The Christian Community of St. Isidore Church here in Abernathy has been making plans and preparations for their annual summer festival. The event is scheduled for this Sunday, July 16, at the church grounds on the south edge of town. Co-Chairmen for the day are Eduardo Barrera, Manuel Trevino and Tercezo Luera.

Parish Council President Jose Ramos announced that festivities will begin around noon, with barbecue and Mexican dinners being served from the snack bar, and hamburgers, corn dogs and pickles from outdoor stands. There will also be ice cream bars, popcicles, lemonade and cup cakes.

Included in the fun and games will be the popular dunking tank. This is expected to make a big splash because the dunking dummy volunteers include some "BMOC" (big men of the church). The Little Store will be a good place to get hand sewn aprons, pot holders and other gift items.

This is the traditional Spanish name for the carnival-like fiesta. It is pronounced "Ha-my-ka", and it always sounds like the exclamation point belongs with the word. UNITED MONDAY FOR VETERAN OF VIETNAM WAR

Funeral rites for Specialist 4/Class David Hernandez, 22, were held at 10 a. m. Monday in St. Isidore's Catholic Church in Abernathy. A veteran of the war in Vietnam, Hernandez died July 7, at the base hospital at Fort Hood, Texas, where he was stationed. Officiating at rites here was the Rev. Father Clifton Corcoran, pastor of the Church. Burial, with Military Rites, was in Abernathy Cemetery under direction of Chambers Funeral Home.

David was a native of Abernathy, and was a graduate of Abernathy High School. He served in Vietnam a total of eighteen months on two separate tours of duty. After a furlough here, David was assigned to Fort Hood in April.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hernandez; three brothers, Manuel, George and Ancull, all of Abernathy.

My brothers and my sisters in Christ:

For those who never really had the great opportunity of knowing David well, we would like to speak for a moment about David.

We are all united now in grief and sadness over the sudden loss of David. We share with his family the tremendous loss from our lives. The whole world seems black and hope seems gone to us now. But remembering David, those of us who knew him can find our hope through the faith that he lived. He lived his faith in Christ, not just by words, but by how he loved—and he loved with his whole being. We have all witnessed his love and concern for his parents. He was a good and considerate son and he shared his trials and joys. For his brothers he gave love, counsel and help. Whenever they were in need they always knew David was with them. He loved his family with his whole heart, as God has asked us to.

But David's concern and kindness did not limit itself to his family. He shared his love with the people he met. To all of his countless friends, David offered love and understanding. He respected the great value of each person, and for this he was respected in return. For my part, David has left his mark on my life by his love, concern and just being my friend.

Our loss of this young man is a great one. But if we really know David, we know he practiced his faith through love and hope in others. For those of us left, we have our love of David which will never die. Love is not like the body which goes to nothing, but like the sun which rises each day and warms all those it meets.

For us, David is a challenge to love and to hope, not in pretty words but in a real, open and Christian way. For only when they will know you are mine, said the Lord, "that you love one another." Our love will not die, nor will our hope. O Lord I bow before Your will. There is only one request I have of You this day—Please, dear Lord, Make it easier to bear. We will remember David with love, and our love and hope will not die.

TOP FLOAT IS DESCRIBED

(Editor's Note: Granting our request, Mrs. John Kveton prepared the following description of the float entered in the July 1st parade here by St. Isidore's Catholic Church of Abernathy. It was judged the "Most Outstanding Float" in the parade. Our thanks to Mrs. Kveton.)

Winner of the "Most Outstanding Float" award in the July 1st Celebration parade here was the entry by St. Isidore Church.

Tying in the theme of the presentation with the birthday celebration of the United States, the float depicted the gift of self that people bring to their country. Peoples of many national origins contribute their various cultural heritages and their talents, skills and service.

To present this theme, the float featured a large box—gift wrapped in white, tied with red ribbon, and lettered in blue with "Happy Birthday, U.S.A." on the ends, and the words "work", "skills", "talent", "service", "religion", and "cultural heritage" on the sides. The people and other displays on the float depicted the various types of service in agriculture, industry, defense, religion, medicine, business, the service industries and the arts.

