A Church of Christ minister, who saw the accident, said Mrs. Stavenhagen was thrown about ten feet into the air and that her body landed over 30 feet from the point of impact. She was pronounced dead at the scene.

Abertnathy was probably the only town on the South Plains to experience severe weather Friday night. What started out as a mere whirlwind turned into an awesome, frightful tornado. The Antelopes, trying to rebound after their loss to Tulia last week, opened the game in good style.

The defense held the hard-running Whirlwinds and Floydada was forced to punt. The punt was short and it looked like the Antelopes would have great field position. This was not the case. The ball hit one of the Antelope players and was quickly gathered in by the Whirlwinds.

The defense once again went into action. They worked well against Floydada's running game and, along with a couple penalties, stopped the Whirlwind's progress. Facing a fourth down situation, the Whirlwinds kicked a field goal that was good. They led 3-0 with 6:11 remaining on the clock.

The offense started to move the ball and after a 35 yard pass play to Kent Snodgrass, the Antelopes were threatening on the Floydada 25 yard line. Once again the bottom fell out. A Riley to Vickers pass was intercepted and Floydada took over again.

The defense continued to control the offensive game of the Whirlwinds, stopping their running and passing game but not their kicking game. Floydada kicked their second field goal and, with 1:47 showing on the clock in the second quarter, led 6-0.

Having its trouble keeping the ball, the offense found the going tough again. After a few plays, Riley's pass was on once again intercepted. Floydada, taking advantage of the Antelope turnover, scored their first touchdown and led 12-0 as the first half ended.

The offense continued to have trouble getting it all together in the second half. Floydada's defense began to get to quarterback Riley, making it hard for the Antelopes to move the ball.

Riding high on opportunities, Floydada scored again with 6:22 left in the third quarter. They led 18-0.

Once again the offense bogged down and Vickers punted. Floydada (rated high on the South Plains in class AA) could

do no wrong as they scored again and led 25-0 with 10:20 left in the fourth quarter. The Antelopes were unable to muster a sufficient offensive drive. After another touchdown and field goal, Floydada won the game, 35-0.

The Antelopes have been beaten on the scoreboard a number of times this year. They have been out-weighted and out-numbered many times but one fact has remained constant throughout all of their encounters - their hustle and determination has not faltered. In the minds of the coaches and fans, the Antelopes are TRULY WINNERS.

NATION TO VOTE IN THE GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7

Voters of the United States will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 7, to elect a president and vice president and other national, state, district, county and local officials.

Aside from the presidency, the hottest national contest in Texas is for U. S. Senator. Opposing candidates in this race are the Republican incumbent Senator John Tower and Democrat Barefoot Sanders.

Democratic nominee for governor Dolph Briscoe has opponents from other parties. Veteran Democratic Congressman George H. Mahon is up for consideration of voters in several counties, including Hale and Lubbock Counties. He has no opponent.

Most Democratic nominees for local area district and county offices have no opponents. Texans will vote on 14 Constitutional Amendments. Voting boxes in this area: Abertnathy, Hale County City Hall; Lakeview, Hale County, Lakeview Methodist Church. Polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Abertnathy, Lubbock County, two voting places, clubhouse and school; Becton, Lubbock County, at a Becton Church. Polls in Lubbock County open at 7 p.m. and close at 7 p.m.

A. The maximum taxable base for 1972 for FICA purposes is \$9,000. FICA tax on \$10,800 will be paid beginning in 1973.

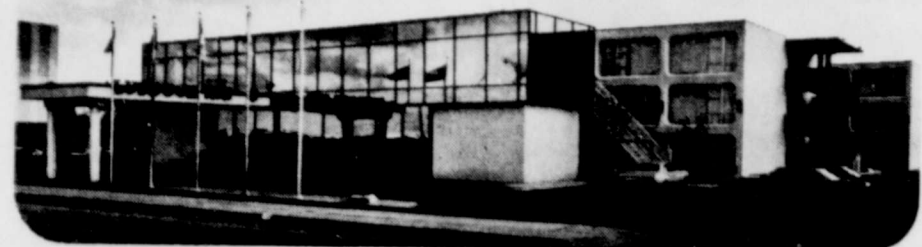
