From The Desk of the City Manager

Someone has said "These are the days that try men's souls." I am sure the guy who said it lived on a dirt street in a city like ours when they were getting a lot of rain. We are sure that everyone has a valid reason for not getting theirs paved but it would be wonderful if they could, I am sure that our police, the postman, the nice folks who deliver our papers, and any others would sure appreciate it if the paving could be done. Maybe some day they will. We will do everything possible to hasten that day.

We are so fortunate to have as many paved streets with curbs and gutters as we now have. There is not a city anywhere in the area that has as high a percentage of paving as we do so we should all be grateful to the far-sighted, generous people who cared enough to provide us with this luxury. We do not really appreciate them until we hit a chug-hole about yea deep or slip off into a deep rut when it is muddy.

One of the big reasons we are insisting that old abandoned cars be moved is because the asphalt paving dries and cracks and comes up when the old car is left there too long. This means an unsightly patch at best in the area and more than likely an unsatisfactory repatch job from time to time from now on. These streets cost you too much at the start and certainly too much tax money to maintain for you to allow them to deteriorate any faster than normal. Certainly we do not wish to contribute to their early demise.

We spend about \$20,000 a year maintaining and cleaning the streets. If there are cars parked permanently in front of your property then you fail to get your share of cleaning for which you are paying. The sweeper must pull out and then back so time is lost and the cost is higher than it would have been if he could have swept straight through. Get your share of the service and make your paving last longer. If you have an old, out-of-service car in front of your place we will haul it away with your permission. This will make you, your neighbors and certainly all the city people happy.

The streets of our city are one of our finest assets and we should make every effort to make them last as long as possible. --Jim Davis.

AG ENGINEER AND FAMILY MOVE HERE

LUBBOCK -- Dr. James A. Friesen, a USDA agricultural engineer from Mississippi, will start research work on the South Plains, according to Dr. George McBee, resident director of research at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock.

Friesen will be working in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in developing farm machinery for cotton production on the High Plains and other related activities. The scientist has recently worked with the Agricultural Research Service in the South, after receiving his PhD. from Mississippi State University. He received BS and MS degrees from Oklahoma State University. McBee says that Friesen will work in developing harvesting and handling equipment for narrow row, short season, or short growing cotton in irrigated and dryland conditions. He will also work with planting patterns and irrigation practices, as well as conduct cooperative research with the South Plains Cotton Ginning Research Laboratory in the areas of harvesting, field cleaning and material handling.

Dr. Friesen will be working with the cotton mechanization engineers here at Lubbock to solve agricultural machinery problems on the South Plains. The new scientist and his wife have three children. The family resides in Abernathy in an apartment. Later, they will move to their new home in the Phillips Addition, north of the Lewis Lutrick home.

The Friesen children are: Tony, 11, in the 7th grade; Cindy, 9, in the 4th grade; and Holly, 14 months old.

MIKE RITCHEY GOING TO HARVARD

Out of approximately one thousand applicants to the Nieman Foundation for Journalism at Harvard University, thirty were chosen by the selection committee to be interviewed in Washington, D.C., by six of the top newspaper editors of the country.

Mike Ritchey of the newsroom to station KERA, Channel 13, in Dallas, was one of the applicants. He was also one of thirty selected to be interviewed. Mike said he left Washington a little apprehensive lest he hadn't done too well in the interview. However, three days later he received a special delivery letter informing him that he was to be one of the twelve Nieman Fellows for 1972 and 1973. Mike wrote the text was a difficult one. Namely: 1) two, one-thousand word statements. The first about his experience and future plans. The second, what he planned to do for nine months at Harvard to improve and enhance his journalistic capabilities. 2) Twelve or fifteen stories he had done.
