### WARNING GIVEN ON SHOOTING BB GUNS IN CITY; AGAINST LAW

State law makes it illegal to discharge an air rifle (commonly called a B.B. gun) within the city limits of a town.

The reasoning behind this law is that an air rifle, if not properly used, can be both dangerous and destructive.

A child discharging an air rifle at a bird might seem safe enough, but suppose the bb strikes another child in the eye. It might strike a neighbor's window or his car's windshield. Even where there is no intent to do any damage, damage can occur.

Then, there are the incidents where a child deliberately aims his air rifle at a person or object and pulls the trigger. This is serious business.

To enforce the air rifle law, peace officers need the cooperation and assistance of parents. If a parent buys bb's for their child, or allows the child to buy them, then it is up to that parent to caution the child against the dangers involved and to see that they are not used in town.

### 4-SCHOOL SPECIAL EDUCATION PROJECT ANNOUNCEMENTS

(By Gid Adkisson, Director)

As previously announced, Hale Center, Olton, New Deal and Abernathy have formed a cooperative in order to offer a comprehensive program of special education for handicapped students. This co-op, using the first letter of each town involved, has chosen the name HONDA CO-OP.

The HONDA CO-OP will eventually offer special education services to handicapped students from ages 3-21. Beginning with the 1972-73 school year the co-op will offer special services to those students who have learning problems from age 5 through the high school level. The five-year-olds will be in an early childhood unit. High school units are planned for this year at Abernathy and Hale Center and will be Vocational Adjustment Classes. In this type of class, students will be placed on actual jobs in the community and will earn credits toward graduation by doing satisfactory work.

Other services to be offered by the co-op include classes for the educable mentally retarded, classes for children with language and/or learning disabilities and speech therapy. There will be one class for the trainable mentally retarded at Hale Center. In most cases, students will spend only a part of each day in special education classes and the remainder of the day in a regular classroom.

The special education rooms will be resource type rooms where teachers will work with very small groups at a time. Each student will be given several tests to determine his stronger areas and his weaker areas. From these tests an educational plan will be written for each student suggesting what type instruction and what materials would be best for him. Registration for special education students will be at the same time as general registration.

Registration schedule for special education classes at Abernathy Schools will be as follows:

Kindergarten, Tuesday, August 22, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. in Room 24 of the Elementary School Building.

Elementary School, Tuesday, August 22, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

First grade students will register in Rooms 21 and 23 in the elementary school building. They must be six years of age on or before September 1, 1972, and must have a certified birth certificate and small-pox vaccination certificate to register.

Second grade students will register in Rooms 16 and 17.

Third graders will register in Rooms 10 and 11.

Fourth grade registration will be in Rooms 5 and 6.

Those in the fifth grade will register in Rooms 1 and 2.

Enrollment for Junior High School students will be Tuesday, August 22, 1972, for the 1972-1973 school year. Sixth grade students will enroll beginning at 9 a.m., seventh grade students beginning at 10 a.m., and eighth graders beginning at 11 a.m. Classes will begin at 8:45 a.m., August 23.

Students new to the Abernathy Schools who will be in Junior High School may pre-enroll after August 7, 1972, in the Principal's Office. New students should bring records they have from the last school attended.

All Abernathy High School students will meet in the school auditorium at 8:45 a.m. Wednesday, August 23.

August 23 is the first day of the 1972-1973 school year, and all students are to report to school at 8:45 a.m. The school buses will run the regular routes that morning, and lunch will be served in the school cafeteria that day.

### BOWEN HEADS NEW SCHOOL PROJECT HERE

Dear Mr. Davenport: The following information concerns the expansion of the Child Migrant Education Program in the Abernathy Public Schools for the 1972-73 school year: New Program for Four Year Old Migrant Children

The Abernathy Public Schools will initiate a new educational program for four year old migrant children beginning August 23, 1972. In order to attend this program, a child must be four years of age on or before September 1 of the school year.

A well-planned and organized (sequential) program appropriate for four year olds emphasizing a bilingual approach to oral language development will be taught. This program will follow the regular primary school day in length. Eligible students will be allowed to ride the school buses. A parent must sign a certificate of eligibility and permission form before the child can participate.

