Hang Up, Says Southwestern Bell Mgr. Best Response To Abusive Calls - - -

The phone rings. You answer and the caller's language is abusive, obscene, or threatening. What do you do? "Hang up," says Leslie R. Stevens, manager for Southwestern Bell here. "Use the phone on your own terms. Don't talk to anyone you don't want to, whether they're selling something, seeking information, playing a prank or mouthing obscenities. Don't give them an audience and they're not likely to call back."

Stevens said the phone company has other suggestions on how to fight annoying calls: 1. Make callers identify themselves. When someone asks, "Who is this?" don't tell them unless you recognize the voice or until he identifies himself. 2. Don't answer any questions from a strange voice that you wouldn't answer in a face-to-face meeting with a stranger on the street. 3. If a caller remains silent hang up. Some abusive callers want to listen, just to see what you'll do. 4. Hang up at the first indication of an obscene or suggestive remark. The caller would like nothing better than for you to respond to his comments. 5. Hang up if you're not interested in a product or service being sold by telephone and the

SUPERINTENDENT RESIGNS

Hale County School Office Abolished

PLAINVIEW (Special) -- The office of Hale County school superintendent was abolished at a meeting here Friday morning with the resignation of Dr. Louis McGregor who had served in the office since Jan. 1, 1971.

McGregor, in campaigning for the office in 1970, told the voters he was running for the office expressly to make it possible to abolish it. Under state law the office could not be abolished while there was an incumbent.

Final Session The county school board, meeting in what members deemed their final official session, accepted McGregor's resignation; and the office was abolished under House Bill

No. 645, introduced in the last legislature by Rep. Ralph Wayne of Plainview.

Henry Heck, Hale County judge, under provisions of the special legislation, became ex officio county school superintendent. Heck said he would not accept pay for the ex officio post.

McGregor told the session Friday that he had contacted Gov. Preston Smith requesting that Smith allow a bill to be introduced in the next special session of the legislature to abolish the office of ex officio county school superintendent of Hale County, a procedure that Heck approved.

\$9,000 Annually The Hale County office paid a salary of \$9,600 annually. It became obsolete in that its functions were or conveniently could be performed by the independent school districts, the only kind of the county.

The salary, paid for more than 60 years entirely by the state, will go into the general school fund.

The county school board disposed of all remaining funds, \$1,401.45, by apportioning it to the school districts in the county.

John Hegi was president of the county school board.

