disease-bearing mosquitos and other undesirable insects and pests.

We will continue as always to pick up with the packer truck on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. And we will get every bit of the other that is humanly possible to do. If it becomes apparent that we are not going to get to yours, please take it to the dump ground yourself if you have a pickup.

If your neighbor has a problem like this and does not have a pickup why not win yourself some "Brownie Points" and haul it off for them. Who knows, the mosquito you will have prevented might be the one that was an encephalitis carrier and had your name on its stinger. Seriously, we must practice the "Good Neighbor Policy" as it is meant to be if we are to accomplish our goal.

We will be spraying with the plane again Friday morning early if the weather permits. After that we will spray every 14 days if it stays dry and every ten days if it rains. We will be dusting at irregular intervals in between to keep breaking the cycle of reproduction on these pesky mosquitos.

We have received many compliments and a few complaints on the job we have been able to do to date on getting the mosquitos under control. Generally speaking it looks like we have been fairly successful. We will keep on keeping on. --Jim Davis

WINS IN STATE 4-H FOOD SHOW

COLLEGE STATION (Spl)--Kathe McClendon of Abernathy, 4-H'er who's a pro when it comes to competing in 4-H contests, has been named winner of a \$500 scholarship for her entry in the bread-cereal group at the 1972 State 4-H Food Show.

Miss McClendon, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne McClendon of Abernathy, was one of four top winners in the Food Show. The contest was a highlight of the 1972 Texas 4-H Roundup, which meets annually at Texas A&M University in College Station.

Scholarships were donated by ConAgra-Gladia Products, sponsor of the show.

Competing with 52 girls from across the state, the teenager was judged on her knowledge of nutrition and table setting, as well as taste of her food entry. She prepared yeast bread with an apricot filling.

During her nine-year career in the 4-H Club, she has attended the National 4-H Congress, given demonstrations at the State Fair of Texas, narrated the county dress revue, emceed the county food show, and been a Roundup clothing winner.

A senior at Abernathy High School, she serves as head cheerleader, all-district bas-

ketball team member and officer in Future Homemakers of America and drama club. She was also elected best all-around girl.

She plans to attend Texas Tech University and major in home economics.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING IS HELD

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on June 5, 1972, in the Board Room of the high school.

Minutes of the previous meeting held during the month were approved. The Board met in a called session on May 8th. At this meeting, the board interviewed and hired Mr. Bob Davis as financial advisor for the planned bond issue. On May 11, the board met in a called session for the purpose of holding a public meeting to discuss the proposed bond issue. May 15th was the date the board met in a called session for the purpose of issuing an order to hold a bond election. On May 16th, the board met for the purpose of interviewing and selecting an architect for the proposed building. The firm of Brasher-Goyette-Rapier was selected as building architects. The May 29th meeting of the board was to canvass the returns of the school bond election which carried 349-72.

After reviewing the previous meetings, the board studied the budget progress report; tax collection report which revealed 98.04% of the roll as having been collected; the final enrollment report which showed a loss of seven students during the month of May; the lunchroom report for the year shown an average of 710 students ate each day in the cafeteria.

In other action, the board approved the student transfers for the 1972-73 school year and made the following changes in personnel: Mr. Gid Adkisson from Bilingual to Director of Special Education; Mr. Wendell Jones from Evaluator of Bilingual education to one half time director - one half time evaluator of Bilingual Education. Also employed Mr. Harry Mathis, a graduate of Abernathy High School and Eastern New Mexico, as a coach and teacher on the Junior High Level.

Those in attendance of this meeting were: L. J. West, President; Billie Harrison, Vice-president; Joe Lovelace, Secretary; Lon Carmickle; Joe Oswald; David Pinson; Bob Riley; Earl Carter, Business Manager; and Dr. Delwin Webb, Superintendent.

The next regular session of the Board will be July 3, 1972, in the board room of the high school. The next called session will be June 19, at 8:00 p.m. for the purpose of selling bonds to finance the proposed building project.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING REPORT

The Abemathy City Council met in regular session Monday night with all members of the council and the mayor present. Mr. Bill Ridenour, a General Telephone Co. representative from Falls, was present to hear some complaints about the phone service that had been received. An early attempt will be made to correct as many of the problems as possible.

Mosquito control was discussed at length and it was decided to use Stephens-Teaff Aerial Spraying Service to spray the City with their plane as needed during the summer months. The City will dust with their equipment between sprayings to keep the control as tight as possible. In view of the recent heavy rains citizens are urged to do all they can to assist in the elimination of places where mosquitos can harbor and hatch.

