Elementary Registration Is Scheduled

Jerry Moorhead, principal of Abernathy Elementary School, announced that students will register for the 1973-1974 school year Tuesday, August 21 from 9 a. m. to 11 a. m. After registering that day, students will be free to leave. The new school term starts Wednesday morning, August 22, at 8:45 a. m.

Mr. Moorhead gave the following places of registration by grades:

First grade students will register in Rooms 21 and 23 in the elementary school building. They must be six years of age on or before September 1, 1973, and must have a certified birth certificate. Certificates issued by the hospital where the child was born and baptismal certificates cannot be accepted. Neither is an official certificate of proof of age.

You may obtain a certified birth certificate for your child at the county clerk's office in the county house in the county where the child was born. Exception is Lubbock County. Certified birth certificates for those born in Lubbock County may be obtained from the vital statistics office located in the brick building north of the Ramada Inn as you go into Lubbock on Ave. Q, in North Lubbock.

Second grade students will register in Rooms 16 and 17. Third graders will register in Rooms 10 and 11.

Fourth grade registration will be in Rooms 5 and 6. Those in the fifth grade will register in Rooms 1 and 2. Kindergarten students register in Room 24 of the Elementary School Building.

Upon completion of the necessary legal requirements of the assessment program the improvements will begin approximately 30 days.

Hale County's newly organized and coached 4-H Club Horse and Pony Drill Team participated in the State Contest at Odessa, August 1.

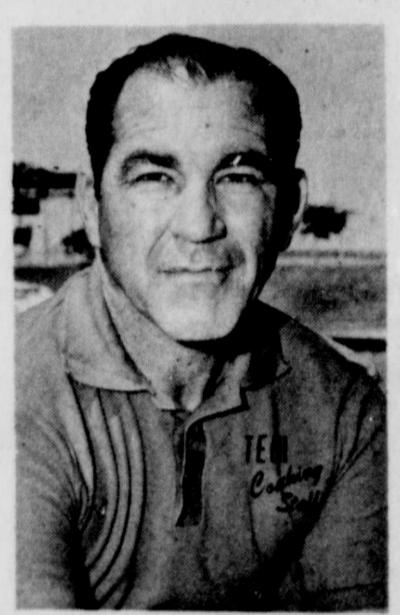
This team, coached by Mrs. Nancy Ethridge of Plainview, placed sixth, receiving a trophy for the team and each team member received a ribbon.

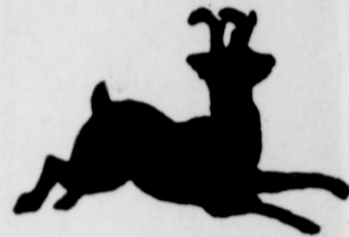

SET ASIDE ACRES ELIMINATED

Plant nutrient levels low

In order to assure adequate supplies for domestic and export markets, the Secretary of Agriculture has announced that there will be no government set-aside of land for 1974. The effect of this announcement will be to free farmers to go all-out to produce feed grains, beans, wheat and cotton. The announcement will also encourage farmers to begin making plans for 1974 crops.

This past season's bumper crop of wheat may have depleted plant nutrient levels to the point where proper fertilization for the 1973-74 season deserves special attention. This advice comes from Jim Valentine, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension service in Lubbock.

Dear Mr. Editor: I would like to enlist your paper's aid in informing the farmers and oil field operators in your area of a portion of the Texas Clean Air Act that has a direct impact on them.

It is a violation of the laws concerning air pollution control to burn off grain fields, paraffin, or oil pits.

There are cases where an exception can be made for unusual circumstances or emergencies. Examples are infestations of some type or an oil spill that is creating a hazard.

A person that feels he has grounds for an exception should contact the regional office, Texas Air Pollution Control Services, 1906 Fourth Street, Lubbock, Texas 79415, phone number 744-0090.

The Texas Highway Department is developing a four-lane divided highway from 27 from 1st Street north to the north side of the city of Abernathy. This project will be financed by the Federal Highway Administration and the State of Texas.
