# Post Office Christmas Package Mail

Abernathy Postmaster Herman Lambert announced the following dates recommended for consideration by postal patrons in sending mail and par-cels before Christmas:

Dates for surface parcels, Space Available Mail, and Parcel Airlift, are shown in order as follows:

Canada and Mexico - Nov. 24, Dec. 2, Nov. 30. South and Central America Nov. 11, Nov. 11, Nov. 17.

Europe - Nov. 11, Nov. 27, Africa, Nov. 1, Nov. 11, Nov.

Near East - Nov. 1, Nov. 1, Far East, Oct. 14, Nov. 20,

Nov. 27. PAL and SAM are for military personnel only. A new bill pertaining to Military Mail

was signed into law on Oct. 6,

1972, by President Nixon. Generally, this law will: (1) Increase the maximum weight of outbound SAM parcels from 5 to 15 pounds,

(2) Provide the airlift of surface mail not exceeding 70 pounds of weight and 100 inches in length and girth combined, from Armed Forces overseas to the U. S., its territories and possessions.

PAL parcels must not exceed 60 inches in length and girth and not weigh over 30 pounds. Many of the SAM and PAL packages require custom forms, that may be picked up at the post office before mailing. If you need any mailing information, call the post office.
