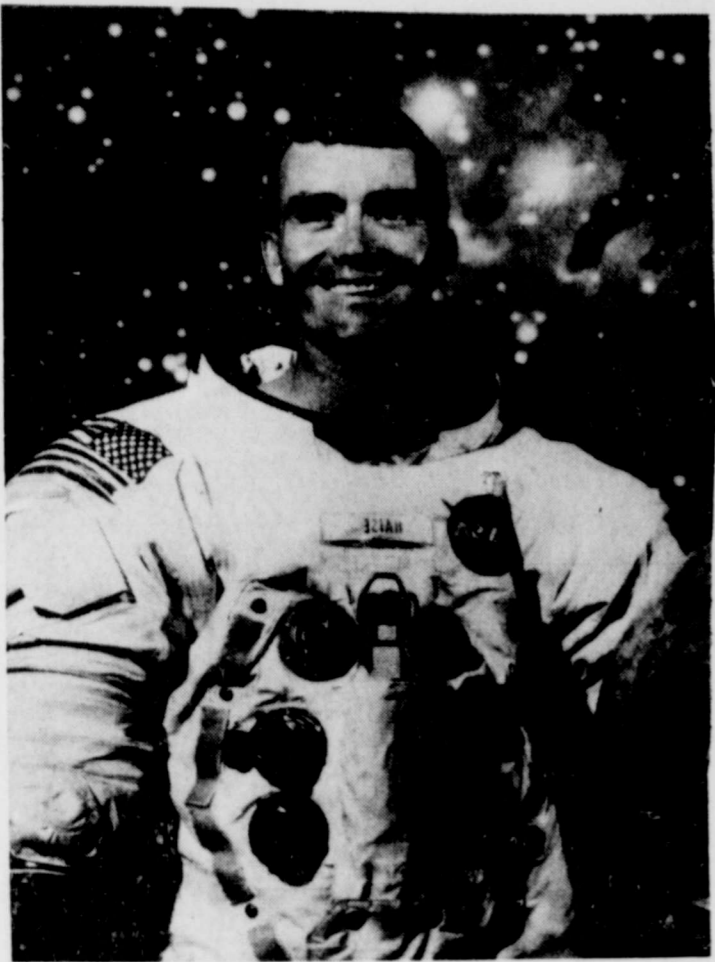


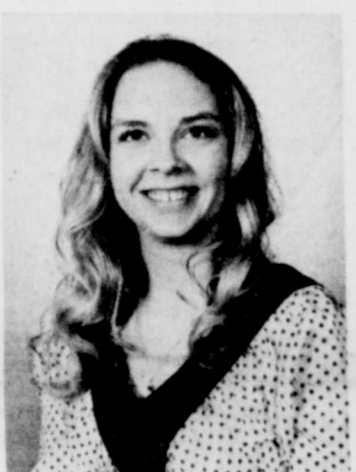

## ASTRONAUT Haise WILL SPEAK HERE AT C-C BANQUET

The Abernathy Chamber of Commerce announces two changes regarding the Annual Banquet to be held at Abernathy School Cafeteria, The date has been changed to Saturday night, May 5, and there has been a change in the Astronaut speaker for the occasion, Originally, Col. James Irwin, who was one of the moon visitors of Apollo 15, was to have been the banquet speaker. He suffered a heart attack earlier this month and will not be able to fill speaking engagements for at least six months. In his place here will be Astronaut Haise, who will be the speaker May 5.

NASA Astronaut, Mr. Fred W. Haise, Jr., is a native of Biloxi, Mississippi, where he graduated from high school. He later attended the University of Oklahoma where he was awarded a degree in Aeronautical Engineering with highest honors. His military career began in 1952 as a Naval Aviation Cadet and has extended over a long and colorful career in which he has accumulated over 7,000 hours of flying time, including over 4,000 hours in jets.

Mr. Haise is one of the 19 astronauts selected by NASA in April 1966. He was lunar module pilot for Apollo 13 in April 1970 and with his fellow crewmen James A. Lovell and John L. Swigert, experienced the explosion of their oxygen system and miraculously converted a tragedy into a mission of safety and survival.

## City Council Meeting Report

Abernathy's City Council met in regular session April 9, 1973, at the City Hall. The results of the Municipal election were canvassed and the following candidates were declared elected: J. Pete Thompson, Mayor; Bobby Cunningham, Alderman; and Clifton Newton, Alderman. Judge Delbert Beaton gave the Oath of Office to the newly elected officials for the City of Abernathy. The Council elected Billy Shipman to serve as Mayor Pro-tem.

Don Crow's Chevrolet was awarded the bid for one new police car. The new unit will be received in five to six weeks.

United States Postal Service exercised their option to renew the Post Office facilities for a five year period. The lease will expire May 30, 1979, and the annual rate to be paid is \$4,188.

