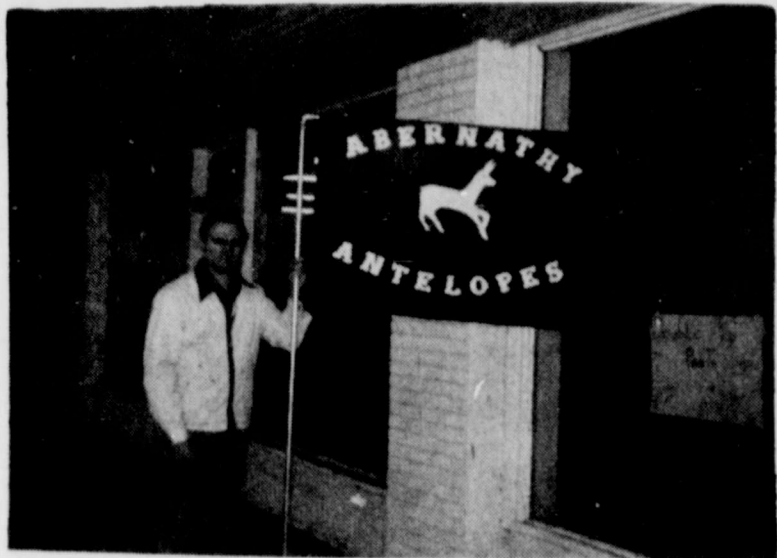




Antelopes To Play Floydada Here

As people have always said in West Texas, "If you don't like the weather, wait 24 hours and it will change." This seemed to be the case last week.

What started out to be a recurrence of summer the first part of the week ended up quite the opposite.

The Antelopes, taking full advantage of the fine weather, began to prepare their passing game, hoping to defeat the Tulia Hornets in their Friday night contest.

You can call it fate or just plain bad luck, but on Thursday — one day before the game — a cold front blew in and it started to rain.

Three plays later Tulia scored and the second half ended Tulia 7, Abernathy 0.

The rain continued to fall as the second half opened. Neither team moved the football and the swapping game continued.

Tulia's second score came with 3:57 left in the third quarter. They got the ball in good field position after an Abernathy fumble. The extra point was good and Tulia led 14-0.

The rest of the game was a slip and slide. The final score read: Tulia 14, Abernathy 0.

Despite the rain, cold weather and the short end of the score, the Antelopes never gave up. They continued to show their hustle and self-determination and proved to the many wet and cold fans that they truly are fighting Antelopes.

Safety Tips For Ghosts, Goblins

Soon little ghosts and goblins will bring their happy challenges of "trick or treat" to the doors of homes in many communities and cities throughout the state. Halloween is a general carefree spirit, but it is also a time when accidents are more likely to occur.

For a happier and safer Halloween, the Texas Safety Association urges all parents of "Trick or Treaters" to remember and use these basic Halloween safety rules:

1) Young children should be accompanied by parents or other responsible adults on their "trick-or-treat" rounds.

2) "Trick-or-Treat" visits should be confined to the immediate neighborhood and limited to the residents of known neighbors.

3) "Trick-or-Treat" visits should be made during daylight hours, if possible.

4) Householders should be encouraged to give, and children to accept, only wrapped or sealed candy or other treats.

5) Children should bring all treats home for inspection before eating.

6) Residents who wish to welcome "trick-or-treaters" should light their porch or exterior lights as a sign of their hospitality.

7) Children should call only on homes with porch or other outside lights glowing.

8) Halloween masks should not be worn. (Masks restrict vision.) Colorful facial makeup may be used instead.

9) Halloween costumes should be light in color, short enough to prevent tripping, and non-flammable. For greater visibility in dusk or darkness, costumes may be decorated with reflective tape so that they "glow" in the beam of a car's headlights.

10) Follow these basic pedestrian safety rules: --Cross only at corners, never diagonally across an intersection.

--Look in all directions before crossing the street.

--Watch for and obey all traffic lights.

--Walk, never run across the street.

--Use sidewalks, not the street, for walking.

--Wait on the curb, not in the street, until the street is clear to cross.

11) Motorists should be warned to exercise extreme caution on "Trick-or-Treat" day and alerting to be on the alert for excited youngsters.

12) Children should carry flashlights if there is a possibility of being out after dark.

Post Office Christmas Package Mail

Abernathy Postmaster Herman Lambert announced the following dates recommended for consideration by postal patrons in sending mail and parcels before Christmas:

Dates for surface parcels, Space Available Mail, and Parcel Airlift, are shown in order as follows: Canada and Mexico - Nov. 24, Dec. 2, Nov. 30.

South and Central America - Nov. 11, Nov. 11, Nov. 17. Europe - Nov. 11, Nov. 27, Dec. 1.

Africa, Nov. 1, Nov. 11, Nov. 17. Near East - Nov. 1, Nov. 1, Nov. 7.

Far East, Oct. 14, Nov. 20, Nov. 27.

PAL and SAM are for military personnel only. A new bill pertaining to Military Mail was signed into law on Oct. 6, 1972, by President Nixon.

Generally, this law will: (1) Increase the maximum weight of outbound SAM parcels from 5 to 15 pounds, and

(2) Provide the airlift of surface mail not exceeding 70 pounds of weight and 100 inches in length and girth combined, from Armed Forces overseas to the U. S., its territories and possessions.

PAL parcels must not exceed 60 inches in length and girth and not weigh over 30 pounds. Packages of the SAM and PAL packages require custom forms, that may be picked up at the post office before mailing. If you need any mailing information, call the post office.

Seoul, Korea (AHTNC) Sept. 26--Army Captain Tommy Marshall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rex H. Marshall, Sr., Buchanan Dam, Tex., participated in rescue operations last month following the heaviest, most devastating rainstorm and flood to hit Seoul, Korea, in 65 years.

Capt. Marshall is an airfield commander with the 55th Aviation Company, which assisted in rescuing thousands of Koreans stranded by the record-breaking three-day, 18-20-inch rainfall. Nearly 500 Koreans lost their lives and more than 300,000 were left homeless.

The 55th and other aviation units of the eighth U.S. Army will continue to transport food and supplies to the stranded villagers until conditions return

to normal. Capt. Marshall entered the Army in 1961 and was stationed at Ft. Wolters, Tex., prior to his arrival overseas last December. He has served in Vietnam and holds the Air Medal.

The captain, whose wife, Kay, lives in Idalou, is a 1957 graduate of Petersburg High School.

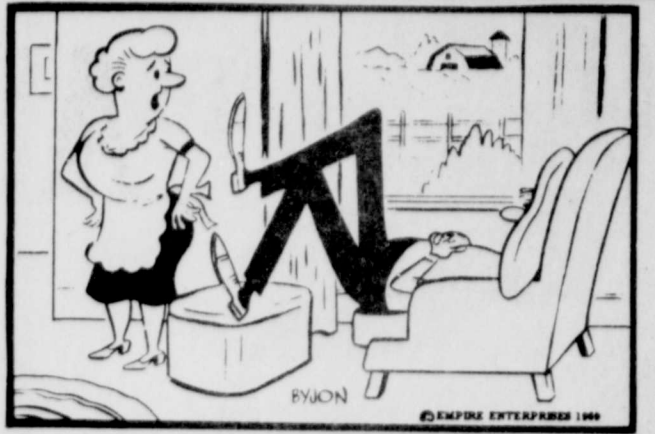


