Gordon to Sponsor Indy Race Driver Appearance Here

FRED AGABASHIAN
... to Speak at School
April 16

The Champion Highway Safety Program which features nationally known race drivers, will be presented at Abernathy School April 16, 1973, at 10 a. m., by Fred Agabashian, 12-time competitor in the famed Indianapolis 500-mile race.

The program will be in the Abernathy School Auditorium. There will be no charge for admission, and the general public, along with students, invited to attend.

Arrangements for Mr. Agabashian's appearance here were made by Gordon Automotive of Abernathy.

In commenting on the program, Mr. Agabashian said, "On the race track or the highway, attitude is the biggest factor in safe driving. By keeping a car in good operating condition, being mentally alert and practicing common courtesy, all of which reflect the proper attitude, we could substantially reduce the annual traffic death toll."

Now in its 18th year, the program has been presented to over 14 million teen-agers throughout the U.S. in over 7,000 high schools. It has brought numerous awards to its national sponsor, Champion Spark Plug Company. Among these are three National Safety Council Public Service awards and the Alfred P. Sloan, Jr. Award for outstanding service to highway safety. Other citations have come from United States Auto Club, Continental Casualty Company and the Public Relations Society of America.

Mr. Agabashian of Alamogordo, Calif., one of the most talented and popular drivers in the history of the sport, in 1952 he earned the pole position at Indianapolis and subsequently led the race in the last diesel ever to compete there. Mr. Agabashian confines his activities to highway safety appearances. He is a member and president of the famed Champion 100 Mile-An-Hour Club, an exclusive organization of men who have completed the 500 miles at Indianapolis.

WINTER HOLDS GRIP ON AREA

Old Man Winter apparently has not looked at the calendar, which said Spring began March 20, and he refuses to release his grip on the area. A snow storm hit this area late Saturday, followed by high winds and record low temperatures in the mid to upper 20's (record lows for month of April). Mr. O. Hood, local weather observer, reported, "as of an inch of snowfall Saturday night."

The area has received a total of 5.14 inches of moisture this year, which will be ample for planting row crops when the soil temperature reaches, and holds, the magic 60 degrees plus. The moisture has given the wheat crop a big boost, but the extreme, unseasonable cold weather may have damaged wheat that had not been grazed down.

THOMPSON IS ELECTED LOCAL MAYOR

J. Pete Thompson, Abernathy businessman and farmer, Saturday was named Mayor of Abernathy, receiving 118 of the 226 votes cast in the annual city election. Joe Chambers, retiring City Alderman, received 100 votes for Mayor, and there were three write-in votes for L. G. Deering, who was not a candidate for reelection as mayor.

In addition to a new mayor, Abernathy City Council also will have two new Aldermen. They are Bobby Cunningham, who topped the ballot with 150 votes, and C. L. (Cliff) Newton, local radio and television sales and service firm operator, who drew 71 votes. Cunningham is in partnership with John Freeman in operation of the retail and wholesale Phillips 66 firms here.

Others on the ballot for Alderman positions were Charles Hubbard, 69 votes; Sammy Hunsley, 59 votes; Ralph Hanes, 37 votes, and Harold Thompson, 28 votes. Harold Thompson published a statement of his desire to withdraw from the city race in the two issues of The Review prior to the election.

Lee Echols was the other Alderman whose term expired this year. He was not a candidate for re-election.

Holdover Aldermen are Billy Shipman, Morris Stevens and J. L. Miller, Jr.

The election was held in city hall, with Edwin Crow as election judge.

ND VOTERS NAME CITY OFFICIALS

Results of voting in the New Deal City election Saturday: Roy West received 65 votes for the office of Mayor. He had been the place 5 Council member. No other name was on the ballot for the office of Mayor. Billy Follenberry, who was not a candidate for reelection as Mayor, received eleven write-in votes for that office Saturday.

Five Councilmen were elected. They are: Floyd Teeter, 78 votes; P. W. Clayton, 56; Fred Harkey, 72; Antonio Gonzales, 43; and Archie Acker, 74 votes.

Others receiving votes for council positions were Grady Henly, 21 votes, and Phyllis Rowland, 36.

There were 82 ballots marked in the election.

ND SCHOOL INCUMBENTS RE-ELECTED

Paul Crosnoe, Jr., with 97 votes, and William B. Agnew with 100 votes, both incumbents, were re-elected trustees on the New Deal School Board of Education Saturday.

Mrs. Ollie Martin received 49 votes in the school election to name two trustees.

Two other names were on the ballot; Ralph Wolf, 129 votes, and Mrs. Mayo Loper, 66 votes.

SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS MEETING

The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on April 2, 1973, at 7:30 p. m. in the board room of the high school.

Regular items on the agenda were: (1) tax collection report indicating 97.92% of the current tax roll collected, (2) the budget progress report for 7/12 of the year was presented, and (3) the enrollment report revealing 1,097 regular students, excluding kindergarten and early childhood classes, as being enrolled at the end of March, (4) an average of 759 students per day were served in the school cafeteria as shown on the monthly report.