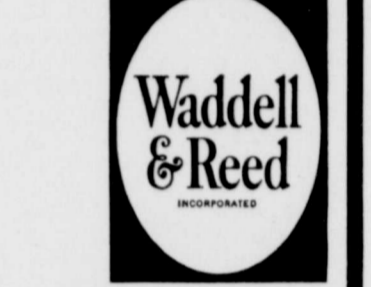

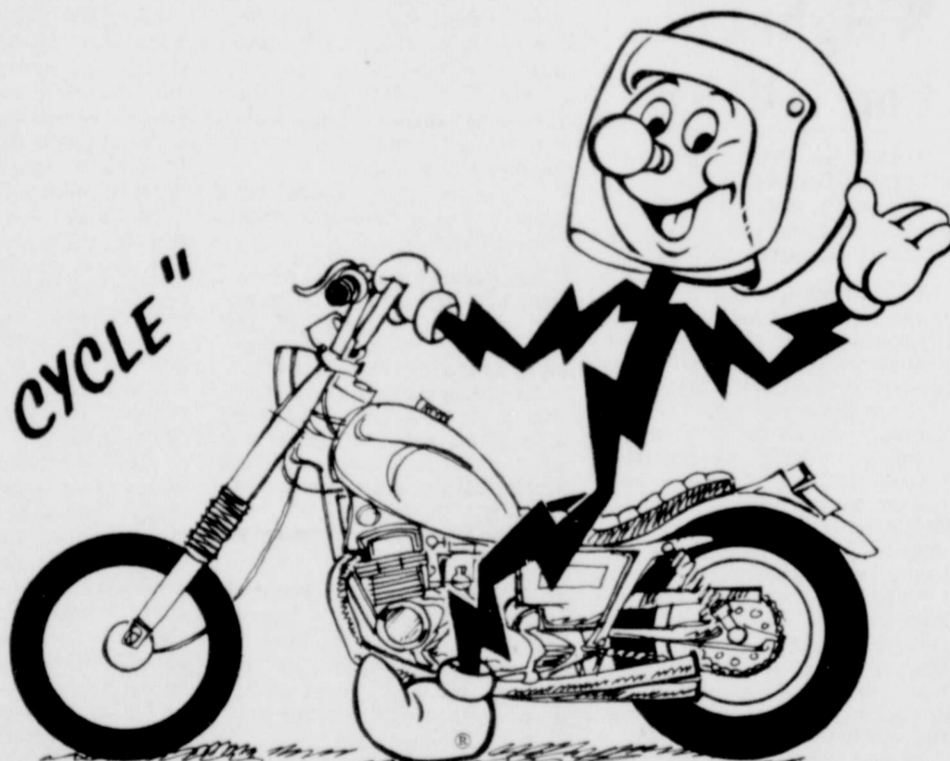

Farmers Begin Sign Up

Beginning Monday, the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office staff enters more than a month of an additional workload as area farmers sign up for participation in the 1973 farm program.

Last minute changes in the feed grain program and late harvesting of the 1972 cotton crops are a couple of items that may have delayed farmers' decisions on what program to follow.

The wheat and cotton program has been outlined for several weeks with only the 1972 cotton production records remaining to be completed so 1973 payment yields can be computed. Pat Guy, office supervisor, said that farmers should not wait to sign up in the 1973 program. "We need these cards as soon as possible," Guy said.

Under the feed grains program, the latest change made Wednesday, reduced the set aside feed grain base requirement from 30 percent to 25 percent under the guaranteed income option. "For clarification purposes, we are calling the guaranteed income option, the 25 percent option because farmers must set aside 25 percent of their feed grain base. We call the other option the zero option because farmers do not have set aside requirements," Guy said.

Under the 25 percent option, a farmer may sign up to set aside 25 percent of his feed grain base to earn a set aside payment computed by multiplying the program yield for the farms times half his base, times 32 cents per bushel for corn, 30 cents for grain sorghum and 28 cents for barley.

Guaranteed Income
The guaranteed income portion of the program guarantees that

the set aside payment will be at least 70 per cent of parity of the average price of the crops during the first five months after harvesting. Guy said if the program payments were not 70 per cent of parity, then the farmer would receive an additional check.

Vegetable Meet Slated Saturday

Vegetable genetics, potato breeding and herbicide residue effects on vegetables are among the popular topics to be presented at the annual West Texas Vegetable Conference in Lubbock Saturday.

The one-day meeting, kicking off at 8:30 a.m. at the South Plains Electric Cooperative, will feature some of the top vegetable experts in the nation, according to Dr. Roland Roberts, area vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock.

The conference is expected to draw a record crowd of West Texas vegetable growers, seedmen, chemical suppliers, machinery suppliers and representatives of several agricultural related organizations and institutions, including Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Tech University and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"We will have two top potato experts," Roberts points out. "Dr. Oscar Lorenz is a vegetable scientist at the University of California specializing in vegetable nutritional requirements. He has studied soil fertility requirements of potatoes, and will

address his remarks to that subject.

"Dr. Robert Johansen, a vegetable geneticist and breeder at North Dakota State University in Fargo, developed the Norgold russet potato which is widely used on the Plains and is the leading russet type potato in the western United States.

Other speakers, Roberts says, will describe research progress and results of experiments and demonstrations in vegetables in West Texas.