The City Council received notification from South Plains Electric Cooperative that rate increases will become effective with the March 31, 1973, statements on most consumers. Abernathy's water well field receives electricity from the South Plains system; but, according to South Plains officials, there will be no rate increase for municipal water supplies. However, an increase in the minimum bill was made from \$1.75 per month to \$2.40 and the fuel cost adjustment charges by Southwestern Public Service Company will be passed on to the consumers in the same amount that it affects the cost per KWH delivered.

The Council took no action on the rate increase by South Plains Electric Cooperative, thus, allowing the rates to become effective with the March 31 statements.

A progress report was given by the City Manager concerning the paving program underway in Abernathy. The areas petitioned for paving are under study by Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Consulting Engineers of Lubbock, to work up a cost estimate regarding the new paving and seal-coating program. Upon receiving this information it will be made public to those who have expressed interest in paving. Bid specifications will be completed and bids let to paving contractors.

Board of Equalization members were appointed. They are Don McKenzie, Ralph Wolf, Harold Thompson and Leland Phillips, alternate.

Mr. C. P. Beard was appointed to serve as City Recorder for a two year term.

The City received its Revenue Sharing check for the first three months of 1973 in the amount of \$8,230 which is an increase of \$1,537 over the same period of 1972. The reason for the increase is because Congress appropriated this slightly more money for this entitlement period. Final Regulations for handling of General Revenue Sharing Funds will be received soon, according to the Office of the Secretary of the Treasury.

The Texas Department of Public Safety recommendations for updating Abernathy's warning system were reviewed by the council. It was the council's decision to file an updated warning plan for approval of matching state funds. If funds are available and the plan is approved by the Texas Department of Public Safety, then the system will be updated in the near future.

A request by O. L. Brownlow for water services outside the City Limits was denied.

The meeting was adjourned.

## CITY SALES TAX REPORT

City Sales Tax Collections for 1972 were down as compared to collections for 1971, according to City Manager Glen Metcalf. The 1% Local Sales Tax checks are received quarterly from the Comptroller of Public Accounts for the State of Texas. The following is a comparison of local sales tax collections for the calendar years 1971 and 1972.

## 2 Die; Damage Is High In Tornado At Plainview

The killer tornado that struck in Plainview's west, northwest sections early Sunday morning demolished houses of former Abernathians. The home of the Forrest Miceys, and Mr. and Mrs. Joe King's home were demolished. Mrs. Mickey is the former Maylene Parish, who grew up in Abernathy. Mr. and Mrs. King resided in Abernathy several years ago. Mrs. King taught in Abernathy Schools and Mr. King was a student at Texas Tech at that time.

Two persons were killed in the tornado. They were Kevin Lewellen, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Lewellen, 213 Dallas, in Plainview, and David C. Bryant.

David C. Bryant was news editor of the Plainview Daily Herald. He was killed in the line of duty, both as a newsman and as a member of the CB radio group that is on watch when storms are in the area. His wife, with him when the twister hit their camper-pickup rig, was seriously injured. Nine or more persons were admitted to the Plainview hospital for treatment of storm injuries. Also, some were admitted for treatment of heart attacks suffered in the excitement of the storm.

By UIL standards, any band receiving a Division-I is classified as a "Superior" rating.

Comments by the judges include such quotes as "very attractive looking group... fine style and very rich sounds on this fine march... band has beautiful sound and really articulates these numbers... Enjoyed it... band plays with restraint and articulates very nicely the spots that are most often rushed and hurried over... nice clean restatement of opening theme... very good balanced and controlled sound throughout... many fine aspects about this band... I enjoyed it very much... Congrats."

The sight-reading judge, Mr. Homer Anderson of San Angelo, had the following comments: "Atta boy, band! Very nice play--a very minor secretion, but band played very well... One or two wrong notes, but over all, very interesting and enjoyable. Yeah!! Style Yeah!! Dynamics."

As a result of the Antelope Band receiving both a first division in concert playing and sight-reading, they qualify to enter the Buccaneer Music Festival Illuminated Parade at Corpus Christi, Texas, May 5. The parade will be held in downtown Corpus at night with much special lighting to enhance the beauty of the parade itself. The parade will route for approximately five miles.

Several parents followed the Antelope Band to Seagraves in support of the Abernathy students. The band is grateful to these parents and interested persons. A great feeling of pride is felt knowing an enthusiastic group is in support at a band competition.

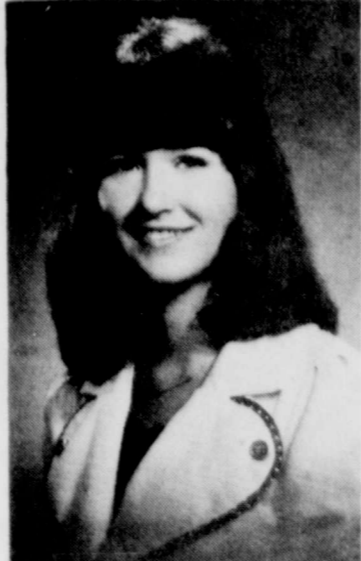
Mrs. Lacy displayed two tiny kittens used to decorate refrigerators and a very beautiful dried floral arrangement in a domed glass butter dish.