Mr. Agapito (Pete) Olivas, an agricultural worker in this community for more than half a century, was shown with his irrigation shovel and wearing the "uniform" of his trade. Still employed, Mr. Olivas first came to this area to work in 1919, and moved here permanently in 1924.

Mrs. Olivas (Mary), in familiar house dress and apron, held a large tray of tamales to represent the Mexican cuisine. Maria Ramos, with palette and easel, showed one facet of the arts. Danny Barrera, with guitar, represented the musical contributions. Jose Angel Ramos, Jr., dressed in military uniform and holding the American flag, depicted the contribution to defense of our country. For the religious heritage, Rev. Clifton Corcoran, pastor of St. Isidore's, was seated beside a table with a bible display. A welder's mask was displayed to represent industrial workers. Rosa Cardenas, in white uniform, could represent medicine, as a nurse, or the service industries, as a hairdresser. Carmen Lopez was shown doing hand sewing and embroidery, a well-known and treasured home art, also grown into business. Last—and probably most important to the growth, development, and strength of the agricultural economy of this area—was the representation of the seasonal field worker. Yolanda Garcia, in straw hat and work-wear, attacked a transplanted seed with her hoe. The message (which might well be contemplated by everyone in this farm-supported area) could be:

"Where would this country be without the workers who make our agricultural industry possible?"

An arch across the back of the float was decorated with bright paper flowers and held the words "OUR GIFT TO YOU" in letters of gold glitter. Because the parish family of St. Isidore's is comprised mainly of people with Mexican national origin, the accent was on their contributions and cultural heritage. It was for this reason that the sides of the float were decorated in colors of red, white, and green—the colors of the Mexican flag. Overlapping gathered tiers of crepe paper skirted the entire float. "SAINT ISIDORE CHURCH" was lettered in gold glitter along the sides. The floor of the float was covered with artificial grass. The red, white and blue of the United States was seen on the gift box and on the American flag carried by the service man.

The theme and arrangement of the float was worked out by several members of the church. Mrs. Ted Hill headed the committee that was responsible for this project as part of St. Isidore's participation in the community celebration.

Among teachers taking the course is Clifton W. Martin, CVAE instructor in Abernathy High School.

School patrons had an opportunity to see what fine work Mr. Martin and his students are doing during the School Open House held here earlier this year.

UNITED HELD FOR JACK F. LEE, 46

Last rites for Jack Fletcher Lee, 46, of 3405 Nabaska, Amarillo, formerly of Abernathy, who died Saturday of an apparent heart attack, were held at 2 p. m. Monday at Boxwell Brothers Ivy Chapel, in Amarillo.

The Rev. Jack Riley, pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church in Amarillo, officiated. Burial was in Amarillo's Liano Cemetery.

Lee, who was a farmer here, moved to Amarillo about seven years ago. He was a member of Abernathy First Methodist Church.

Lee was a graduate of Abernathy High School and was a veteran of World War II.

Among the survivors are his wife, the former Nita Beth Lutrick; two daughters; one son; his father, Pete Lee; two brothers, two sisters and two grandchildren.

NO INCREASE SET BY CITY FOR TAX AND UTILITY RATES

The City Council met for the regular July session. The main item of discussion was the 1972-73 budget which is currently being prepared. The date for the public hearing on the budget was set for 4:00 p. m. Monday, July 31. The overall budget as indicated in the preliminary figures will be only slightly higher than the current costs.

Revenue from taxable property will be increased considerably for next year since approximately \$750,000 worth of property has been added to the tax rolls. This plus the good collections for this year which reached 98% for the first time ever and the concentrated campaign which has resulted in past due taxes being paid at a record rate makes it possible to meet rising costs and inflation with no tax or utility rate increases.

The Civil Defense alarm system received extensive damage from recent electrical storms and is currently being repaired. Further improvements are planned later and funds will be provided in the new budget. The Council praised the Storm Watchers who have been so faithful recently in keeping our City alerted during the bad weather.

