REVENUE SHARING EXPLAINED BY CITY MANAGER

The City of Abernathy Countil met in regular session at 7:30 p.m. December 11, 1972, at the City Hall.

Permission was granted to advertize for sealed bids for the 1973 Gasoline Supply for the City. Bid forms and further information may be obtained from City Hall. All bids are to be returned to the City Manager's office by 5:00 p.m. Monday, Jan. 8, 1973, and then opened at the regular City Council meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 8, 1973.
A Sanitation Contract Pro-

posal submitted by Preston Coomes of Triple C Sanitation Service was reviewed by the Council members. Following the review, several changes were suggested and it was the decision of the Council to have the City Manager meet with the City Attorney to draw up a preliminary contract for the next council meeting.

No action was taken on the proposed municipal rate increase requested by Southwestern Public Service Company which is to take effect Jan. I.

The City of Abernathy re-ceived its first Revenue Sharing check from the Department of the United States Treasury Deof \$13,586. This check is for from the period from January 1, 1972, through June 30, 1972. The amount of the check was considerably short of the figures earlier released stating the City of Abernathy's share, and it is believed that possibly a mistake was made and Abernathy thus far has only received appropriations from Hale County and its share from Lubbock County is yet to come. An Office of Revenue Sharing Assistance has been established by the Texas Department of Community Affairs, Austin, Tex., and it is hoped that answers to the many and varied questions concerning revenue sharing propriations will soon be at

Members of the City Council noted that recently several complaints have been received concerning the inadequate service that has been given by the General Telephone Company. Most complaints have been in the area of not being able to place either local or long distance calls. It was decided that a method of registering such complaints should be established. As of this date, forms are available in City Hall on which persons wishing to register a complaint against General Telephone Company for inadequate service may state such complaint. All completed forms will remain on file in City Hall for future refer-

CITY RECEIVES REVENUE SHARING CHECK

The Revenue Sharing Program was signed into law October 20, 1972. This program falls under the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972 and the check for the City of Abernathy for the first entitlement period was received December 11, 1972, in the amount of \$13,586.
Generally, there are few

"strings" attached to the expenditure of revenue sharing funds. State governments may expend their revenue sharing payments for any lawful purpose. Units of local governments have discretion to expend their revenue sharing payments on broad categories priority expenditures described in the Act and on any lawful ordinary and necessary capital expenditure. However, neither a state nor a local government may use any portion of its revenue sharing payments to match funds for any federal program, nor use any portion in an activity or program which discriminates on the basis of race, color, national origin or

All recipient governments are required to publish reports of how their revenue sharing funds were used and there is included in the Act a penalty for misuse of funds.

There are still many questions that require clarification. It is hoped that they will all be answered in the near future. Abernathy's check was considerably less than anticipated, and the Texas Municipal League, the Office of the Secretary of the Treasury, and the Office of Community Affairs have been contacted and will shortly come up with a reason for the decrease in Abernathy's anticipated share. One theory at present is that Abernathy has not received allocations from

I have never written you before, but I feel I should voice my opinion on a subject which was brought to my attention this morning. I know most of your readers have children or grandchildren in Abernathy Elementary School, and if they have not noticed I feel everyone should look into it.

I personally do not take my children to school everyday. but this morning I was late and I took them myself. The roads were very slick and icy and when I got to school it was already 9:10 a.m. The sidewalks (on the south entrances) were still icy and slick and no attempts had been made to clear them off. I was very appalled at the risks the school was taking by not salting the entrances and shoveling the frozen sleet

away. I had taken it for granted that this was customary. I feel, and I sincerely believe that all of you will agree too, that this should be done BEFORE the children arrive at school. I was told that they were shoveling the sleet off at the Junior High but that it was not snow and it was very thick and maybe it could not be cleared away. (I have always been under the impression that it was safer to walk on snow than on ice.)

I hope that all of you will agree with me and request that when we do have an ice storm and the walks are frozen over. that all the school entrances be salted and cleared of danger BEFORE the children start ar-

I do not feel that I am being overly concerned in this help and cooperation. I feel the children of Abernathy are worth an effort when their safety is at hand.

The NASA Space Science Education Project or "Spacemobile", as it has commonly become known during the past nine years, is a national pro-gram which is taken directly to students in their schools. Transported in a conventional panertruck, many scale models of launch vehicles, spacecrafts, satellites, electronic equipment, audiovisuals, and other equipment items are used for realistic and understandable demonstrations of many scientific principles and concepts involved in space exploration.

Last year, 7,520 programs were arranged and presented to an audience of more than two million students. Programs are supported regionally from various NASA centers. With four of Church Sunday, Dec. 31.

the mobile units, the Manned Spacecraft Center conducts programs in an 8-state region of 870,000 square miles or about one-fourth of the land of the United States. It includes the states of Texas, Oklahoma. Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Colorado, and New Mexico. Scheduling of the schools within each state is normally handled by the State Department of Educa-

A typical program lasts for about one hour and is presented in the school auditorium to an assembly of several hundred students. Discussions and demonstrations include aeronautical research, propulsion, orbits, probes, space communications, human factors, and manned space fight. Other topics include SKYLAB. NASA's next program to build and fly a prototype space station as an orbital workshop and laboratory for scientific experiments and work, and the Space Shuttle, a reusable spacecraft with landing capabilities much

like a conventional space craft. Following the auditorium program, the lecturer is available for classroom visits for further indepth discussions of space topics directly related to specific disciplines or to the special interests of the stu-

One of the first things that children learn is that Santa Claus is coming at Christmas to bring them toys and good things. The question I would like to deal with is, should Christians go along with such teachings? Let me make this perfectly clear, I am speaking to people who know and love the Lord, the rest of you will not understand. What is the duty of a Christian; it is to love and honor and bring glory to God. Will your teaching your children about Santa Claus bring

honor to God? Ask a person what is the first thing he thinks of when you mention Christmas, he will answer Santa Claus, toys, Christ-mas tree, etc. Is it pleasing to God for the emphasis to be put on a fictitious character and what he does, and ignore the One who died for man? You may say we tell them about Christ, but what really sticks in their mind? Remember your Christian duty is to bring glory to God through Jesus Christ.

The second problem is that we give to Santa Claus attributes that belong only to God; Omniscience for example. Santa knows all. He knows who has been good, and who has been bad. He knows our thoughts and our deeds. Santa is nearly omnipresent. He can cover the whole world in just a night. Santa is the judge; he rewards our deeds. He judges by our actions whether we get a present or no present. Then

we call him Saint Nick--giving the idea that he is all good. God said, "I am the Lord: that is my name; and my glory will I not give to another." Isa 42:8. What about giving God's characteristics to Santa Claus? Does this keep in accord with Isa.

When a child finds out that Santa is a hoax and he can't do all these things, why should he believe there is a God who can? Will he accept the word of parents who told him the lie in the first place? Think about it. Christian, if someone tricked you once, can you trust him

This leads us into the final point. God is truth, and those who are His ought also to be truthful. The Bible never accepts lying as being right, no matter what the circum-

The world is empty, looking for something that will bring a little joy to it. Santa

lying to your child when you tell him there is a Santa Claus, and there isn't. Later some

He will feel foolish because he believed in Santa Claus, while his friend was wise enough to know better. His friend may make fun of him for believing in Santa Claus, which will add to the hurt. Then he resents Mother and Daddy for tricking him. No one likes to be tricked. He also loses confidence in his parents. If he is a very emotional child it can be a very shattering awakening to the truth. You tell him to be honest, always tell the truth, and then you turn around and prove yourself a liar. Why should he listen to you? Is the idea of Santa Claus worth it all?