June 5th was set as the date for the meeting of the Board of Equalization of the Abernathy Independent School District, Membership of the board will be announced at a later date.

Other items discussed were: the AASA meeting in San Francisco, (2) the implementation of the Rodriguez decision on the local school district and (3) the board voted to participate in the regular school board workshop on April 25th in Lubbock.

Highway Dept. Hearing Set Here June 1

The Texas Highway Department plans to hold a combined corridor and design hearing June 1, at 7:30 p. m. in Abernathy School auditorium.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss the route and design of Interstate 27 when it is constructed to exact Interstate Highway specifications. U.S. Highway 87 through Abernathy now has the Interstate 27 designation, but it does not at this time conform to true Interstate Highway specifications.

Community Action Grant Received In Hale County

Governor Dolph Briscoe today announced his approval of a community action grant of \$24,138 in new federal funds to Central Plains Community Action Agency in Plainview for continuing operation of the agency's on-going General Community Programming program for six months, effective May 1, 1973.

Funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, the grant is a phase-out grant terminating Oct. 31, 1973.

Funds will be used to continue the administration of the agency's antipoverty programs during the six-month phase-out period.

LOCAL COMMUNITY CENTER RECEIVES BOOST

The local Community Action Center, feeling the effect of the government's cut back on spending, has received a push in the right direction. Governor Briscoe has appropriated the sum of \$24,138 to fund the next six months from May 1 to October 1, 1973.

These funds couldn't have come at a better time. The CEO had phased out the entire program effective March 31, 1973. But, through the patience and determination of the local and district members, things have been extended until October of 1973.

The Abernathy Center has become a productive and useful addition to the city. A great deal of pressure has been taken away from City Hall and the local police department.

The people have found a place for their trouble and needs and depend on the Center to provide these services and to promote a feeling of unity throughout the people of Abernathy.

The local Center has six months extra to try and survive. Maybe the government will reopen all funds by Oct. 1, 1973; if not, it will be up to the people to see that this important local agency survives. The Center needs the support of everyone more than ever. After all, it is the people of Abernathy that make things possible. Let's all get behind the Center and make it a permanent fixture in the future, regardless of the financial outcome in October.

The Club made \$181 from the Circus. The money will be used for a worthwhile project.

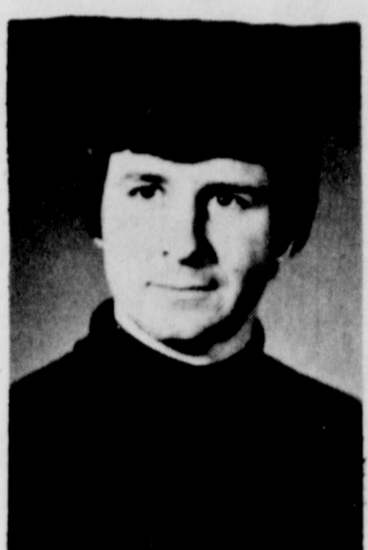

**Free Glaucoma
Screening Set
For April 24**

A FREE Glaucoma Screening will be held at the Plainview High School Cafeteria, 1500 Smyth Street, Plainview, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., Tuesday evening, April 24, 1973, in an attempt to track down unknown cases of Glaucoma, a blinding eye disease. The free tests screening program is open to all residents of Plainview and surrounding areas, thirty-five years of age and over. It will be sponsored by the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness and the Plainview Noon Lions Club in cooperation with Members of the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe Counties Medical Society. The program has been approved by the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe Counties Medical Society and the Plainview-Hale County Board of Health.

Serving as volunteers in the program will be Members of the Plainview Noon Lions Club and their wives; Nurses from the Nursing Staff, Central Plains General Hospital, Plainview Clinical Nurses, Plainview Public School Nurses, Plainview-Hale County Health Nurses and the Hale County Licensed Vocational Nurses Association. The test, which is simple and painless, will be administered as a public service by medical doctors, Members of the Hale-Floyd-Briscoe Counties Medical Society.

Just what is Glaucoma? It is the leading cause of permanent blindness in the nation, according to the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness. Glaucoma is a disease where damage cannot be undone once it progresses to a point of impairing vision. There is, however, effective

treatment to arrest the disease, in most cases, if detected early, and sight can be saved.

Early detection of this insidious disease is the main purpose of a Glaucoma Screening such as the one scheduled Tuesday evening, April 24, 1973.

