# Antelopes To Play Idalou Wildcats Friday Night

## WIN HOMECOMING GAME OVER RALLS

Jackrabbit was at the top of the menu Friday night, and the Abernathy Antelopes had their share and plenty to spare as they defeated the Ralls Jackrabbits by a score of 34 to 14.

The Antelopes won the opening toss for the first time in a number of outings. They elected to receive.

The offense, definitely sharper than in their previous contest with Floydada, started moving the ball. After a couple quick first downs, Steve Riley hit Kent Snodgrass on a 30 yard play and the Antelopes led 6-0.

Playing sharp football, the defense held the Jackrabbits and the Antelopes took over on their own 48 yard line.

It didn't take Riley long to get things moving again. After a couple good running plays by Bobby Cuevas and Dane Vickers, quarterback Riley hit Larry Lutrick in the end zone for his second touchdown pass of the night. Abernathy led 12-0.

Displaying a fine kicking game, Ruben Rodriguez seemed to keep the Jackrabbits deep in their own territory. The defense was taking advantage of the fine kickoffs by Ruben, and began to stall the Jackrabbits attempts to move the ball.

As fate would have it, the Antelopes were tagged with a personal foul penalty, giving Ralls excellent field position on the Lopes 10 yard line. Ralls pulled a fine fake play and scored with 6:58 showing on the clock. The score read Abernathy 12, Ralls 7.

Abernathy began to have trouble moving the ball and, after an illegal procedure penalty, found themselves in a punting situation. The punt was short and Ralls felt the opportunity door open once again. The defense—led by Audy Corning, Darrell Blevins and Ruben Rodriguez—dug in and quickly cooled off Ralls, giving the ball back to the offense.

Dane Vickers got things moving on a 40 yard jaunt, but the clock caught up with him and the first half ended with Abernathy leading 12-7.

**SECOND HALF**

The second half started out to be nothing less than spectacular. The defense, led by Blevins and Cuevas, stopped Ralls and the offense took over on their own 42 yard line.

It didn't take "Riley and Company" long to get on the scoreboard. After a couple good runs by David McClendon and Dane Vickers, Bobby Cuevas went in from 10 yards out and the Antelopes led 18-7.

The defense continued to dominate the Ralls offense. After a holding penalty by the Lopes, Ralls was threatening to score but the Antelopes jarred the ball loose and the offense took over once again.

"When you're hot, you're hot" seemed to be the case with the offense.

David McClendon moved the ball into Jackrabbit territory on a 40 yard jaunt. Riley took advantage of this and threw his third touchdown pass of the night to Kent Snodgrass. Abernathy led 24-7 as the third quarter ended.

Showing hustle and desire, the defense continued to shut off Ralls' main attack giving the Antelope offense more scoring opportunities.

Bobby Cuevas and Ray Martin got things moving again with a couple good runs. Then Steve Oswalt, sophomore tail back, scored his first touchdown of the season. The Antelopes led 31-7 with 8:12 left in the fourth quarter.

The defense was caught in a few tight spots late in the fourth quarter. After holding the Jackrabbits and causing them to punt, a roughing the kicker penalty was called and Ralls had another chance. But the "stingy" Lopes held on and Ralls gave up the ball again.

The offense wasn't able to cross the goal line this time and called on Ruben Rodriguez, who kicked a 28 yard field goal. Abernathy led 34-7.

With 48 seconds left in the game, Ralls surprised everyone and scored their second touch-
