When you awake Sunday morning, Oct. 29, Central Standard Time will be in effect in this time zone, replacing Central Daylight Saving Time, which has been in effect since April.

Marshall, Jr., of Lubbock. The role of the project leader in 4-H will be presented by Ed Garnett, Area 4-H & Youth Specialist for Extension districts 1 and 2 and coordinator for the clinic. Dr. Gilbert Hollis, Area Extension Swine Specialist, will work with leaders on health and nutrition of swine projects.

School Board Given Audit Report Here

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met October 5, 1972, in the Board Room of the High School. Mr. Orland Gilbert of the firm of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert, Moss and Company presented the fiscal audit for the 1971-72 school year. The audit was accepted by the board as presented.

Mr. Earl Carter, business manager, presented the 1972 tax roll for certification to the board. The 1972 valuation for the Abernathy ISD is \$25,337,724. The certification was approved by the board.

The enrollment report for the school district showed 1162 students in grades 1-12. This is one more student than on the same day of 1971. This count does not include 77 kindergarten and 16 children enrolled in the early childhood program.

The cafeteria report revealed that daily participation for food services for the September period was 701 students. Discussed at length by the board was the fire and damage resulting from the September 29th fire that destroyed a section of the west football bleachers and equipment stored beneath the bleachers.

The resignation of Mrs. Martha Mason was accepted by the board and LaRita Galloway was employed for the remainder of the school year.

The Board also discussed the plans being made by the architect for the new building. It is hoped that plans can be completed and contracts let for construction early in December.

The next regular meeting of the board will be November 6th. Those in attendance at this meeting were: L. J.