Sales tax in the amount of \$7,023.12 was received recently for the months of January, February and March 1972. This compares to \$5,782.69 for the same period last year.

The mosquito control program was discussed and general satisfaction with results were expressed. The plan is to dust on Thursdays and spray every other Friday, weather permitting, of course.

General Telephone Company announced an increase for installing, moving and changing telephones. This is not controlled by the City Council but by Texas General Exchange Tariff, so the City was not given any advance notification. In fact, the increase is effective June 30, and already in effect.

Rates now used: Install business main line, \$22.50; install business extension, \$12.50; inside more business, \$12.50; Change business telephone, \$12.50; install residence main line, \$15; install residence extension, \$10; inside more residence, \$10; and Change residence telephone, \$10.

This does not affect local rates, just installations and moves.

Wired mowing and other municipal services were discussed. The City Manager said that all possible was being done with the men and equipment available. But the City is just not geared or equipped to cope with the current conditions. Citizens are urged to mow their vacant lots and clear their alleys wherever possible. Also it was noted that there are many, many huge piles of loose grass and weeds in alleys around town. These are great places for mosquitos to hatch. Citizens are urged to assist in any way possible to get these cleaned up and hauled away. The dump is open seven days a week during all daylight hours.

The need for water and sewer lines in some sections of the City which do not have these needed facilities at this time was discussed. The City Manager was instructed to get the information needed for further action.

In the future, mobile home owners will be required to file a certificate of occupancy with City Hall before parking their trailer in a semi-permanent location inside the City.

Other routine matters and business was transacted.

Celebration Draws Crowd

Abernathy and the surrounding area took a break Saturday, July 1, to honor this nation's 196th birthday and name the area's outstanding settler, Robert Lutrick, 86, who was recognized as this area's longest pioneer resident in ceremonies after the patriotic parade.

Floats, bicycles, farm implements, Klava Go-Karts, the Abernathy High School Band, riding clubs and pioneers who have lived in the area for more than 60 years were featured in the parade.

Named Most Outstanding Float was St. Isidore's Catholic Church. The Abernathy Classroom Teachers Association's "Hee-Haw" float was presented the Most Unusual Award. Other trophies handed out were to riding clubs of Cotton Center, junior division; and New Deal, senior division.

Mrs. Hoppy Toler recognized Lutrick, who moved to Hale County and Abernathy in 1892, at flag raising ceremonies in front of City Hall. "He is a former cowboy... and has made himself available to do just about any kind of work... from being on the school board, to digging telephone poles for the first telephone line." Mrs. Toler said of Lutrick. "He has survived a dugout cave-in and the doctoring of our early day medicine men. He has overcome blizzards, dust storms, rattlesnakes and sharp tongues," she added.

Lutrick wiped tears from his eyes as he waved his hat to the applauding crowd.

A Boy and Girl Scout color-guard participated in the flag raising ceremony. David Pinson, local pharmacist, gave a patriotic address and Chamber of Commerce President Jim Bob Smith welcomed those in attendance.

Bicycle races provided fun and excitement for the kids, followed by a pie and cake auction. Several persons got a 'splash' out of the day's events by being targets on the Lions Club dunking board.

After a barbecue lunch, served by the Abernathy Fire Department, there was some so-called "fiddlin' around" at the Old Fiddlers Contest. Raymond Brown of McAdoost took top honors at the event and received \$75 of the \$250 total prize winnings.

Leo and Bonnie Workman, the husband-wife team from Aspermont, gained second and third place in the contest. Mrs. Workman won second and \$55, and her husband won third, \$40, for a total of \$95 in prize money.

Local talent, Emmett Scroggins won fourth and \$30. Henry and Sherry Lester, brothers from Lubbock, took fifth and sixth place honors respectively, for \$20 and \$15. Jim Lewis of Sudan won seventh place in the Old Fiddlers Contest and \$10. Eighth place went to Tom Cox of Abernathy winning \$5.

Eleven contestants were entered in the fiddling event and throughout the afternoon songs such as "Orange Blossom Special" and "Whiskey for Breakfast" entertained those gathered around the contest.

