## Pilot Is Injured In Crash

Willie D. Hall, 48, Abernathy, a custom spraying pilot, was undergoing emergency treatment at 11:30 a.m. today in a Lubbock hospital for injuries received when his spray plane hit a telephone line about five miles west of Plainview and crashed.

The crash occurred in a corn field on the J. L. Johnson farm. The wreckage was hidden from view by the corn. Hale County Sheriff Charles Tue said the pilot was lucky someone observed the accident. "Otherwise, he could have stayed in the field for some time," W.A. Marshall Jr., Otton Rt., observed the plane going down and notified authorities about 8:30 a.m.

The man received a compound fracture of the left arm, a fractured left leg and rib cage, lacerations and possible internal injuries. He was taken to Lubbock by Barrett Ambulance Service.

His condition is termed critical. Tue said Hall was spraying a nearby field and was attempting to fly beneath electrical utility lines on a joint use pole. "He probably didn't even see the telephone lines a little more than a foot below the electrical lines," Tue said.

Hall was found several feet from the craft, indicating that he might have been thrown out. "He was conscious when we got to him," Tue noted.

Reports early this weeksaid Hall's condition remains critical.

## Elementary Registration Is Scheduled

Jerry Moorhead, principal of Abernathy Elementary School, announced that students will register for the 1973-1974 school year Tuesday, August 21, from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. After registering that day, students will be free to leave. The new school term starts Wednesday morning, August 22, at 8:45 a.m.

Mr. Moorhead gave the following places of registration by grades:

First grade students will register in Rooms 21 and 23 in the elementary school building. They must be six years of age on or before September 1, 1973, and must have a certified birth certificate. Certificates issued by the hospital where the child was born and baptismal certificates cannot be accepted. Neither is an official certificate of proof of age.

You may obtain a certified birth certificate for your child at the court house in the county where the child was born. Exception is Lubbock County.

Certified birth certificates for those born in Lubbock County may be obtained from the vital statistics office located in the brick building north of the Ramada Inn as you go into Lubbock on Ave. Q, in North Lubbock.

Second grade students will register in Rooms 16 and 17. Third graders will register in Rooms 10 and 11.

Fourth grade registration will be in Rooms 5 and 6. Those in the fifth grade will register in Rooms 1 and 2.

Kindergarten students register in Room 24 of the Elementary School Building.

**NEW PROGRAM FOR FOUR YEAR OLD PRE-KINDERGARTEN CHILDREN ENTERS SECOND YEAR**

Is your four year old child eligible for public school attendance? If your child is four years of age on or before September 1, 1973, and if you have moved into the Abernathy school district since August 21, 1972, and if you are employed in agriculture or related food processing, then your four year old is eligible to enroll in the Communicative Arts Program.

Your four year old is also eligible if you leave the Abernathy school district and work in another district even if it's for a day, week, or month. The parents of many eligible students own their own homes here, but move to other places during the summer in order to work in agriculture or related areas -- such as the harvesting of onions, other vegetables, and cotton, grain, or wheat. We plan to operate two pre-kindergarten units for the coming school year provided that we have enough eligible students. The minimum number is fifteen for each class. If you are eligible or if you know anyone else who is eligible and who is interested in their four year old children entering pre-kindergarten, please have them contact the school office as soon as possible and pre-register. You may call or come by the business office any time. The phone number is 298-2566. The director is Charles Bowen.

**NAME CHANGE FOR EXISTING PROGRAM**

The Migrant Education Program operated in the Abernathy Public Schools for the past five years will now be known as the Communicative Arts Program of the Abernathy Public Schools. Any student, regardless of race, is eligible if his parents or guardian have moved into this school district since last August 21, 1972, for the purpose of employment in agriculture or related agriculture jobs, or in food processing or related food processing such as cattle feedlots, sausage factories, tortilla processing, vegetable marketing, hide tanning, animal rendering plant work, or others. During the school year 72-73, 288 students were served in this program. We anticipate some 300 students for the 73-74 school year. The primary purpose or goal of the Communicative Arts Program is to assist students with the communication skills such as reading, writing, English, language arts, spelling, and speech. Other areas taught are mathematics, science, social studies, career education, and oral language development. This is in addition to all of the regular scheduled curriculum. ## Tech Textile Center To Rank As First In U.S. To Produce Twistless Yarn

Twistless yarn, the product of a new yarn making technique that bonds the fibers together with a water soluble adhesive rather than by twisting in the conventional spinning process, will soon be produced in the Textile Research Center (TRC) at Texas Tech University.

The research project is designed to determine how Texas natural fibers respond to the "twistless" process and is being sponsored by the Textile Investment Group of Texas (TIGOT), a group of 12 South Plains farmers and businessmen interested in developing the textile industry in this area.

The twistless process was developed in Holland and an international patent and licensing authority is now owned by a group of Dutch textile interests. TIGOT has obtained exclusive marketing and development rights in the United States. The yarn Manufacturing units that are to be located at the Textile Research Center will be the first to enter the U.S. and are expected to reach Lubbock in late August. An additional three units will be arriving approximately two months later.

**Owned By TIGOT**  
The units will be owned by TIGOT and all research costs will be paid by the investment group. All research results will be privileged information belonging to the project sponsor.

Should the TRC develop patentable processes for fabric structuring, or chemical finishing of twistless yarn, the Research Center will share in the benefits. While original investigations are for research in yarn manufacturing, it is anticipated that additional studies will be made into all phases of textile utilization.

The work at TRC will be under the direction of A. A. "Tony" Ball, head of the structures laboratory. Ball currently is in Holland studying process-

ing techniques and operation of the new equipment. Texas cotton was shipped to the Hollanderage plant earlier so that it would be available for Ball's use.

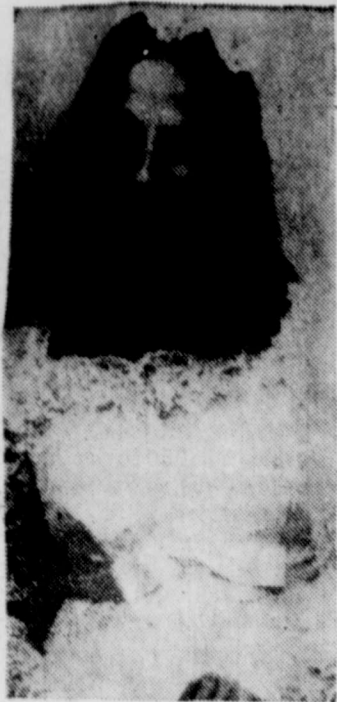

## HALE WELLS PRODUCE OVER \$16 MILLION

Reports said some 60 more wells are to be drilled in the Anton-Irish Field, starting this year.

The petroleum industry in Lubbock County also played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Lubbock County, too, was one of 190 of Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

The county ranked 149th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, \$2.6 million. The sale of crude oil brought almost of that total.

The petroleum industry in Hale County played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Hale was one of 190 of Tex-

as' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Hale County ranked 78th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, nearly \$16.7 million. The sale of crude oil brought \$16 million; natural gas \$674,000.

The major production area is the Anton-Irish Oil Field at County Line in Southwest Hale County.