The teacher will be Miss Kathryn Hawkinson and her aide will be Mrs. Carmen Lopez. Miss Hawkinson will attend a week-long workshop July 31st-August 4th in Austin concerning this new program. This class will be limited to a maximum of twenty students. We must have a minimum of ten enrolled when school begins. Therefore, urge that all farmers, businessmen, and agriculture-related industry that employ migrant farm workers tell their employees of this program and encourage them to enroll their children prior to August 23, 1972.

### New Program for High School Migrant Students

We plan to initiate a new program for the high school-age migrant student. This design consists of a tutorial service and a Career Education phase. As a migrant student enrolls, he will be scheduled for one period per day to participate in this new curriculum.

### Congressional Definition of a Migrant Child

"A migratory child of a migratory agricultural worker is a child who has moved with his family from one school district to another during the past year in order that a parent or other member of his immediate family might secure employment in agriculture or in related food processing activities." Also, there are "home-based" migrants. These people live in Abernathy and work out-of-district during the summer months. Their children are also eligible.

# Hale Residents Will Receive Notices Of Tax Changes

Hale County property owners will receive notices this week, telling them of changes in property values after a year-long re-evaluation program.

According to Tax Assessor-Collector Bill Hollars, all personal property, city property and farm improvements were raised 10 per cent straight across the board in value.

This raised the assessment ratio from 22.2 per cent to about 25 per cent of actual value for county property.

The other major change will

be an increase in farm land values.

Using the 25 per cent of actual value figure, the best irrigated farm land was raised from about \$27 an acre to \$75. The next class of irrigated land goes from \$22 to \$50, and dryland and grassland will change from \$18 to \$25 an acre.

Hale County Judge Henry Heck said of the changes, "There is never a good time to raise taxes, but it finally becomes imperative. It must be done. We also think this will make taxes more equitable for all people."

Heck said the increase is the first since 1957, when the value of farm land was doubled and farm improvements were made a separate item of taxation.

Tax assessor-collector Bill Hollars said the re-evaluation was conducted by his present staff, with most work done from records and data already in his office.

The overall tax rate, including the state tax, will be reduced from \$1.42 to \$1.27.

This includes reducing the county rate from \$1.10 to \$1 and the state part from 32 cents to 27 cents.

Discussing the overall program, Hollars said, "Using this method of re-evaluating all properties in Hale County, we know believe that all properties are now more on a fair and equal basis."

In addition to raising most property, Hollars pointed out that some, in declining areas, was reduced.

### More Revenue

The aim of the tax program, in addition to equalizing present property, is to raise more revenue on which the county can operate.

Judge Heck noted that the

county began falling behind in income in 1963. This forced the county to begin borrowing short-term funds in 1964 to run on until taxes began being paid in October.

However, he said each year, the county had to begin borrowing money a little earlier.

He said county expenses exceeding income followed a consistent pattern until 1968, when the county entered a retirement system, and at the same time came under new liability laws.

In order to keep employees' take-home pay similar in view of the deductions for the retirement

system, salaries had to be raised substantially.

So the deficit made a major jump during 1969.

In 1972, Judge Heck noted, the county will borrow just a little over last year's figure of \$300,000.

He said the county also faces other increases in 1973, such as in fire insurance rates.

Under the re-evaluation, he said the first year, the county should bring in about \$150,000 more.

He said this should provide enough to pay on the deficit and at the same time provide a cushion for probable increases in expenses.

Hollars said after notices are mailed out, equalization board hearings will be held from Aug. 15-18 and Aug. 29-Sept. 1.

The overall budget itself shows only a slight increase, moving from \$1,297,802.32 in 1971 to \$1,315,368.50 this year.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in of-

He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition.

"The constitutional amendment to provide a four year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 10 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 68)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is convened, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as defined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be specified by the Legislature. The proposal for submission must be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals. "A brief explanatory statement of the nature of a proposed amendment, together with the date of the election and the wording of the proposition as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets requirements set by the Legislature for the publication of official notices of officers and departments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secretary of State and shall be approved by the Attorney General. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amendment or amendments to each county clerk who shall post the same in a public place in the courthouse at least 30 days prior to the election on said amendment. The first notice shall be published not more than 60 days nor less than 50 days before the date of the election, and the second notice shall be published on the same day in the succeeding week. The Legislature shall fix the standards for the rate of charge for the publication, which may not be higher than the newspaper's published national rate for advertising per column inch.

