VICKERS KEYS WIN Abernathy Nudges Tahoka By 25-18

ANTELOPES GO TO HALE CENTER FOR FRIDAY NIGHT GAME

Coach Charles Birdsong's AHS Antelopes had a hard night's work in defeating the stubborn Bulldogs at Tahoka, 25 to 18, Friday night. The water-slick football was hard to handle, also hard to handle was Tahoka's 170-pound tailback Jim Bailey, No. 21.

The out-weighted, but not out-played, Antelopes turned in good performances in their respective offensive and defensive positions.

Pound-for-pound the Antelopes' Might Mitts, Albert Dominguez, 117 pounds, and Eddie Sepeda, 128, out-played the big Tahoka Bulldogs.

The Antelopes travel to Hale Center Friday night to meet Abernathy's oldest football foe the Owls. A large crowd of fans followed the Antelopes to Tahoka last Friday night, and weather permitting, an even larger crowd of Antelope boosters will be on hand when they tangle with the Owls, starting at 8 p.m., Friday at Jeffries Memorial Stadium.

The Hale Center Owls lost their season opener to Preshover, 8-12, and won, 27 to 0, over Kress last Friday night. The Antelopes won their first game of the season against Petersburg, 23-3.

Following is an account of the Antelope-Tahoka game:

Dane Vickers scored three touchdowns, one a 53-yard bomb from quarterback Steve Riley, as the Abernathy Antelopes edged the Tahoka Bulldogs 25-18 Friday night.

Vickers took the scoring pass in the first quarter and added TD runs of 1 and 57 yards later in the first half to put the Antelopes into a 19-6 lead.

But Tahoka roared back with a pair of touchdowns by tailback Jimmy Bailey—34 yard in the second quarter and 45 yards in the third quarter—to pull to within one point. All three Tahoka extra point attempts failed.

Bobby Cuevas wrapped the decision up for Abernathy in the fourth quarter with a two-yard plunge. It came three plays after a Tahoka fumble on its own 14.

John Thomas scored Tahoka's first touchdown on a three-yard run in the opening quarter.

Bailey's second touchdown, the one that made it a new ball game, was set up by a 51-yard punt return by Phil McClendon.

Tahoka had the lead in first downs 14-12, and in rushing yards, 200-139, while Abernathy had a 120-50 passing edge. A total offense, Abernathy had a narrow advantage, 259-250.

PARADE MONDAY WILL OPEN FAIR IN LUBBOCK

LUBBOCK -- The Parade of Bands officially will launch the 55th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair on its weeklong run here Sept. 25.

Currently, 33 bands have signed up and more are expected to participate. Except for host bands from Lubbock, visiting aggregations will be competing for \$1,250 in cash awards being offered to the top four winners in UIL Classes AAAA, AAA, AA, A and B. Trophies will be presented to all bands. Jerry Bartley's AHS Antelope Band will be in the parade.

The formation, which will start promptly at 10 a.m., and will proceed through downtown Lubbock, will be headed by the 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing band (El Toro) of Santa Ana, Calif. Judges will be Dan Gibbs of Monahan, Clyde Wilson of Midland and Dr. Russell L. Wiley of Lawrence, Kan. Judging is scored as follows: playing, 50 percent; marching, 30 percent; and appearance, 20 percent.

Cash awards will be presented to winning bands in all classes, including \$100 for first, \$75 for second, \$50 for third and \$25 for fourth place.

The parade will form on Avenue A adjacent to the fairgrounds.

The formation will go west from Avenue A on Broadway to Avenue M, then turn right one block to Main Street, go east on Main to Avenue E, then right one block to Broadway, then east through the underpass and back to the fairgrounds.

Checks and trophies will be awarded at 1 p.m. on the outdoor stage between the Merchant's Building and Women's Building.

New Deal Sets Homecoming

The annual homecoming for students and former students of New Deal is scheduled for Sept. 22 with a Mexican supper, sponsored by the Future Homemakers of America, opening the evening's activities.