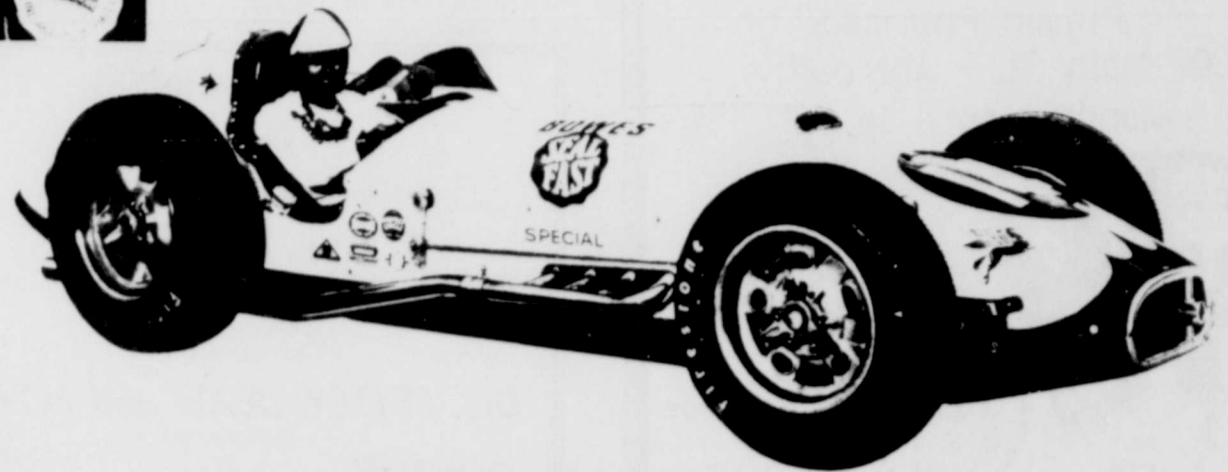

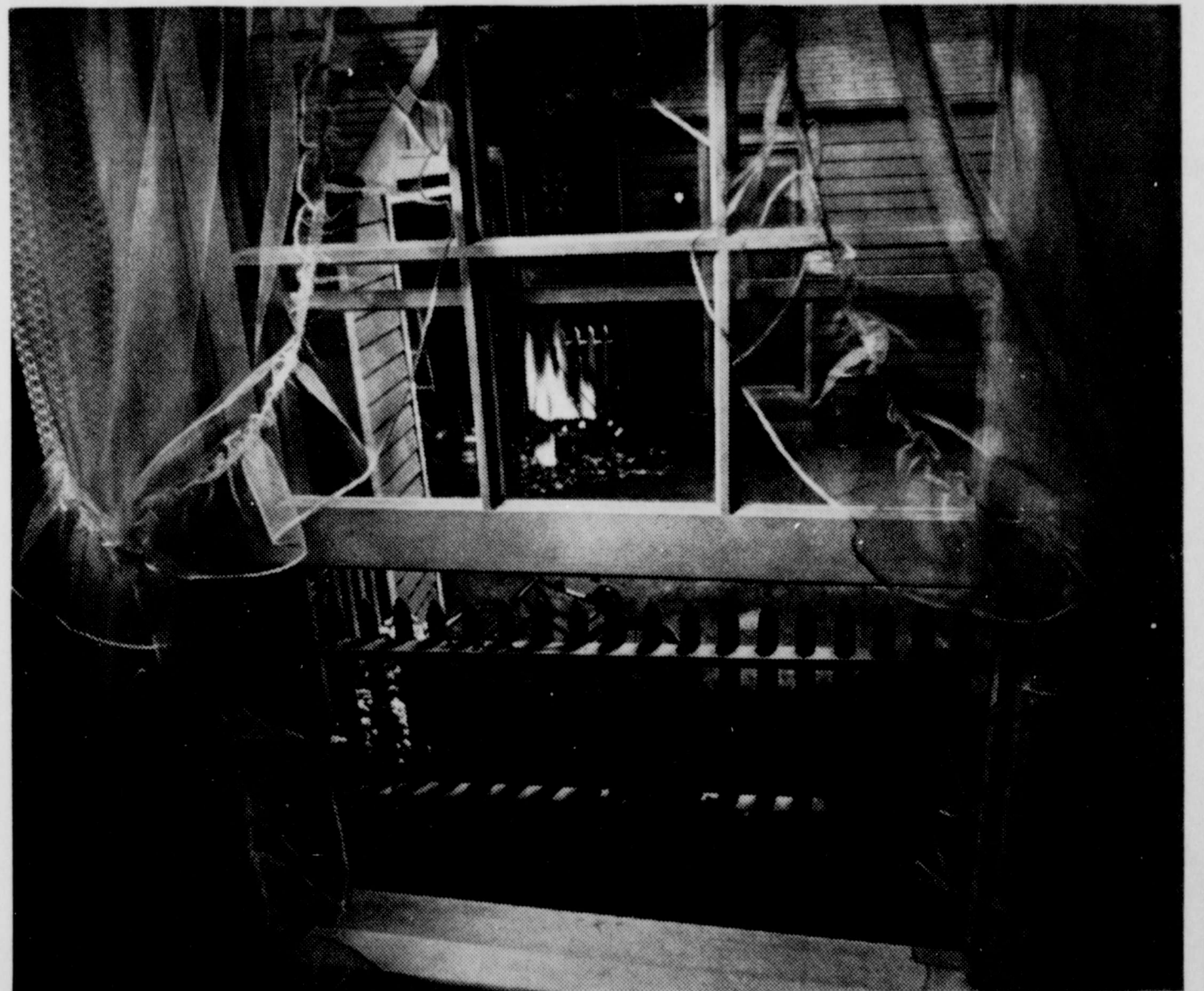