### SUMMER-TIME SAVOR RECIPE No. 2

**Apricot-Stuffed Pork Chops**

6 pork rib chops, cut 1 inch thick      2 tablespoons cooking oil  
1 can (17 oz.) apricot halves      1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/2 cup catsup      1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
2 tablespoons chopped onion

Cut pocket in each chop, cutting from fat side almost to bone edge. Drain apricots, reserving 1/2 cup syrup. Put two apricot halves in pocket of each chop. Cut up remaining apricots. Grill chops over medium heat 35 minutes, turning once. Meanwhile, in saucepan, combine catsup, onion, oil, lemon juice, dry mustard, reserved apricot juice and cut-up apricots. Simmer 15 minutes. Cook chops 5 minutes more, brushing often with sauce. Makes 6 servings.

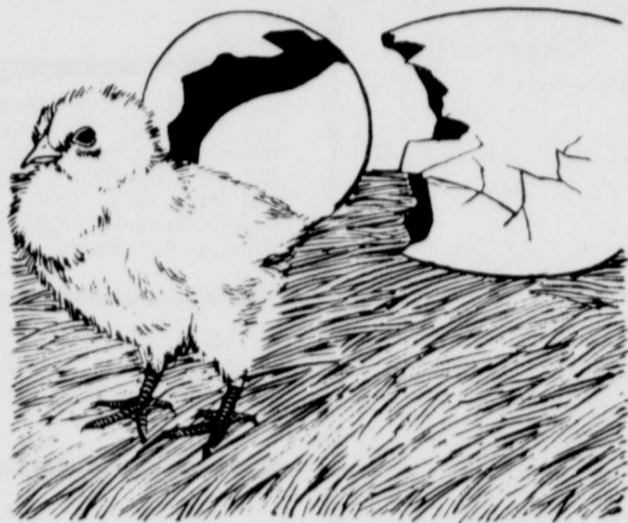

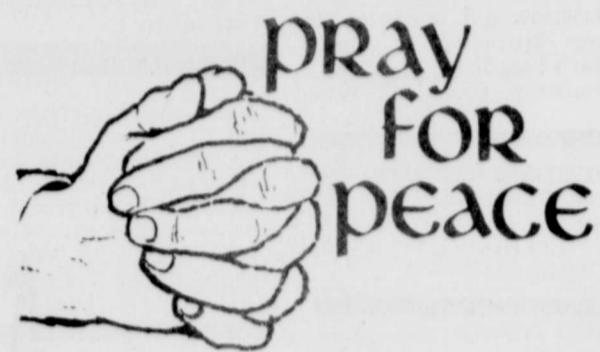

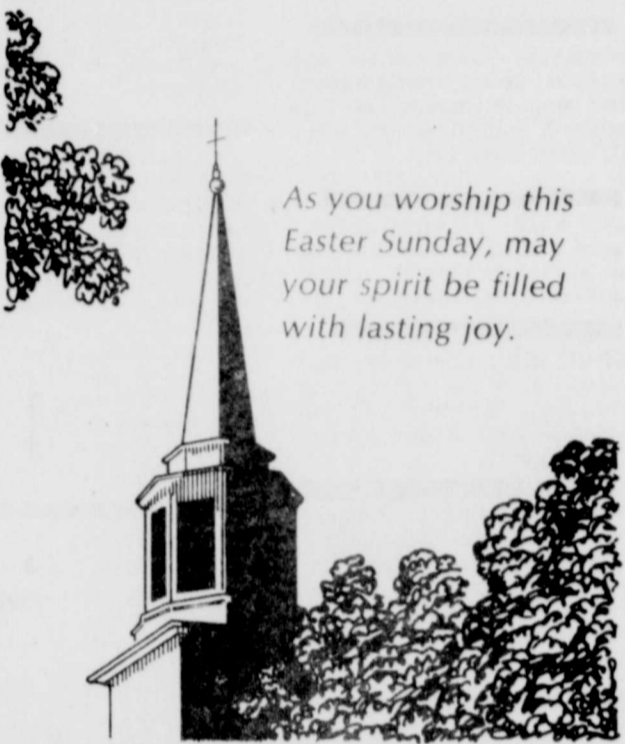

## Free Glaucoma Screening Set For April 24

"More than one million Americans, thirty-five years of age and older, have Glaucoma and half of them don't know they have this eye disease, which may result in blindness unless it is diagnosed early and treated continuously," says the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.
