## Lose to Olton; Tulia First 4-AA Foe

Ride the Charter Bus to Tulia Oct. 20, When the Antelopes Play the Hornets in Our First 4-AA Game. Fare \$2.70. See David Pinson TODAY For Reservations.

The homecoming jinx caught the Abernathy Antelopes from behind Friday night, and the Olton Mustangs got their first victory of the football season.

The Antelopes got started quick after kicking to the Mustangs. Keith Workman fumbled the ball and Abernathy took over on the 25 yard line. Unable to advance the ball, Ruben Rodriguez kicked a 25 yard field goal and the Antelopes led 3-0.

The defense took over, but Olton began moving the ball with their ground game and scored their first touchdown with 2:58 left in the first quarter.

The offense couldn't get things together and were forced to punt to the Mustangs. Olton once again started moving, but Darrell Blevins jared the ball loose, Abernathy recovered its second fumble.

The offense got bogged down and again had to punt. The ball hit a Mustang player on the foot and Abernathy recovered.

It didn't take the Antelopes long to capitalize. Bobby Cuevas scored from ten yards out. Abernathy led 10-7.

Things really got hot after that. The defense dug in and held Olton. The Antelopes started moving the ball on offense again. After a couple first downs Riley had one of his passes intercepted, giving the ball back to Olton. Just like clockwork, the Mustangs fumbled again.

Abernathy took over the ball but it just wasn't the right time. Riley got the ball knocked loose and Olton was off and running again. This time the Mustangs avoided the fumbles and scored with 43 seconds left in the first half. The score stood 14-10.

The Mustangs kicked off with 40 seconds left on the clock. Abernathy, not taking the Mustangs' last score lightly, got the ball rolling. Bobby Cuevas moved 30 yards on the first play, but due to a penalty the run was called back. This didn't put a cramp in the Lopes style. Cuevas again came back with 15 yards. With time running out, Halfback David McClendon broke through the left side of the line and headed for pay dirt. What seemed like a sure touchdown ended up short, and the half ended 14-10.

**BAND SHINES**  
The Antelope Band, one of the sharpest outfits in the Lone Star State, put on another fine half-time show. Abernathy is very fortunate to have such a hard-working group of young people representing them.

**SECOND HALF**  
The Antelopes started right back where they left off with two quick plays to Cuevas and Snodgrass. Romping David McClendon got loose again, this time going all the way for 55 yards and a touchdown. Abernathy led 17-14.

Olton didn't give up either. After a couple penalties against Abernathy that gave Olton good field position, they again scored with 4:34 into the third quarter. Olton now led 20-17.

Neither team moved the ball the rest of the third quarter, the defense—led by Corning, Snodgrass and Blevins—seemed to shut off Olton's ground game.

The fourth quarter opened with the Antelope on defense. Ray Martin intercepted a pass and the offense took over on the thirty yard line.

The offense began to bog up. It was fourth down and eight yards to go. The Antelopes went for it. Bobby Cuevas moved nine yards and a first down.

Nothing materialized and another fourth down situation came up. Again Cuevas turned the trick. It was first and ten on the 30 yard line. One would think by now something would give, but after a few plays, the Antelopes found themselves in the same rut. It was fourth and six this time when Riley found Dane Vickers in the end zone and hit him for a touchdown. Abernathy led 23-20 with 3:50 left in the game.

The Antelopes, attempting to keep the football, tried an on side kick. Tommy Horsford made a great dive and came up with the pigskin. But the Mustangs hadn't touched it and it was their ball in Abernathy territory.

The score tells the rest of it. Abernathy was unable to contain Olton's ground attack and the Mustangs scored with 23

