**Rep. Finnell Plans To Seek Hightower Spot**

Charles A. Finnell, state representative, District 53 of the Texas Legislature, was a guest of the Plainview Kiwanis Club Thursday.

Finnell has not officially announced but plans to seek the 30th Senatorial District seat now held by Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon who is considering entering the 13th Congressional District race.

Finnell is a native of Holiday and received his bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Texas in 1965. He attended Law School at St. Mary's University in San Antonio and was admitted to the State Bar in 1970.

He was elected state representative for District 53 in 1966 and was re-elected in 1968 and 1970 without opposition. He was re-elected again over three opponents, without a runoff, in 1972. District 53 includes Archer, Clay, Wichita and Young counties. Finnell recently was elected vice chairman of the West Texas delegation to the 63rd Legislature.

TO ALL OWNERS AND TO ALL PERSONS OWNING OR CLAIMING ANY INTEREST IN OR LIEN UPON ANY PROPERTY ABUTTING THE STREETS AND AVENUES OR PORTIONS THEREOF OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS, HEREINAFTER NAMED, WITHIN THE LIMITS HEREINAFTER SET FORTH, AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES AND TO THEIR AGENTS AND ATTORNEYS:

You are hereby notified that the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, has determined the necessity for and ordered the improvement of certain streets and avenues or portions thereof hereinafter described within the limits hereinafter defined, the nature of which improvements is hereinafter generally set forth; and that the City of Abernathy has approved and adopted the estimate, statement and report of the City's Engineer and has taken other proceedings with reference to the making of such improvements are of record in the Minutes of the City Council of the City of Abernathy and has by ordinance ordered that a hearing be held, and notice thereof given, NOW THEREFORE,

FURTHER TO SAID PROCEEDINGS AND SUCH ORDINANCE, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:

I.

That a hearing shall be given to the owners and to all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abutting the streets and avenues or portions thereof of the City of Abernathy, Texas, hereinafter named, within the limits hereinafter set out, and to all other interested parties, including their agents and attorneys, before the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, which hearing shall begin on the 5th day of November, 1973, at 8:30 o'clock P.M. and shall be held in the City Hall of Abernathy, Texas, at which hearing all of said owners and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys shall have the right to be heard on any matter as to which hearing is a constitutional prerequisite to the validity of any assessment sought to be imposed and to contest the amounts of the proposed assessments, the lien and the liability thereof, the special benefits to the abutting properties and the owners thereof by means of the improvements for which all of such assessments are to be levied, the accuracy, sufficiency, regularity and validity of the proceedings and contracts in connection with such improvements and proposed assessments, or concerning any matter or thing connected therewith. The said hearing may be continued from time to time and day to day until a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the said assessments or proceedings, and the City Council shall have the power to and shall correct any errors, inaccuracies, irregularities and invalidities, and shall determine the amount of assessments and all other incidental matters and shall have the power by ordinance to close such hearing, and by the same or by a later ordinance or ordinances to levy such assessments before, during or after the construction of such improvements, but no part of any assessment against abutting properties shall be made to mature prior to acceptance by the City by ordinance of the improvements abutting the property for which the assessment is levied. It shall not be necessary to levy all of the assessments at one time or by a single ordinance, and said hearing may be closed as to each portion of a street and/or avenue constituting a unit of improvement (as such units are designated below),

after a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the assessments proposed to be levied against the owners and their properties abutting on the portion of each such street and avenue constituting a unit of improvement; and the City Council shall then have the power to levy such

assessments against such abutting properties and against the owners thereof, as provided herein and in the prior proceedings of the City Council herein referred to. No assessment will be made against any abutting property or the owner thereof in excess of the special benefits to such property and its owner in the enhanced value thereof by means of such improvement as determined at such hearing. All of such owners, claimants and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys, are hereby referred for further information to the proceedings with reference to said improvements on file and/or of record with the City Secretary of the City of Abernathy and particularly to the estimate of the City's Engineer, and to the proposed assessment roll wherein the exact amount proposed to be assessed against each abutting property and the owner thereof is set forth; said City's Engineer's estimate and said proposed assessment roll being on file in the office of the City Secretary.

III.

The nature of the improvements for which assessments are proposed to be levied and to which this notice relates is the filling, grading, raising, paving or repaving said streets and avenues or portions thereof in a permanent manner, and by the construction or reconstruction and the realigning of curbs and gutters where there are no existing curbs and gutters which can be utilized in whole or in part in the opinion of the City Engineer and by reconstructing and realigning existing curbs and gutters which can be utilized in whole or in part in the opinion of the City Engineer, and by the construction of such other necessary incidentals and appurtenances as the City's Engineer has found to be necessary or advisable, all as shown by the plans and specifications of the City's Engineer, and by widening where necessary so as to attain the paved width from back of curb which is set out below, said paving to consist of the construction of an adequate asphaltic wearing surface on an adequate base, the exact nature of such improvements being more particularly shown in the plans and specifications which are on file in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Abernathy.

