BENN BROTHERS RECEIVE MASTER DEGREES FROM UT

AUSTIN, Texas (Sp.)--The University of Texas Graduate School of Business awarded master's degrees to 71 students at the end of the fall semester. The list includes 61 students who received Master of Business Administration degrees and 10 recipients of Master in Professional Accounting degrees. Of the total number, 53 were Texans and 18 were students from other states and foreign countries. The list of degree recipients includes two AHS graduates, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Owen Benn of Abernathy: Frederick Owen Benn, Jr., Master of Business Administration; Gary Benn: Master in Professional Accounting.

SCHOOL BOARD SETS DATES FOR EVENTS

Open house and visitation of the Abernathy Public Schools during Texas Public School week was set for March 9, 1973, from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. by the Board of Education meeting in regular session Monday, February 5, 1973. An invitation was extended to all patrons to visit the schools during Public Schools Week. Other activities during the week will be the local project show on March 5th and 6th and a track meet on March 10th. During the meeting, the board approved bills for the month, examined the tax collections report (96,548 collected) and studied the budget proposal. Reports were also presented on the enrollment which has declined thirty-five students since a comparable date in 1972; the health report and the students not in full compliance with the immunization laws were reviewed. The luncheon report indicated an average daily participation of 790 during the month of January.

The board studied various bills concerning education that have been presented to the legislature but did not take formal action to endorse or reject any of the proposed bills. In formal action, the board voted to intervene with the city in suits against delinquent taxpayers. The board also called for a school board election to be held April 7 in the City Hall.

WRITES HELD FOR MRS. JOHNSON

Mrs. Charlie M. Johnson, 63, of Wheatridge, Colo., a suburb of Denver, died of an apparent heart attack at her home the night of Feb. 7. Funeral rites and burial were conducted there Monday.

Charlie Johnson, longtime associate with a Galveston-based life insurance company, was in Galveston on business the night his wife died. He attempted to call his wife, and when there was no answer he became alarmed and called a neighbor in Wheatridge and asked that they check on Mrs. Johnson. They discovered her body in a sitting position in a chair in front of a television set that was still on. A doctor recently had prescribed medication for high blood pressure. Mrs. Johnson had a dose of the medication in one of her hands when the neighbors found her body.

In addition to her husband, other survivors include a son, Glenn, and daughter, Judy, both married and residents of Denver.

Mrs. Johnson, the former Ima Mae Stambaugh, was the last living member of a pioneer Abernathy family, the Vint Stambaugh family. Preceding her in death were her parents, and three brothers, Lewis of Abernathy, Oliver of San Antonio and Troy of Hereford. Three children of Mr. and Mrs. Johnson died in infancy.

Charlie and Ima Mae were graduated from Abernathy High School in 1928. They had been married about 40 years.

Hale County cotton producers and businessmen will elect a Businessman Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., at the 1:00 p.m. meeting on Monday, February 19, at the Hale County Agriculture Building, Plainview.

Announcement of the election comes from John McQuen of Plainview, current Hale County Businessman Director to the 25-county commodity organization, and Owen Benn of Abernathy, Producer Director.

Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman, usually a cotton grower as well, and the other a cotton producer. They serve two-year terms, with businessmen elected on odd years and producers on even years. Each is eligible for reelection every second year.

The election will be held following the lunch served in conjunction with the Hale County Soil Fertility Day which begins at 10:00 a.m.

McQuen and Benn said all interested parties are urged to attend, and that both farmers and businessmen are eligible to vote in the election.

In addition to the election, members of the PCG staff will be on hand to answer any questions concerning the organization's objectives. He added "Directors to PCG are the men who determine the organization's policies and actions on legislation, research, promotion, finances and other matters so vital to the cotton economy of Hale County, and all cotton people should make every effort to be on hand for this election."

Crop Insurance Deadline Feb. 23

COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS--Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation Contract Service Center in College Station, announced today that insured producers of 1972 cotton and grain sorghum who failed to produce the amount of production guaranteed under their Federal All-Risk Crop Insurance policy should file a Notice of Damage or Loss with the Federal Crop Insurance office for the county located at 1205 Texas Avenue, Room 214, Lubbock, Texas, not later than February 23, 1973.

"The policy provides that in order for an indemnity to be paid, the farm must be inspected by a FCIC adjuster and a claim form signed no later than 60 days after the end of the insurance period, which was December 31, 1972," Jordan said.
