This move to the Skaggs building at the corner of 7th and Broadway proved to be greatly beneficial and is the present location of the association. A most significant goal was achieved when insurance of accounts with the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation (FSLIC) was granted on June 29, 1970.

Since that time a very steady savings deposit growth has brought the assets to more than \$9,000,000 as of June 1973.

Dr. Weidenbach came on the board in 1970; all the others have been on the board since 1965. Officers of the association are Grady L. Boyd, president and manager; W. Ralph Thomas, M. D., vice president; Helen Dotson, secretary; Mitchell Malouf, assistant secretary; and B. T. Lusk, treasurer and assistant manager. For the time being Grady Boyd and B. T. Lusk will alternate between Plainview and Abernathy. Helen Dotson, Edna Clarkson, Lora Mitchell and Carol Gadbois are in the Plainview office. Aletha Sanders and Jane Clark, both of whom reside in Abernathy, are in the Abernathy office.

The association is looking forward to becoming a part of Abernathy through the prosperous years just ahead. Offices are just west of the bank in the Nystel building, opening for business Sept. 17, 1973.

In other action, the board approved fund raising projects for the school year which are the senior play, bake sale, junior play, FFA Christmas fruit sale, and FHA candy sale and band magazine sale.

An enrollment report was presented. Enrollment for the school year, grades 1-12 (this does not include pre-kindergarten and kindergarten) 1089 which is 20 students below the same date last year.

Items discussed on which no action was taken were: 1. The purchase of liability insurance to protect all school employees and trustees from cost of litigation in the discharge of official duties. 2. The Texas Association of School Administrators and Texas Association of School Boards workshop which will be in San Antonio the last weekend in September and the conferences which will be held in connection with the workshop.

The board directed Dr. Webb to appoint a committee and make recommendations for furniture and instructional materials purchases for the Academic Center and to have this ready for the October board meeting with estimated costs. 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### ANTELOPES TO HOST TAHOKA FRIDAY NIGHT Lose To Petersburg

The weatherman held back the rain for the fans in Petersburg Friday night, but things got pretty damp for the football team. Opening their 1973 season, the Antelopes met a defense-minded Petersburg team and was drowned by a score of 7 to 6.

The Antelopes received their opening kick off and advanced the ball to their own 45 yard line. After a couple incomplete plays, they were faced with a fourth down situation and had to punt. The punt was a long one and Petersburg took over on their 15 yard line.

The Buffaloes were having good luck with their ground game until the ball was jarred loose from their half back, Mike Lambert quickly pounced on it, and the Antelopes were once again in the offensive saddle.

Unable to move the ball, the Antelopes were forced to punt. Petersburg took over on their own 48 yard line. The defense, led by McClendon and Rodriguez, shut off the Buffalo attack and they, too, were forced to give up the ball.

Hoping to get their offensive game off the ground, the Antelopes came up with two quick first down plays, but to no avail. Again they called upon their punts. This ended the first quarter with neither team on the score board.

Petersburg started off the second quarter with the ball. With 9 minutes and 55 seconds showing on the clock, they scored the first touchdown of the game on a pass play that was good for 67 yards. The extra point was good and the score was 7 to 0 in favor of Petersburg.

The Antelopes began to move the ball and, with a couple great catches by Don Bridges and Tommy Horsford, found themselves in scoring position on the Petersburg one foot line. Call it whatever you like, but the Antelopes were unsuccessful in four tries and the Buffaloes took over on downs deep in their own territory.

The defense dug in shutting off the Petersburg attack. The first half ended with the score 7-0.

SECOND HALF  
 Abernathy kicked off to start the second half, and the Buffaloes began immediately to open up their ground game. They moved into Antelope territory but were caught with a holding penalty. The first Antelope defense--led by Rodriguez, McClendon, Bridges and Odum--forced them to punt.

The offense again had their chance to even things up. Quarterback Ray Martin got things moving with a 30 yard jaunt to the ten yard line. David McClendon immediately moved the ball to the one yard line, and the Antelopes were once again faced with a "do or die" dilemma. This time things went right, and Ray Martin scored on fourth down. The score was 7 to 6.

The Antelopes elected to win the game rather than go for a tie. The two point conversion attempt failed. Petersburg led 7 to 6.

Knowing time was running out, the Antelope defense held the Buffaloes on downs. The offense had another chance. Things looked pretty good for a winning touchdown drive, but "Lady Luck" was not riding in the Antelope corral. Petersburg intercepted a pass to stop the Antelope drive with 3:22 left. Petersburg had nothing to do but run out the clock. The game ended on a slim one-point margin, 7 to 6.

The Antelopes were defeated on the scoreboard Friday night, but not in their attitudes. They will be working even harder to improve all phases of their game. If it takes a couple defeats early in the season to help mature a team, the Antelopes will take them with a grain of salt and set the necessary goals to win a district championship. If they continue to improve with each game, they should be a solid unit by the time district play rolls around. Stay around, folks, and watch a good football team develop into a winner.