The City Dump operation, which seems to be a source of concern to many citizens, was reviewed at great length. A few points that apparently need to be cleared is that tree trimmings and limbs as well as grass clippings can be taken to the dump. Also farmers who are residents of this trade territory are welcome as they always have been to bring their trash to the dump. The upper part of the area is open to receive material every day as it always has been. The problem of understanding what can and cannot be done there seems to stem from the fact that we are sup-

posed to be operating a sanitary landfill, but most of us still expect and want it to be the Area Dump Ground.

Street seal coating will get underway during July. Ample notice will be given so that citizens can park their cars off the street where they will not get splattered with the asphalt.

Abandoned cars have been accumulated at the city yard at 12th and N Street where they will be picked up by a salvage crew within the next few days. Over 200 such vehicles have already been removed from the area and there are still a lot to go. But much progress has been made and the Council is most appreciative of the fine cooperation that continues to be given to the project. It will be completed as soon as possible so that any inconvenience caused will be kept to a minimum.

Preliminary budget figures were discussed and budget work will continue for the next 60 days so that it can be approved at the August Council meeting.

Charles Feagley has been employed as a City Patrolman and was introduced to the mayor and council. He asked for assistance in locating a two bedroom home that he could rent. Anyone who has one or knows of one can please call City Hall.

Several intersection street lights were authorized as well as some stop and yield signs at several intersections. These will be installed as time allows.

RAINS AID TO ROW CROPS IN LOCAL AREA

Rain started in this area Saturday afternoon riding an 80-mile-an-hour wind that snapped some power line poles and blew small buildings away from their sites. The high velocity wind lasted only a few minutes and the damage was comparatively light. Farmers in some areas west and northwest had some hail but did not do serious damage to young cotton and grain crops.

Mrs. Vera Hawkins, taking over M. O. Hood's weather checking while he is out of town, reported a total of 2.65 inches of rainfall in town to early Monday night. Rains also came on Tuesday after this measurement report.

The moisture boosts grain and cotton growth; however, some farmers reported fields "washing" from the prolonged rainfall.

Men Save Swimmer

A 23-year-old Abemathy youth was rescued from a swimming pool at College Inn, 1001 University Ave., Lubbock, about 5:45 p. m. Wednesday, June 7, by swimmers and other persons who became concerned when he disappeared under the water and failed to surface. He is Andre J. Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Anderson of Abemathy. His father told The Review that Andre suffers from seizures which first began while he was on active duty in the U. S. Navy. Andre's mother was visiting relatives in Fort Worth when the accident happened.

Andre was not breathing when pulled from the pool, according to one of his rescuers, David Brown, 33, a College Inn resident. Anderson was taken to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, where he was revived.

Francis then walked to the pool, looked in and saw Anderson's inert form under the water, investigators were told. Francis jumped fully clothed into the pool and, in coordination with Brown, pulled Anderson to safety, it was reported.

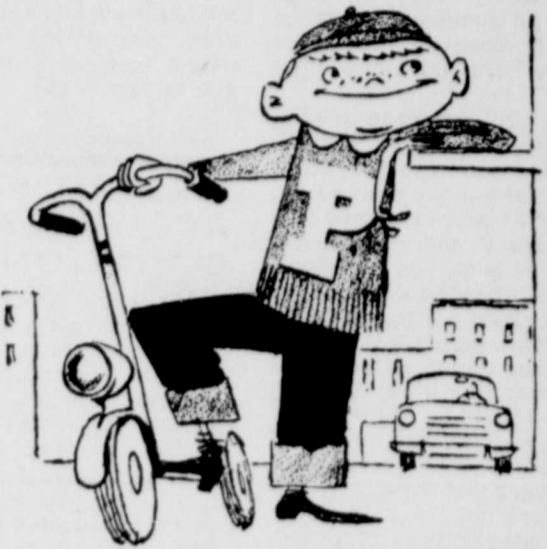

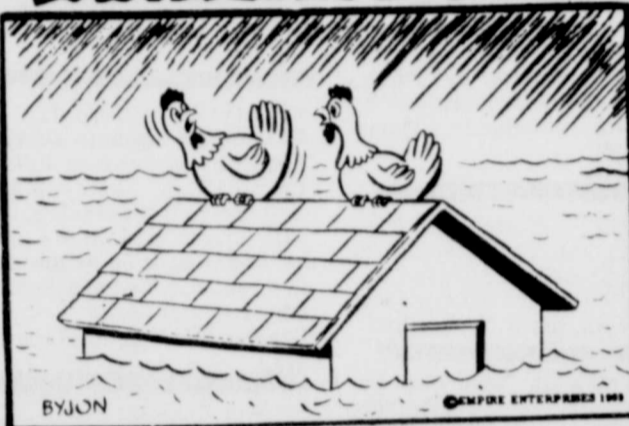
