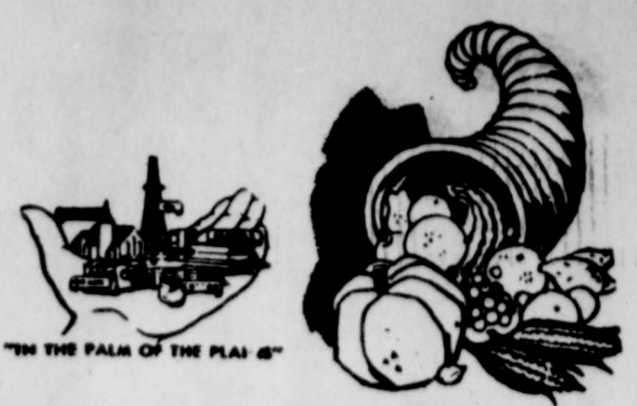

City Council Holds Meeting

The City Council held its monthly meeting Nov. 6, 1972, at 7:30 p.m. in City Hall to discuss the various items of business at hand.

The council approved the appointment of City Manager Glen Metcalf as Civil Defense Director for the City of Abernathy.

A tax report for the current fiscal year was presented to the mayor and council informing them that 61% of the current taxes had been collected in the month of October.

A proposed Municipal Lighting and Power Service rate increase requested by Southwestern Public Service was tabled until the regular meeting in December at which time a study of other cities' proposed rate increases requested by Southwestern Public Service will be presented and reviewed by the council.

The South Plains Association of Governments, through its Criminal Justice Council, will be the agency through which the 15 county region will make application for Criminal Justice Funding for a State-Wide Communications System.

This communication system will be exclusively for law enforcement agencies. Within the state of Texas there are 23 other councils of government similar to SPAG that are initiating like applications to the Criminal Justice Council.

The City of Abernathy through South Plains Association of Governments will make application for Criminal Justice Funding, along with all other entities within the SPAG Region.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ragland To Observe 60th Anniversary

(Editor's Note: The following is from the Friday, Nov. 10, issue of the Plainview Daily Herald. It concerns Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ragland of Plainview.)

A dinner party for the family at noon Sunday will mark the 60th wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ragland at their home, 309 E. 9th. Ragland has been a resident of Hale County 80 years and Mrs. Ragland has lived in the county 62 years. Friends of the couple are invited to visit in the afternoon.

Relatives of the couple expected to be here for the dinner include Mr. and Mrs. Welcome Ragland, Lubbock; Mr. and Mrs. George Ragland, and Mrs. U. L. Moreland, Abernathy; Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Ragland, Mesquite; Mr. and Mrs. Austin Ragland, Mrs. Veldean Harrison and Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Ragland, all of Plainview; Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Jackson, Abilene; Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Harrison, Midland, and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Elliott, San Angelo. The couple has eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Ragland's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ragland, came to the county in 1892 with five children. He had come the year before and filed on a section of land 20 miles south of Plainview in the Lakeview Community, moving his family and a year's supply of groceries in two covered wagons the next year from Ellis County. They lived in a tent until a dugout could be built. Seven years later they built a three room box and

strp house. Ragland recalls owners drove cattle to market by their place and often bedded them down near their home, which helped to solve the problem of their fuel. His dad would go to the brakes for a load of wood to use with the "prairie coal." He would kill antelope for their food and hang it, or a yearling beef, on the windmill tower for their food.

The 80-year resident, who has never been out of the county for more than 13 days at one time, also remembers that his dad got a job shearing sheep and that a man let his father take care of some cows for part of the increase and their milk and butter. Later he traded corn for meal and wheat for flour.

Ragland went to New Mexico in a buggy to bring Miss Lillye Moreman back to Plains in Yoakum County where they were married Nov. 14 1912 by the county judge in front of the courthouse while seated in a buggy. She and her parents had come from Wise County to Post and then to Abernathy before moving to New Mexico.

Mr. and Mrs. Ragland lived on the old home place south of town and also farmed in what is now the Hillcrest addition. He also carried the mail in a one-mule buckboard from Plainview to Running Water in about 1905. The Raglands moved to Plainview in 1928. He has been on the official board of First Methodist Church for 58 successive years. Mrs. Ragland taught a Sunday School class for 25 years.

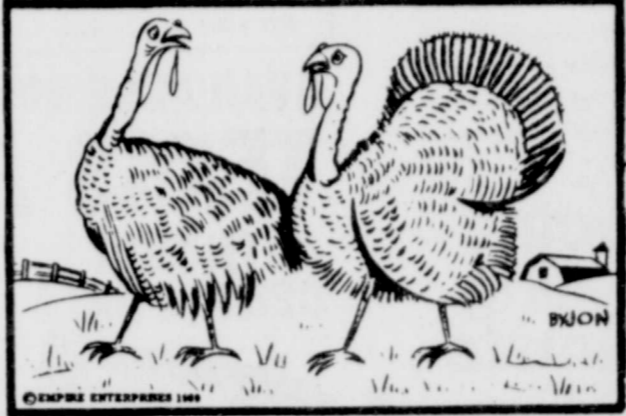

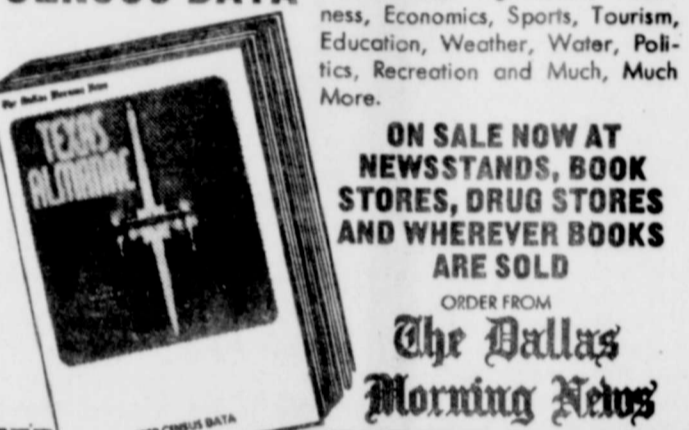