### ANTELOPE BAND TO MARCH IN FAIR PARADE

LUBBOCK--Invitations have been forwarded to all high school bands in the South Plains and eastern New Mexico area to participate in the Parade of Bands here Sept. 24. The AHS Antelope Band will march in the parade. Abernathy School students will have a holiday Sept. 24.

The parade is scheduled in conjunction with the 56th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair, and cash awards of \$1,250 are being offered in each of the five UIL classifications--AAAA, AAA, AA, A and B.

A \$100 top prize is offered in all divisions. A \$75 award is earmarked for the second place bands, \$50 goes to third place units and \$25 for fourth. Trophies also are presented.

Judges this year include G. T. Gilligan of Kermit, Bill Dean of Odessa and Russell L. Wiley of Lawrence, Kansas. Competing bands will be judged as follows: playing, 50 per cent; marching, 30 per cent; and appearance, 20 per cent.

Entry deadline is Sept. 14, according to fair general manager Steve L. Lewis.

The parade in the past has been the official lid-lifter for the fair. However, the exposition this year gets underway two days earlier--on Saturday, Sept. 22--in its expanded eight-day run.

The fair's "Shower of Stars" has been lauded as the best ever since it was announced earlier in the year.

Offers "family fun for everyone" from the opening show--Lobo and the Earl Scrogger Review--to the finale, Mel Tillis and Jody Miller, on Sept. 22 and Sept. 29, respectively.

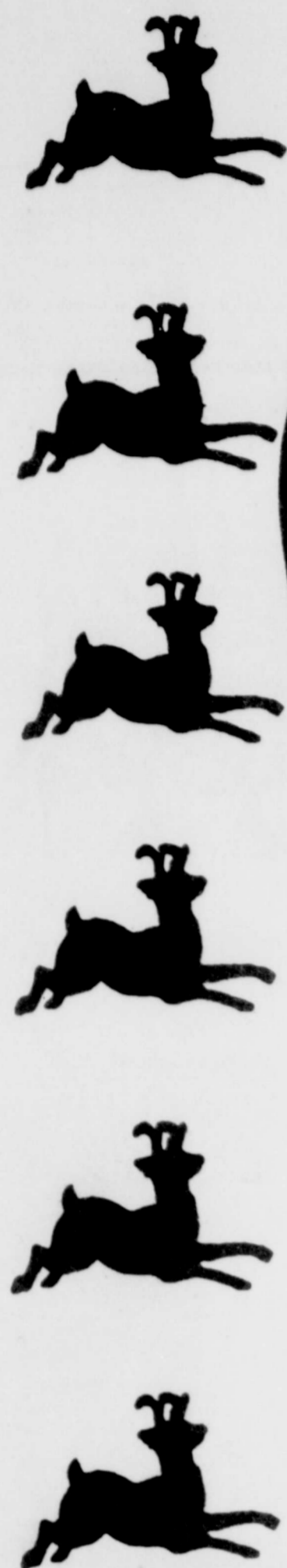

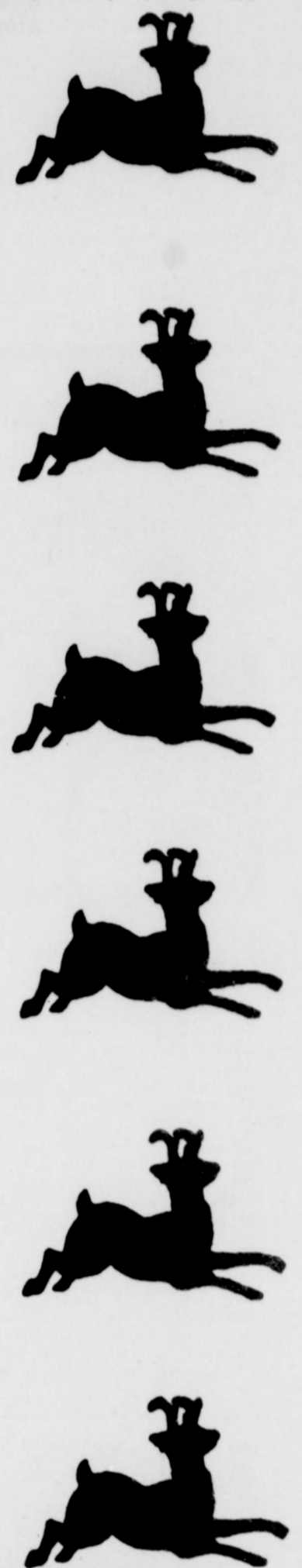

**SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
**SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973**

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)**

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session.

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)**

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)**

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)**

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)**

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)**

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)**

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)**

Article XI of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

**NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)**

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."
