

remiss in our duty if we do not make a special effort to let him know how much he is appreciated.

This mosquito problem is not one that City personnel can solve alone. We will do the very best we can and will do all we can with the people and equipment that we have. We urgently solicit your help in getting it all done. Many of us have piles or boxes or sacks of grass clippings and other trash in our alleys that are breeding places for mosquitos. The City has an open truck in which they pick up this sort of thing on a "as time permits" basis. Usually this is Thursday and Friday of each week. But if an emergency pops up, as it often does, the trash hauling must wait. This means that sometimes we do

not pick up any leaves, grass or tree and shrub limbs during a week.

The City dump will be open to receive this sort of trash seven days a week during most daylighthours. We urge all who can to help us help you keep our City as free as possible from disease-bearing mosquitos and other undesirable insects and pests. We will continue as always to pick up with the packer truck on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. And we will get every bit of the other that is humanly possible to do. If it becomes apparent that we are not going to get to yours, please take it to the dump ground yourself if you have a pickup.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING REPORT

The Abernathy City Council met in regular session Monday night with all members of the council and the mayor present. Mr. Bill Ridenour, a General

Telephone Co, representative from Ralls, was present to hear some complaints about the phone service that had been received. An early attempt will be made to correct as many of the problems as possible.

Mosquito control was discussed at length and it was decided to use Stephens - Teaff Aerial Spraying Service to spray the City with their plane as needed during the summer months. The City will dust with their equipment between sprayings to keep the control as tight as possible. In view of the recent heavy rains citizens are urged to do all they can to assist in the elimination of places where mosquitos can harbor and hatch.

The City Dump operation, which seems to be a source of concern to many citizens, was reviewed at great length. A few points that apparently need to be cleared is that tree trim. mings and limbs as well as grass clippings can be taken to the dump. Also farmers who are residents of this trade territory are welcome as they always

have been to bring their trash to the dump. The upper part of the area is open to receive material every day as it always has been. The problem of understanding what can and cannot be done there seems to stem

from the fact that we are sup-

posed to be operating a sanitary landfill, but most of us still expect and want it to be the Area Dump Ground.

Street seal coating will get underway during July. Ample notice will be given so that citizens can park their cars off the street where they will not get splattered with the ambalt get splattered with the asphalt. Abandoned cars have been

accumulated at the city yard at 12th and N Street where they will be picked up by a salvage crew within the next few days. Over 200 such vehicles have already been removed from the grain crops area and there are still a lot to go. But much progress has been made and the Council is most appreciative of the fine cooperation that continues to be given to the project. It will be completed as soon as possible so that any inconvenience measurement report. caused will be kept to a mini-

Men Save Swimmer

A 23 - year - old Abernathy youth was rescued from a swimming pool at College Inn, 1001 University Ave., Lubbock, about 5:45 p.m. Wednesday, June 7, by swimmers and other persons who became concerned when he disappeared under the water and failed to surface. He is Andre J. Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Anderson of Abernathy. His father told The Review that Andre suffers from seizures which first began while he was on active duty in the U.S. Navy. Andre's mother was visiting relatives in Fort Worth when the accident happened.

Andre was not breathing when pulled from the pool, according to one of his rescuers, David Brown, 33, a College Inn resident. Anderson was taken to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, where he was revived. He later was admitted to the

hospital's intensive care unit. Hospital officials termed his condition "serious" late Wednesday night after the accident. Currently, his condition is improving, reports said.