"The election shall be held in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Legislature, and the returning officer in each county shall make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at the election for and against each amendment. If it appears from the returns that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of an amendment, it shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation thereof shall be made by the Governor.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment revising provisions on the time and method of proposing amendments to the state constitution and the time and method of publishing notice of proposed amendments."

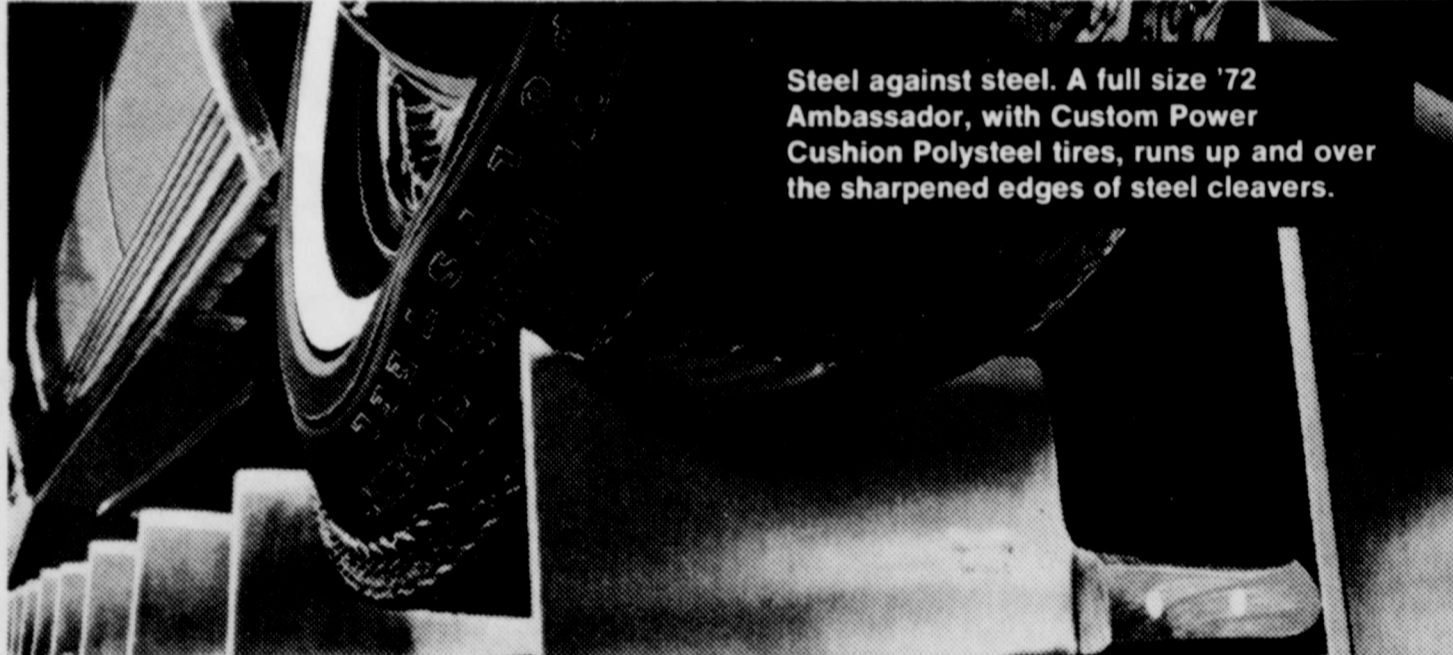

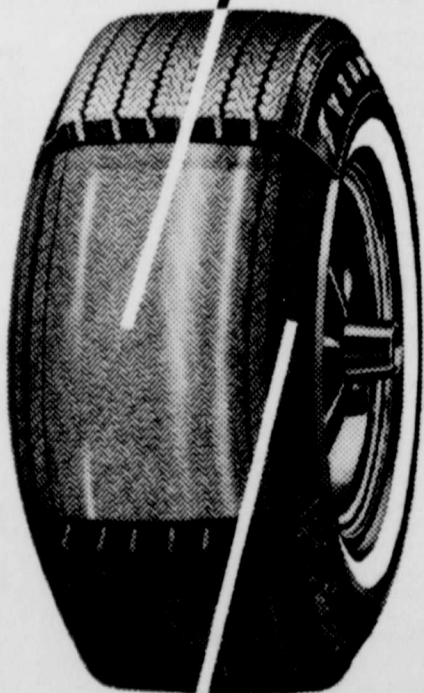
