AIR SHOW SET IN PLAINVIEW SEPTEMBER 9

World Champion Aerobatic Pilot Charlie Hillard of Ft. Worth will be featured at the Sixth Annual Plainview Air Show Sunday, September 9, at the Hale County Airport in Plainview, Texas. The two-hour show will start at 2:00 p.m. Hillard will be joined by two teammates from the World Champion U. S. Aerobatic Team, Gene Soucy and Tom Poberezny of Milwaukee, Wisconsin (both). Soucy is the first pilot to win the U.S. National Aerobatic title three consecutive years (70-71-72) and also was Canadian National Aerobatic Champion in 70-71-72. Poberezny is a rising young pilot who placed sixth in the World Contest and contributed greatly to the U.S. team vic-

The three pilots, known as the Red Devils, fly identical red Pitts special biplanes in solo and formation aerobatic demonstrations. Also appearing at the show will be the Amarillo Skydivers, a demonstration of aerobatics in a glider by members of the High Plains Soaring Society, a demonstration of formation radio-control model aircraft flying by the Sparks Club of Reese Air Force Base, a jet aircraft performance demonstration, and many static displays of aircraft. Planes from Reese Air Force Base and the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station are expected from the military. Homebuilt aircraft by members of the Experimental Aircraft Association will be on hand as well as a B-25 twin engine medium bomber of World War II vintage and a German ME109 of the Confederate Air Force.

The show is sponsored again this year by the Plainview Kiwanis Club and proceeds will be used for their many civic and charitable activities, Admission is \$1 for adults and 50¢ for children under 12. Entrance to the show will be at the new boulevard on South Columbia Street at the air-



WINTER COVER CROP URGED

There are many benefits from winter cover crops according to W. Y. Reece, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, Lubbock, Texas.

Two of the major benefits of seeding such a crop as small grain are wind erosion protection and winter grazing of

livestock. This is the time of year to get this job done. One method of interseeding small grain into cotton or grain sorghum is by aerial application. The cost of aerial seeding is approximately \$1.50 per acre plus 2-1/2¢ per pound for the seed used with the producer furnishing the seed. The recommended seeding rate is 40 to 50 pounds per acre.

Arthur Newton, who owns and operates the Newton Flying Service of Idalou, does this type of seeding for the farmer. Mr. Newton has had several years of experience of interseeding his own crops with small grain. He states the following crops show no visible effects from the doublecropping. Mr. Newton grazes livestock on the small grain during the winter months.

Small grain can be left on the land until about the first of March and then undercut or tandemned. This can be followed by cotton or grain sorghum. This allows maximum protection from sand storms during the predominant wind erosion months. It also saves the producer money by limiting the number of tillage operations for the succeeding crops. Money can also be earned by providing grazing for livestock or by leasing to people who need grazing for livestock. Another method of interseeding small grain in a growing crop such as cotton or grain sorghum is by the use of a whirlwind seeder attached to the power take-off on the back of a tractor, or the same seeder mounted on the front of a tractor and pulled off the battery.
