Thursday, November 30, Dimmitt Bobcats, The Antelopes traveled to Plainview for the annual Plainview tournament and defeated the Dimmitt Bobcats 67-65. Dick Rogers had 21, Ray Martin 19, and Joe Evans connected with 14.

Friday, December 1, Phillips, Abernathy continued on their winning ways by defeating Phillips 81-78. Ray Martin burned the cords for 24 points, Kent Snodgrass added 19, and Joe Evans tossed in 10 points.

This took the Antelopes into the finals against the Tulia Hornets. Expected to be one of the roughest foes of the early season for the Antelopes, Tulia was soundly defeated 81-77. This gave the Antelopes the championship trophy in the small school division, Ray Martin, displaying another fine performance, led the Antelopes with 26 points. Joe Evans followed with 20 and Dick Rogers tallied 14. Two Antelope players, Dick Rogers and Ray Martin, were named to the all-tournament team. Both boys are to be congratulated for receiving this fine award.

Ten Hale County citizens serve either in a policy-making or an advisory capacity for the Education Service Center, Region XVII, Lubbock.

With the help of the Board of Directors and various advisory committees, the Service Center offers schools a variety of programs and activities, all having the common goal of bringing the best possible learning opportunities to every student in the region.

Bruce Rigler, a Plainview business man, is a member of the Board of Directors which defines policy for the Center. Reviewing ESC programs and activities along with other area educators are Eddie Keilberg of Petersburg and Mrs. Carolyn Wade of Abernathy. They also help assume the complete responsibility of evaluating films for the Media Division. Keilberg reviews science films at the secondary level and Mrs. Wade, all elementary level films. Such films are those being considered for purchase to place in the Media film library.

Last year schools ordered 56,949 films from Media. Ms. Martha Hall, Charles Bowen and Ms. R. Jean Palser are members of the advisory committee for Special Education.

Ms. Hall is an elementary special education teacher in Petersburg; Bowen, a director of guidance in Abernathy; and Ms. Palser, a special education supervisor in Plainview.

L. O. Jones serves on the advisory committee for Data Processing. Jones is director of special services for the Plainview Independent School District.

Three others assist in an advisory capacity for the Vocational Evaluation of the Handicapped program: Winston Watkins, Vocational Adjustment Coordinator for the Petersburg school; Wendell Dunlap, Director of Vocational Education in the Plainview School System; and Gid Adkisson, Director of HONDA Special Education Cooperative.

The Lubbock-based Center serves 66 school districts in 20 West Texas counties.

New Industry For Abernathy

A building will be erected on the plot to house John Gillispie's Livestock By-product Processing Plant.

Gillispie will move here from Lubbock. He and members of his family and other employees will operate the plant. Eight or ten persons will be employed there when the plant goes into operation.

Included in the numerous by-products to be processed there will be livestock liver bile and pancreas glands, which will be shipped to pharmaceutical firms to be used in making drugs.

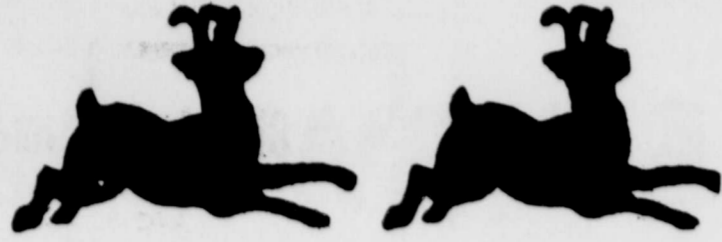
The Ray Sanders Earn Trip to Canary Islands

Later, the Sanders' daughters learned that the ill-fated plane had tourists from Germany aboard. The plane crashed at the airport after an explosion in a wing on takeoff. All 155 persons aboard were killed.

REGIONAL MEETINGS:

Catholics of the Diocese of Amarillo were represented Sunday, December 3, at four regional meetings of the Diocesan Pastoral Council. Meetings were held simultaneously at Lubbock, Plainview, Amarillo, and White Deer. Each parish in the Diocese is officially represented on this council by two delegates. However, the Sunday meetings are open to all. The Council is largely comprised of lay members, but also includes representatives of priests and religious. It is operated on a commission system, with Education, Communications, Social Action and Finance being the four major divisions.

Mrs. John Kveton of Abernathy serves the Council as a member of the executive board, or steering committee, and is also co-chairman of the Education Commission, along with Rev. Tom McGovern of Carlisle. The Education Commission prepared two presentations for each meeting: one on adult religious education and one on the Diaconate Program which is being formed in the Diocese under the direction of Rev. James Gurzynski, former pastor of St. Isidore's in Abernathy. He is now the Diocesan Director of Religious Education and pastor at White Deer. Father Gurzynski himself gave the diaconate program at the White Deer meeting. Mrs. Kveton made the presentation at White Deer on religious education for adults, and also served on a four-member panel for the Communications Commission presentation on Parish Councils. She spoke on the topic of "Responsibility of the Laity in Today's Parish."

The Diocesan Pastoral Council will follow up the winter regional meetings with a two day general assembly in the Spring for all parish and diocesan delegates.

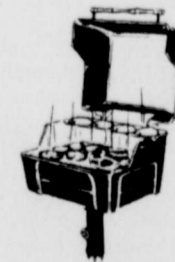

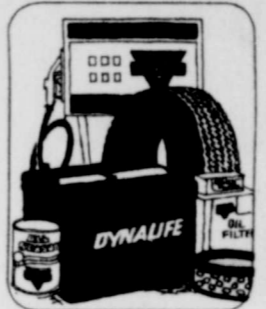
