This First Place Rating can be added to the First Division Ratings and Superior Ratings earned by the AHS Antelope Band in sight reading and concert playing in the UIL contest held last month in Seagraves. Another honor earned by the AHS Antelope band this school year was First Place in marching in the parade that opened the Panhandle South Plains Fair in Lubbock last September.

The band charter buses arrived in Abernathy late Sunday night (or early Monday morning) to a Victors' Welcome by a large crowd of people, fire, truck and police car parked in South Abernathy. The band and welcoming party were escorted to the band hall by the police car fire truck,

Astronaut-Pilot Talks In Abernathy Fete

ABERNATHY — A little moonbound swept through Abernathy Saturday with the appearance of Apollo 13 astronaut Fred W. Haise Jr. at the annual Abernathy Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Haise, who made a brief speech and gave an informal "home-movie" type narration of a NASA film of moonlandings of various flights, began his talk with regret that astronaut James Irwin had been unable to keep the banquet date due to a recent heart attack.

And although he said his moon-landing experience did not provide him with the same religious experience expressed by Irwin, Haise said due to mechanical problems aboard Apollo 13 his faith had been strengthened.

Recalling the explosion of the oxygen tank which occurred just 55 hours into the flight, he said the crew was left with only a fraction of the oxygen they needed for the landing — still 24 hours away — and to preserve energy they went without lights and heat.

"Exceeding power limits" he said he was brought face-to-face with the power of prayer offered by millions of people on the earth below, and the expertise and talents of the technicians and scientists of NASA.

"Prayers were obviously answered," he said, "for I would not be with you tonight."

Jumping down from the stage, Haise, with his boyish expression and mild humor, narrated a NASA-produced film of the moon-landings.

Describing the movement of the earth up over the moon's horizon as an "earth rise" and talking about a "half-earth" and "full-earth" Haise added personal details to scenes familiar from television broadcasts of the Apollo missions.

In keeping with the space theme, banquet tables were lined with aluminum strips containing dark "moon rocks" implanted with plastic astronauts and tiny American flags which picked up the red, white and blue color motif of the decorations, looping streamers and wall decorations.

Dan Ward, former mayor and retired businessman was introduced in a humorous speech as outstanding citizen of the year.

"An occasion such as this leaves one speechless," Ward said in accepting the honor. "I'm sure there are many of you more deserving than I. But thank you very much."

Also, new chamber of commerce officers were announced. They include Leland Phillips, president; Dan Ryan, vice president; and Lynn Metcalf, secretary.

Hale County-Wide Storm Warning System Is Proposed

HALE COUNTY OFFERS TENTATIVE COUNTY WIDE CIVIL DEFENSE PLAN:
Hale County presently is considering the possibility of forming a county wide civil defense system.

The basic plan would revolve around the establishment of a weather warning radio system centered around a 250 watt transmitter operated by the Hale County Sheriff's Office. This would be used exclusively for the dissemination of weather information on a county wide basis (or on a local basis as weather conditions dictated).

Any individual in the county desiring to participate would simply tune into the frequency for weather information. This is a contingent plan based upon the total number of persons within the county interested in such a program. In order to determine the probable number of people interest in such a system a survey is being made. If you should be interested in this, write to Sheriff Charles Tue, Hale County Sheriff's Office, 501 Ash St., Plainview, Texas for further information.

Should a sufficient number of people in the Abernathy area express interest in such a program a local meeting with local civil defense units will be scheduled with the public invited. At such time as the meeting is held full details on the system will be presented.