Registration will be conducted at the supper which will be served from 5 to 7 p.m. in the school cafeteria. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students. Speaker will be Casey Jones.

According to Dale Worthen, president of the ex-students association, the class of 1957 will be honored during the events.

A business meeting to elect new officers will follow the supper. Announcement and coronation of the homecoming queen will be made during half-time of the football game between New Deal and Shallowater.

SCHOOL TRUANCY POLICY OUTLINED

Truancy - Absence for one or more periods without prior permission of parents or school officials.

Truancy Absences - Carry both a penalty and a punishment.

Truancy Penalty - A three point deduction from a six weeks grade for each class missed and a zero for the daily work for each class missed. This is applicable to classes missed for truancy, not classes missed for punishment. There will be no make-up work for punishment periods.

Truancy Punishment - Punishment varies for truancy offenses in each school.

Elementary: Corporal punishment - parental notification and conference.

Jr. High: First offense - Corporal punishment - parental notification and conference.

Second offense - Three day suspension - parental notification and conference.

Third offense - Three day suspension - parents may re-enter student after appearing with the student before a Justice of Peace Court.

Fourth offense - Charges will be filed in the County juvenile court in accordance with Article 2898 of Texas School Law.

High School: First offense - Three day suspension - parental notification and conference.

Second offense - Three day suspension - parents may re-enter student after appearing with the student before a Justice of Peace Court.

Third offense - Charges will be filed in the County juvenile court in accordance with Article 2898 of Texas School Law.

School Board Meeting Held

The Board of Education met in regular session, Monday, September 18th, in the Board Room of the high school. Meeting with the board was Mr. Herbert Brasher, architect who discussed plans for the new school building.

Preliminary plans were examined and approval was given to the architect to proceed with working drawings and specifications. It is anticipated that bids for construction can be let for the first week in December.

On action items, the board approved fund raising activities for the 1972-73 school year. These were Junior class play, senior class play and bake sale, band magazine sale, FHA Project Show Concession, and FFA fruit sale.

A truancy policy was approved by the board and the complete policy is printed elsewhere in this paper. Also approved was the new scale for free and reduced price lunches, a copy of which may be found elsewhere in this paper.

Presented and discussed was the compulsory quarter system that must be incorporated into the school for the 1973 school year. It was pointed out that this will have little effect upon the calendar days that Abernathy students will go to school as they will remain the same as in previous years, because Abernathy will not offer the fourth quarter as a full summer school schedule. The primary changes will be in the class periods and credit accounting.

In other action, the board approved the HONDA Special Education staff for Abernathy, New Deal, Hale Center and Olton. Personnel employed are as follows:

Campbell was shot in the right side of his chest and the right side of his lower back with a small caliber weapon.

Following Mitchell in the Pro Division were Wilson Swinney of Treasure Island and Courtney White of White River. They fired a round of 72.

