### Bartlett On Dean's List At Sul Ross

ALPINE, Tex.---Over 300 students enrolled at Sul Ross State University during the fall semester qualified for the Dean's List, according to Dr. Delbert Dyke, vice-president for academic affairs.

The university vice-president said 304 students, about 11.5 percent of last semester's enrollment, earned grade point averages above 3.0 or "B" on a 4.0 scale.

He said 121 of the students on the honor list earned grade points better than 3.5, with 25 students completing the semester with 4.0, or an all "A" average.

Dr. Dyke explained only full-time students carrying at least 15 semester hour loads could qualify for the Dean's List. He also noted that in any semester no more than 15 percent of the total enrollment could be named to the Honor Roll.
