A news release from Austin, reporting the amount of taxes cities in this area received from sales tax collections of 1% during the first quarter of 1972, indicates a healthy, growing economy in Abernathy. The City of Abernathy received \$7,023 for the first quarter of 1972, compared to \$5,782 for the first quarter of 1971. This increase comes in the face of a not-so-good cotton crop in 1971. Also, this increase does not reflect the city sales tax collected by the businesses in the addition annexed to the City of Abernathy earlier this year. The three businesses added in the annexation are expected to generate a good increase in city sales tax collected. The current report of \$7,023 for the first quarter of 1972 does not include taxes from these three businesses. City Manager Jim Davis said the city sales tax the three businesses are collecting will be included in the report for the second quarter, which will be announced about October 1 from Austin. The State keeps cities a full quarter behind in receiving their share of the overall sales tax of 5% collected, 4% for the state and 1% for cities with sales taxes. Also, the State takes a certain amount out of the cities' 1% as expenses for handling the cities' sales taxes.

Another economic indicator is bank deposits. During the second quarter of 1972, Abernathy First State Bank deposits increased about \$300,000 over the same period in 1971.

The hospital, looking forward to its 30th anniversary, has been a great success and an asset to Hale County. Many people from this area use the medical facility, and some from here are residents of the companion Hi-Plains Nursing Home. Also, several from here commute to Hale Center to work in the hospital. An Abernathy man, Ted Hill, is head of the hospital's pharmacy department.

Currently, Vic Lamb resides in Sedona, Arizona, a rich resort town of some 5,000 population. He and his wife operate an office supply, gift and variety store.

The newspaper profession lost one of the best editors in the United States when Lamb retired from newspaper after selling his Rudoso, N.M., weekly paper a few years ago.

## CHIEF SEEKS SAFETY FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN

It's that time of the year. As everyone knows, a new school year begins on the 21st of August. The Abernathy Police Department would like to take this opportunity to remind the citizens of Abernathy, as well as our out of town visitors, of the need to drive carefully around our school and in designated crosswalk zones.

As usual we will have a crosswalk guard stationed at Main and Avenue D. We ask you to obey this guard's instructions. It is this man's duty not only to regulate the children crossing at this point, but also to take necessary action against drivers who fail to obey the rules of this zone.

In the past many have ignored the speed restrictions as well as the guard's instructions. If you should happen to be called down for a violation in this area, we ask that you not take this personally. If you feel that you want to venerate your wrath on someone for being stopped, we suggest that you voice your opinion to the Chief of Police and not to the crosswalk guard who will only be doing his job.

One more bit of advise: When a child or children are in the crosswalk, vehicles are to remain stopped until either the crosswalk is completely clear of pedestrians or the guard signals the driver to proceed. This includes right hand turns from Main Street to Avenue D.

We have only one purpose in mind in our attitude towards violators and that is to "Protect Pedestrians."

## City Council Has Meeting

The City Council met in regular session Monday, August 14, at 7:30 p.m. The Budget for the 1972-1973 fiscal year was approved and adopted by the City Council. The firm of Bollinger, Segars, Gilbert & Moss was appointed as City Auditors for the current fiscal year.

A proposal from Hale County Sheriff Charles Tue was presented and approved by the Council. The proposal was to assign a full time resident deputy to the City of Abernathy which will release the city police from their responsibility of law enforcement outside the City Limits unless in extreme emergency and requested by the Hale County Sheriff's Office.

This proposal will allow City Police Department to devote their full attention to the City itself.

Permission was granted by the Council to advertise for bids for the 1971-1972 Seal-Coating program for the City of Abernathy. The streets to be improved include 2nd Street from Avenue D to Avenue H, 6th to 9th Street, and Avenue E from 6th to 9th Street.

The new tractor recently purchased by the City to control weeds throughout the season has been in service for approximately three weeks.

The Council approved 4-Way Stop Signs at the intersections of 6th Street and Avenue H and also at 3rd Street and Avenue H in order to more effectively control traffic.

The Council agreed to meet with surrounding governmental entities concerning a centrally located sanitary landfill to be used by the participating units. No definite meeting date has been scheduled.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

## Boys Ranch Rodeo Set

The only rodeo of its kind in the nation will be held over the Labor Day weekend, September 3 and 4.

It will be the 28th annual Boys Ranch Rodeo at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, where approximately 10,000 people are expected for the two performances. More than 150 boys will be riding calves, steers, broncos, and bucking horses. Older boys will compete on professional rodeo stock with judging under R. C. A. rules. All of the 375 boys who make their home at the Ranch will have some part in the rodeo, either as contestants or working in the many behind-the-scenes activities.

Both performances of the rodeo will begin at 2:30 on Sunday and Monday afternoons with music provided by the Boys Ranch band. An added attraction will be big bar-be-que sandwiches that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1. The rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the more than 2,500 boys who have lived at the Ranch since it was founded by Cal Farley in 1939.

## SCHOOL ANNOUNCEMENTS RULES FOR ATTIRE AND GROOMING

It is expected that parents or guardians will send their respective students to school dressed and groomed neatly and discreetly. Due to the extreme difficulty of "drawing the line" of discretion, it is ruled that shorts shall be considered inappropriate dress for regular classroom wear, (except in grades Kindergarten through 5th grade). Shirt tails shall be worn according to design.

Girls' hair should be neat and trim. Hair shall be styled, tied, or pinned so that it shall not interfere with seeing.

Boys' hair should be neat and trim, not to exceed the following limitations:

Front--not to be lower than the eyebrows.

Back--not to extend below the collar of a standard dress shirt and not to be curled upward at the collar.

Side--hair to be combed so that the tops of the ears will show.

Face--Clean shaven except for stubble that may extend to the lower lobe of the ear and be approximately the same width and length of the ear.

Sponsors of extracurricular activities may require contestants who represent the school in activities to have hair styled in such a manner that "caring" for it will not interfere with the activity or "penalize" the school in the activity. This should not be interpreted to give a coach or director the authority to say "all boys will have a burr or flat top" but rather the right to exceed the standards set forth previously if it interferes with the activity. Students are expected to conform with these standards at the time of enrollment.

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 10 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 68) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is convened, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as defined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be specified by the Legislature. The proposal for submission must be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals. "A brief explanatory statement of the nature of a proposed amendment, together with the date of the election and the wording of the proposition as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets requirements set by the Legislature for the publication of official notices of officers and departments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secretary of State and shall be approved by the Attorney General. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amendment or amendments to each county clerk who shall post the same in a public place in the courthouse at least 30 days prior to the election on said amendment. The first notice shall be published not more than 60 days nor less than 50 days before the date of the election, and the second notice shall be published on the same day in the succeeding week. The Legislature shall fix the standards for the rate of charge for the publication, which may not be higher than the newspaper's published national rate for advertising per column inch. "The election shall be held in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Legislature, and the returning officer in each county shall make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at the election for and against each amendment. If it appears from the returns that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of an amendment, it shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation thereof shall be made by the Governor. "Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment revising provisions on the time and method of proposing amendments to the state constitution and the time and method of publishing notice of proposed amendments."

## Proposed PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election. "Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature." "Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury." "Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."