IV.

The streets and avenues or portions thereof to be improved within the limits fixed by the City Council are listed below as they have been divided by the City Council into separate and distinct improvement units. There is stated in connection with the listing of each street and avenue or portion thereof within the limits herein defined constituting each improvement unit the estimated amount or amounts per front foot to be assessed against the owner or owners of properties abutting such street and avenue or portion thereof and against such properties, the estimated total cost of the improvements as to each improvement unit.

There is included in the estimated amount to be assessed against abutting properties and the owners thereof a proportionate part of all costs incidental to the construction of the improvements.

**Fund Drive Takes New Step**

With approximately \$190,000 received in the advance gifts phase of the Llano Estacado Museum fund drive, the campaign moves another step forward Monday with a special kick-off luncheon at The Alcov.

The event will launch the general campaign in which \$600,000 is being sought for a Regional Heritage Center and Llano Estacado Museum complex.

Workers, who received materials and prospect cards Friday, have been invited to attend along with supporters and prospective donors who will be special guests.

Total goal of the campaign is \$1 million with the Heritage Project divided into three segments. These would include the Llano Estacado Museum and Regional Heritage Center at an

estimated cost of \$600,000; an outdoor amphitheater and festival park, \$200,000; and an endowment fund for support of an annual heritage platform series and perennial heritage educational program in public schools, \$200,000.

It is hoped that a foundation grant can be obtained to aug-

ment funds raised locally and in this area.

Site for the new museum-heritage center would be on the Wayland campus at a location with convenient access to the public. The site already has been selected, an advisory board named to plan various aspects of the facility and assist

in the fund campaign, and architect's plans are in the process of being finalized.

Workers and supporters will be brought up to date on the campaign at the Monday luncheon. The general drive is expected to be concluded by Oct. 26, according to John Skaggs, campaign chairman.

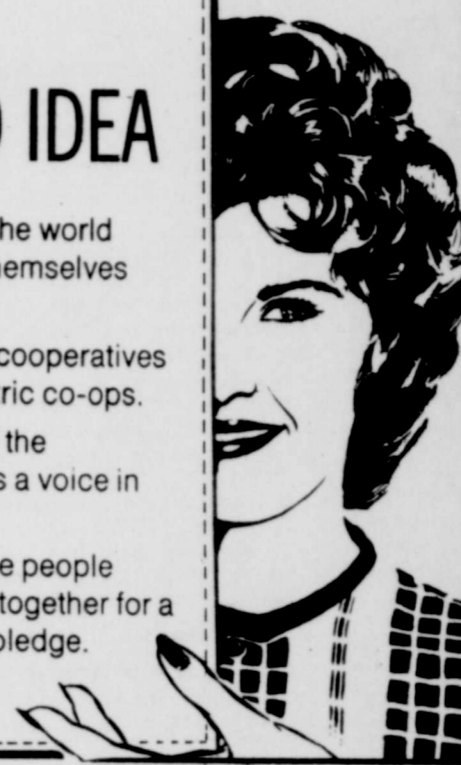

## HALE IN TOP 10 COUNTIES

AUSTIN -- Hale County is in the top ten counties in Texas agricultural production for 1972, according to recently published statistics. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

Hale County farmers placed fourth in crop production with cash receipts totaling \$34,452,000. In total cash receipts Hale County was fifth with \$66,719,000. Cash receipts for livestock amounted to \$32,267,000.

The figures have just been published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, a joint effort of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the USDA, Commissioner White said.

"Even with freezes, rains, and a fluctuating market, Hale County should enjoy another productive year in 1973. Cash receipts for the first seven months of 1973 show increases over last year," Commissioner White said.

### NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT OR CONSTRUCTION

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvement on Interstate 27 from 1.5 miles north of Monroe Overpass to 0.5 mile north of north city limits of Hale Center in Lubbock and Hale Counties. Since the Federal Highway Administration approved the route and design proposed for this project, the Highway Department will begin work on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of this project.

The proposed construction will consist of improving the existing four lane divided highway where required to conform to Interstate standards, developing 24 foot travel roadways with surfaced shoulders - multi-lane controlled access facility with frontage roads, grade separations and interchanges. No additional right of way is anticipated in New Deal, Abernathy and Hale Center. The general right of way width on the remaining sections will vary from 340 feet to 360 feet.

Maps, drawings showing geometric design, environmental studies and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected and copied at the Resident Engineer's Office on Loop 445 in South Plainview, Texas, and the District Office of the Texas Highway Department at 601 Slaton Highway in Lubbock, Texas.