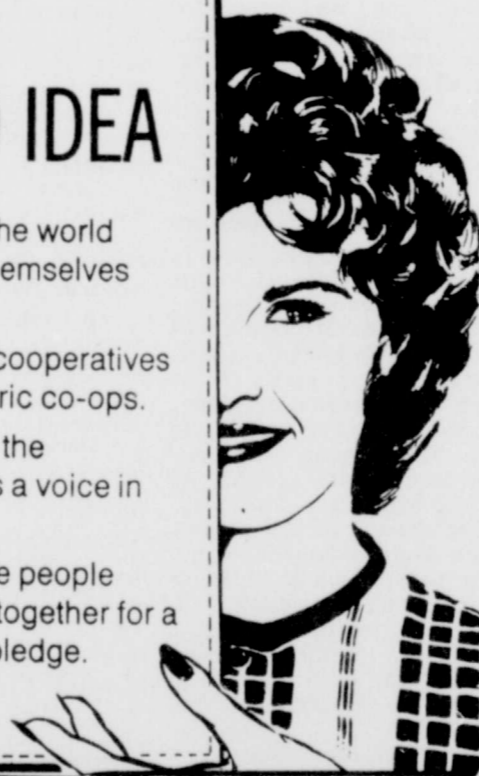

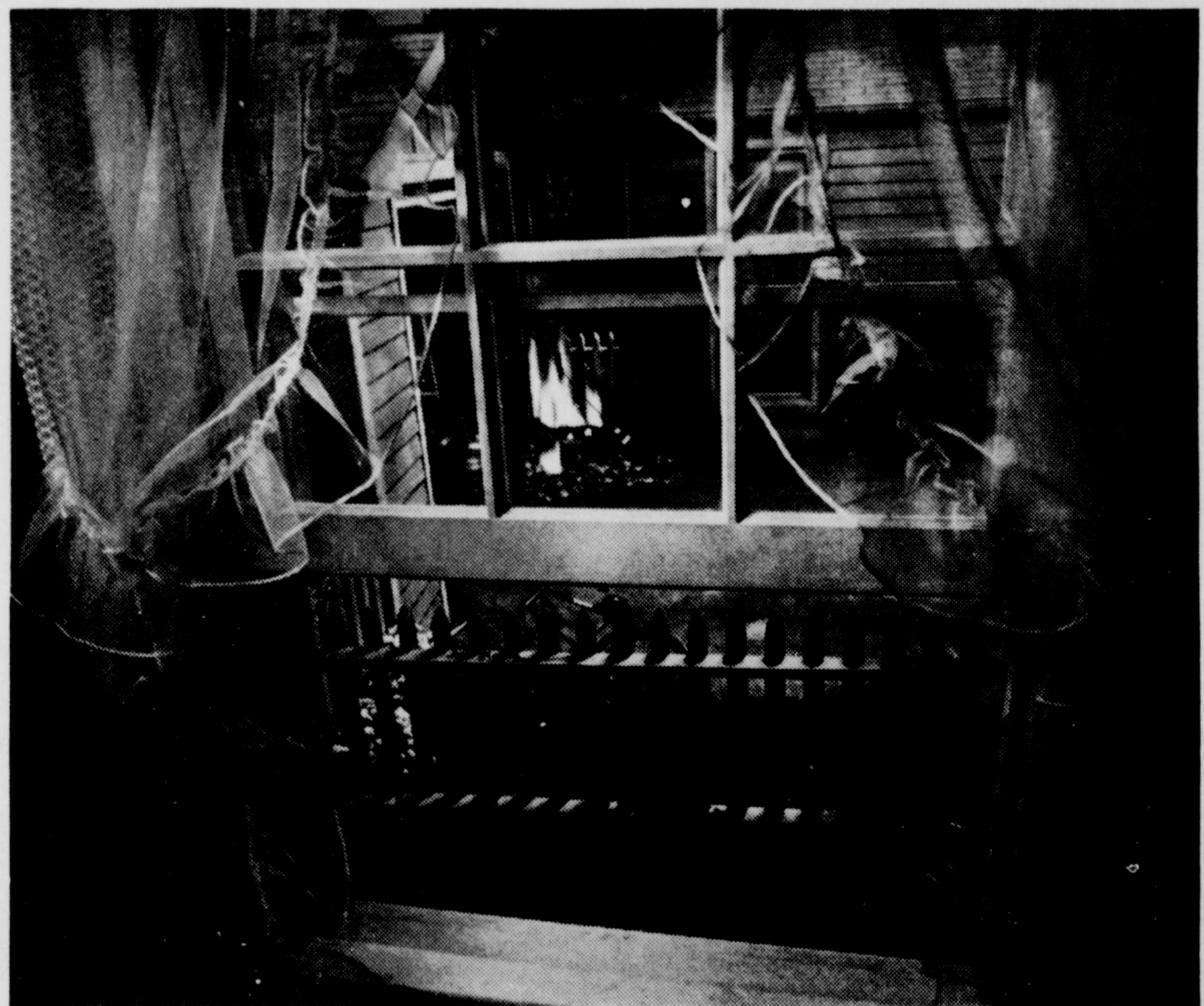