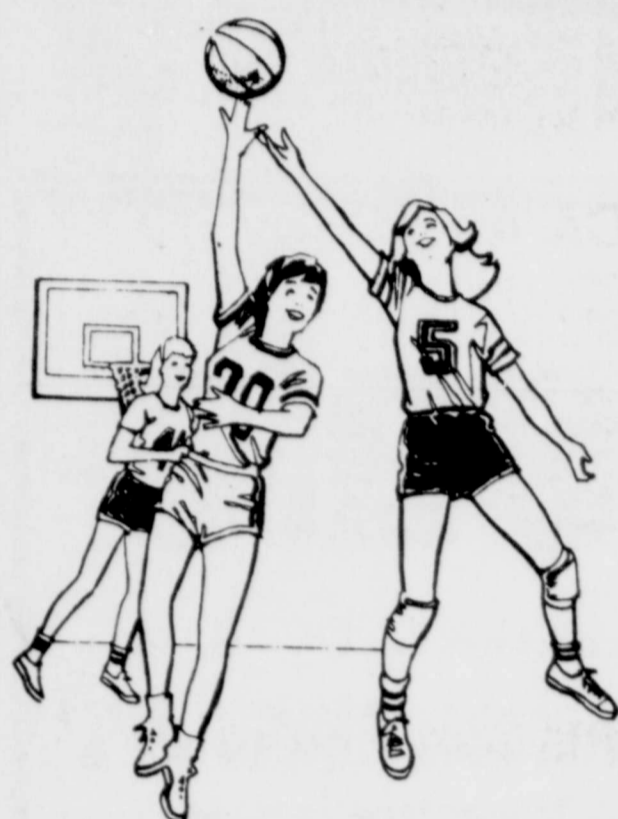
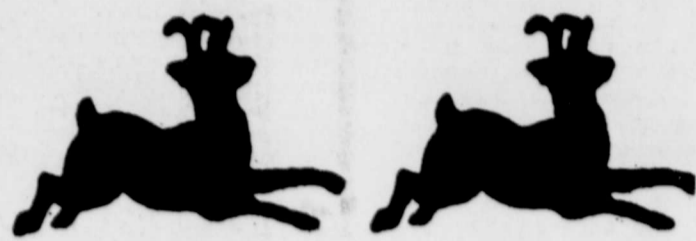

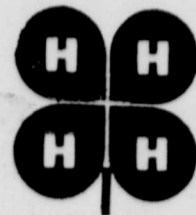

4-H NEWS ROUND-UP

With the upcoming County 4-H Food Show, to be held Feb. 17, many 4-H'ers in Hale County are busily working on Foods and Nutrition projects. About 15 foods and nutrition project leaders leading project groups and preparing their 4-H members to enter the Food Show.

The 4-H Foods and Nutrition project is an educational and interesting one, for both boys and girls. Planned projects available include "Exploring Foods the Picnic Way," "4-H Food and Fun," "Outdoor-Indoor Meals," and the "Wonder of Food." These projects start very simply for the younger 4-H'ers and get progressively more detailed for the older 4-H'ers. After a 4-H'er has completed these four projects, he may go into self-determined projects, which may be any area he wants to pursue concerning Foods & Nutrition. There are also several national Foods and Nutrition projects available, including "Tricks for Treats," "All American Foods," and "Meals For Today the Easy Way."

Each Food and Nutrition project is divided into six parts, which can be spread over six or more meetings as the leader decides. These six parts include the Milk group, Meat group, Fruit and Vegetable group, Bread and Cereal group, a meal which the 4-H'ers prepare together, and a sharing part, where the members share what they have learned with each other. The project leaders use various ways to teach the members about food and nutrition, including demonstrations, discussions, tours, films, preparation of foods, food science, written assignments, and various resource persons. County Extension Home Economics Agents train the leaders and serve as resource persons while the groups are meeting.

Also included as a possible part of a Foods and Nutrition project is the Foods and Nutrition "Let's Speak Out" method demonstration. 4-H'ers compete in method demonstration at county, district, and state 4-H Roundup. "Let's Speak Out" demonstration may be in any area of foods and nutrition, either a preparation demonstration or an illustrated talk. Not all 4-H'ers who carry Foods and Nutrition projects prepare a method demonstration in this area, but this is just another way for them to expand their knowledge of foods and nutrition.

The main objective of the 4-H Foods and Nutrition project is to help youth gain understanding of good nutrition and its effect on health; learn practical application of food science; and develop a knowledge of how to buy foods and how to play, prepare, and serve appetizing and nutritious meals to their family and friends. It is hoped that by educating the youth in these areas, many people will learn to enjoy and eat more nutritious foods.



New processing techniques hold the potential for expanding the use of "discount" cottons, according to the National Cotton Council.

Intensive research by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Southern Division at New Orleans, in house and under contract with the Texas Research Center, Lubbock, has developed methods of blending, processing, and producing textile products from these cottons.

The USDA points out that this has increased the demand for these lower quality cottons. As a result, the farmer benefits from receiving a higher price, and the textile industry and consumer get lower cost products.

According to the USDA, 25 per cent of the cotton crop falls into the category of "discount" cotton. This is cotton sold at reduced prices because it is too fine fibered, too coarse, or too short.
