

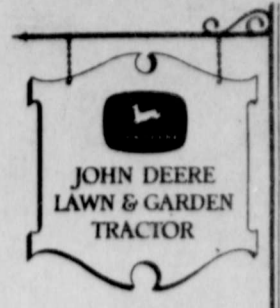

## Music Center Dedication Is Scheduled At Wayland

PLAINVIEW, TEXAS, Special:-- The long delayed dedication of Herral Music Center at Wayland Baptist College is now set for Sunday afternoon, Aug. 5, at 3 p. m. in Herral Recital Hall.

The dedication, originally scheduled for April 27, was postponed due to illness of the donor, Mrs. Charles K. Hines of Eugene, Ore., the former Mrs. Billie Herral of Abernathy.

Featured dedicatory speaker for the occasion will be Sam Prestidge, secretary in the Church Music Department of Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Activities will get underway with a prelude played by Earl W. Miller, assistant professor of music at Wayland, and introductions by Joe P. Wood, vice president of the college. Dr. Bob Franklin, associate professor of music and head of the department of music, will lead congregational singing.

A history of the Wayland department of music will be given by Mrs. Maudell Meredith, assistant professor of music, and Miller. Mrs. Meredith joined the Wayland department in 1953 and Miller came in 1957.

The history of the Herral Music Center will be given by Dr. W. Neil Record, pastor of First Baptist Church, Lockney. Dr. Record served as assistant to the president at Wayland from 1962-1970 and worked with Mrs. Hines on the planning of the building.

Special music, "All the Way My Saviour Leads Me," will be sung by Ric Hunt and Wayne Miller, both 1973 graduates of Wayland. Hunt is minister of music at First Baptist Church, Floydada, and Miller has been employed as choral director at Plainview High School.

Prestidge will deliver the dedicatory address just prior to the ritual of dedication led by Dr. Roy C. McClung, president of the college.

Ed Wittner, tenor soloist and minister of music at Plainview's First Baptist Church, will sing "How Lovely Are Thy Dwelling..." following the dedicatory ritual.

The prayer of dedication will be offered by Charles K. Hines, husband of the donor. Mark Pair, assistant professor of music, will play selections by Haydn.

Expressions of love and gratitude will be made to Mrs. Hines just before she leads in the dedication of the band hall to the memory of Michael Lonnie Miller, formerly of Abernathy. Before his untimely death, Miller was a young friend and neighbor of Mrs. Hines.

Benediction will be lead by Rev. Murry Brewer, pastor of First Baptist Church, Abernathy. Earl Miller will play the prelude.

## BUSINESS TO ROLL AUGUST 22

H. V. Gallaway, bus foreman, said eight school buses will be ready to roll on that many routes the morning of August 22, the first day of school in Abernathy. In addition to the eight route buses, the school has three spare school buses for travel emergencies and for route to ball games, etc. The fleet has one new bus this year, a 54-passenger International.

Mr. Gallaway joins school officials in seeking motorists' cooperation in regard to safety of children required by state law to come to a complete stop when following or meeting a school bus stopped to take-on or discharge passengers. Mr. Gallaway has been Abernathy school bus foreman starting his 12th year. He was bus foreman at New Deal School seven years before coming here. He was with the Gustine School six years before going to New Deal.

Mary is a 1970 graduate of Abernathy High School. She has been a student at McMurry College for three years and is presently enrolled at Texas Tech University.