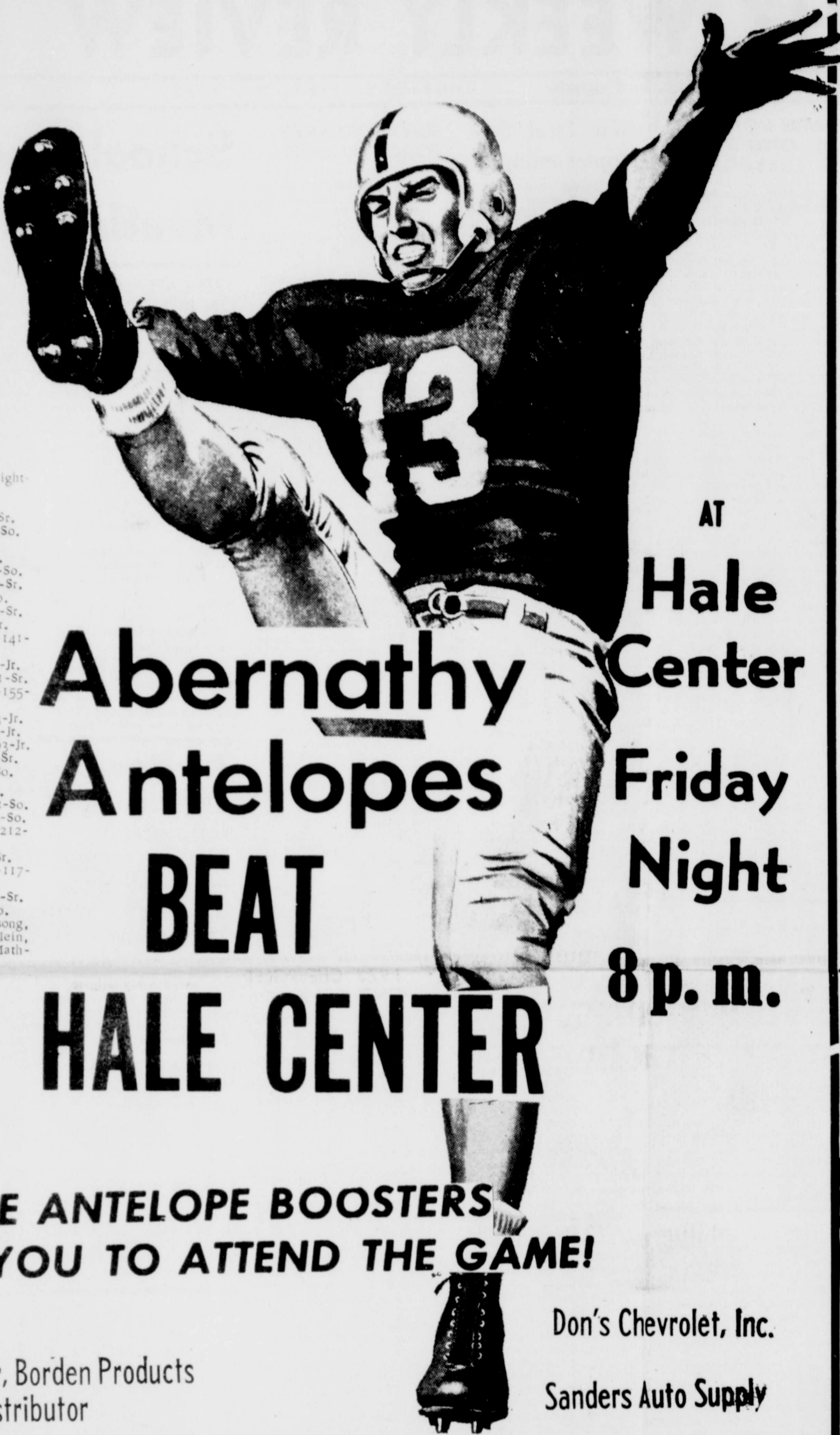

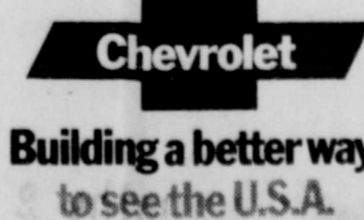

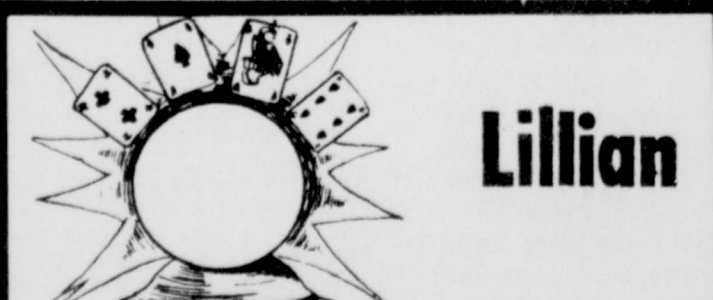