Abernathy Riding Club sponsored a "Play Day" at the riding club arena. Barrel races and pole bending were staged along with an old fashioned "greased pig" chase.

Kids below the age of 11 gathered in the arena and went after three small, greased pigs. Coming out a bit dirty but with a 'slick' pig to keep were Lane Thompson, Ruben Olguin and Bobby White.

During the Fiddlers Contest, the Abernathy Fire Department staged a wet and lively game of water polo and the youngsters in attendance found that it was a way to "Beat the Heat" as temperatures climbed above 90 degrees.

Special decorated display windows by the Garden Club and Hobby Club added to the day's activities. Antique furniture was displayed by the Garden Club, while homemade crafts were exhibited by members of the Hobby Club.

Entertainment was provided from some 600 plus in attendance at the evening talent show. Twirlers, singing groups, a hill-billy band, drum solos and other talent performed at the show.

Winners in the junior division were: Runner-up, Vicci Stewart, a Raggedy Ann pantomime; and first was the brother-sister act of Ricky and Regina Powell. Dancing, twirling and a gymnastic routine highlighted the Powell's talent competition.

David and Doug Loper sang a vocal duet and won the first place plaque for the senior division. Bruce Bray's trap set (drum) solo was runner-up.

Last report from M. O. Hood said Abernathy received .56 of an inch of rain July 1, and .70 of an inch July 3. This brings the total for the year in town to 9.73 inches.

The area, or parts of the area, has experienced destructive hail, and sand and static electricity has badly damaged young cotton. Local grain companies report brisk sales in fast-maturing varieties of soy-bean seed for replanting ruined cotton acreage.

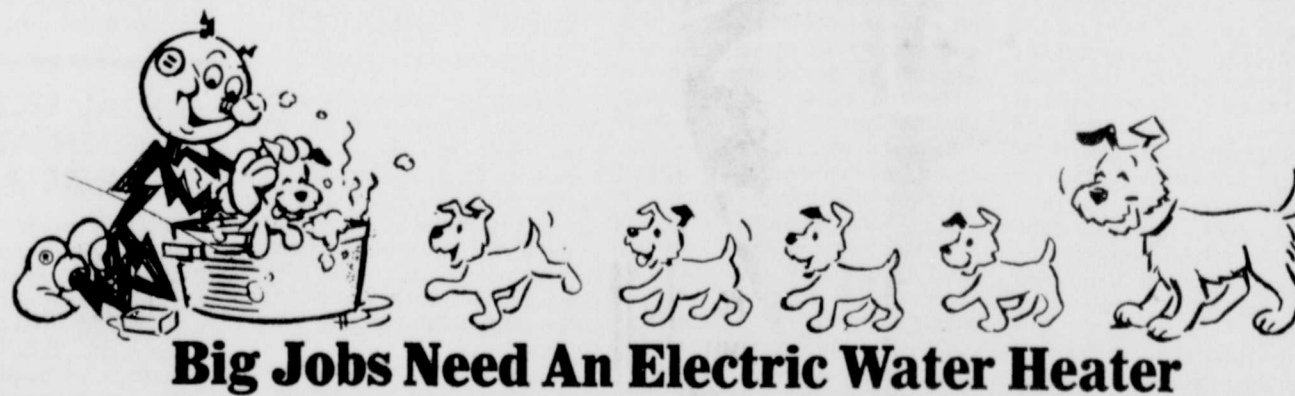

Starting with this correction: Mrs. Jack Casey owns and operates a greenhouse at 1101 Avenue F. We had her address wrong last week.

Abernathy's "paper boy" is a lady, Mrs. John H. Edwards. She and her husband deliver to homes and sell on news stands the daily newspaper that we could not do without, The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. John Edwards puts in long hours servicing oil wells near Abernathy, therefore, Mrs. Edwards does much of the paper business. They rise early and start delivering the morning A/J before most of their paper customers get up. The Edwards' early-rising may have saved a life here a few years ago.
