#### Project Plans For Hale Museum At Wayland College

Pride in one's own country, own state, own region and even one's own county is a natural and commendable feeling. Our own rich area has its outstanding characteristics both in its present status and its cultural heritage. Today's hum of commerce has been made possible by those who came, and through hard work and good citizenship, converted a barren land into a prosperous community. It is altogether fitting that we honor those who came and developed what we have today.

To accomplish this remembrance of those who preceded us the Hale County Historical Society has set out, with the help of Wayland College, to establish a first class museum near the present campus of Wayland, Wayland will accomplish its maintenance and continuity, something that would have been too much for

a small historical group. This project will be called a heritage center and will include not only the primary function of focusing on the history of Hale County but also on the broader aspects of the history of our state and coun-

It is planned to be finished before the bi-centennial of the founding of the United States and the Heritage Center will be the main element in our local celebration of the bicentennial, the two hundredth birthday of the U.S.A.

Some of the great educational foundations are expected to help in the funding of the heritage center, but only on a "challenge" basis. In other words, they will give us half the \$600,000 needed. provided we raise \$300,000 ourselves. A fund-raising campaign is planned for this month of October. It is hoped that Abernathy will respond to the call and help make this