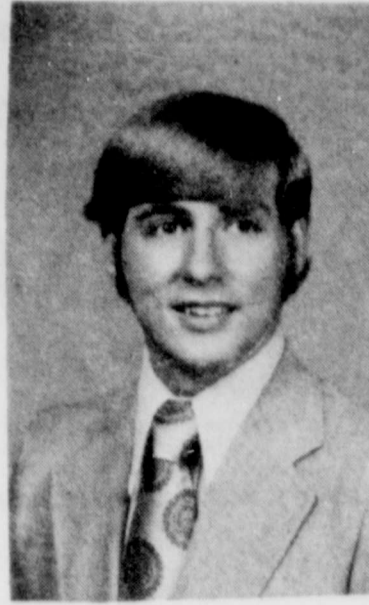
Jack is a 1969 graduate of

### Danger!! Area Corn Is Sprayed

Mouth-watering ears of ripening corn are tempting the palates of area folks but persons are warned to leave the golden ears alone. Most corn patches have been sprayed with pesticides and are unsafe for human or animal consumption.

Pesticides used to spray the corn which is being grown as a grain crop render the food and fodder unsafe for a period up to 40 days which will, of course, extend past the mature "roasting ear" stage.

Persons should not follow the years-old custom of "helping themselves to a mess of corn" without checking with owners to see if the corn patch has been sprayed.

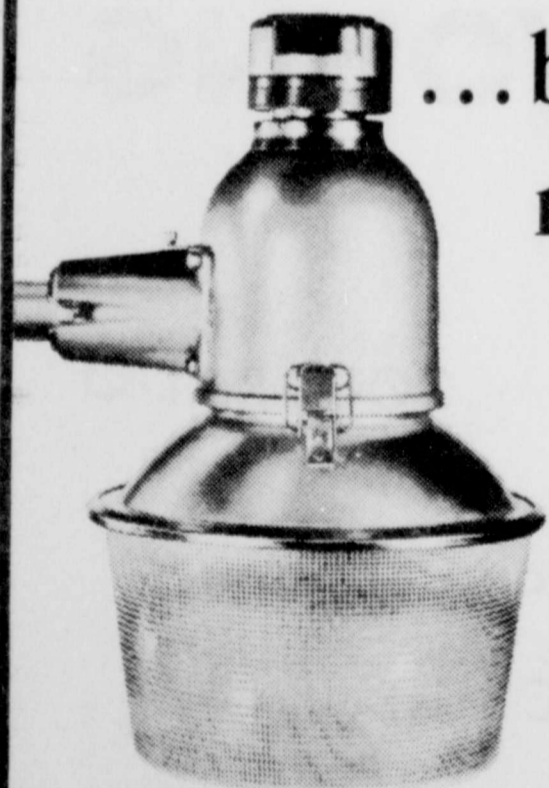

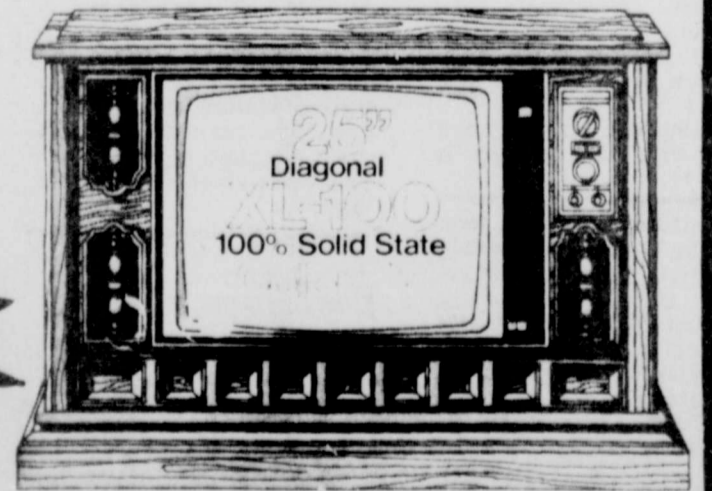

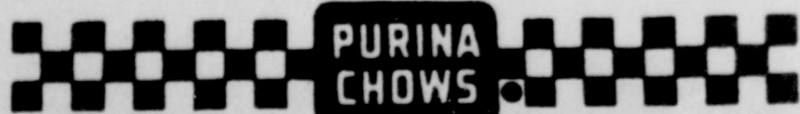
