The Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District met in regular COMMITTEE IS NAMED

Hale County - Abernathy, Texas - Lubbock County

Nine local civic organizations have named members from their respective memberships to serve on the Advisory Committee for the Emergency School Aid Act (ESAA), according to Charles Bowen. Director of Guidance and Federal Programs for the Abernathy Public Schools. The school system plans to file an application for funds, pursuant to Public Law 92-318.

The purposes of the Emer-ency School Aid Act are threefold: To meet the special needs related to elimination of minority group segregation and discrimination among students and faculty in elementary and secondary schools; to encourage the voluntary elimination, reduction or prevention of minority group isolations in elementary and secondary schools with substantial proportions of minority group students; and to aid school children in overcoming educational disadvantages of minority group isolation. Bowen hastened to add that actually none of the three named purposes hold true for the Abernathy school system since this district voluntarily desegregated in 1965. He stated how-ever, that this is the reason the school is eligible to apply for funds--simply because of the voluntary desegregation, not because of a Federal court or-

During a regional meeting in Abilene, Texas, on September 24, 1973, Mr. Bowen was told by U.S.O.E. officials that 75% of the financial grants would be approved for up-dating and up-grading the reading and mathematics programs in schools, provided of course that they are approved

for grants. The following named individuals and the organizations they represent have agreed to serve on the Advisory Committee: Dan Ward and Rev.
