Registration renewal application will be put in the mail shortly after the holiday season by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department.

The same quick and easy method made possible by modern computer technology will be in effect this year as it has been in the last few years.

Vehicle owners can save time that used to be spent waiting in long lines at county tax offices throughout the state by ordering their 1974

license plates by mail.

All that must be done is to send the entire three-part application by mail to the county tax assessor collector in the owner's home county, enclosing the registration fee plus \$1 for each vehicle to cover handling and mailing. There are three things to remember:

1. Leave the three-part form intact. Don't separate the three parts.
2. Mail it to the county tax office in your home county. (Mailing it to the Highway Department will only delay getting your 1974 license plates.)
3. Be sure to include the registration fee, plus \$1 for each vehicle for postage and handling.

You may apply for license plates by mail after January 1. However, county tax offices won't mail plates until after February 1. Owners should allow at least 30 days from the time they apply for the license plates to be returned.

In-person registrations will begin at county tax offices and, in some counties, at substations on February 1. Even though the automated registration application procedures have speeded up the process, waiting lines will grow progressively longer as the April 1 deadline approaches.

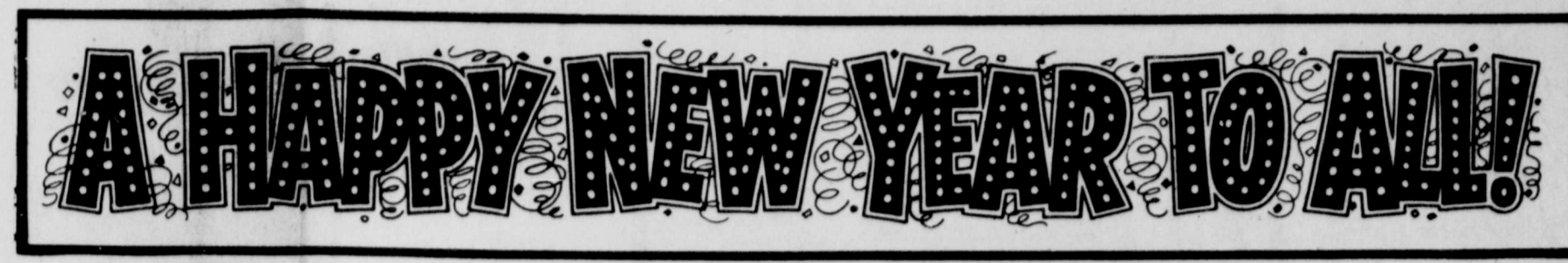

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Animal Health Commission Notice Given

The new brucellosis regulations (Proclamation of the Texas Animal Health Commission #AHC-1) were adopted unanimously by the Texas Animal Health Commission at an official Commission meeting in Laredo, Texas, on October 15, 1973. These new regulations will bring the Texas Brucellosis Program into compliance with the National Uniform Methods and Rules which are considered minimum standards.

In brief this regulation requires that all breeding cattle two (2) years of age and over that change ownership are required to be brucellosis tested. Breeding cattle may be tested on the farm or ranch or at an auction market. Slaughter type breeding cattle may be sold through livestock markets without test until sampled on the kill floor. The brucellosis test will be good for movement purposes for a thirty (30) day period provided animal is ear tagged and accompanied by test certificate.

Effective January 15, 1974, these regulations will be in full force and effect.

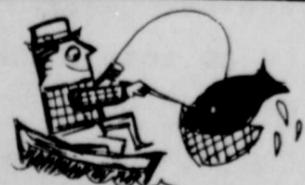

URGES SOIL CONSERVATION PRACTICES

Farmers in the Lubbock area who bring additional land into crop production in 1974 are being urged to use sound conservation practices.

W. Y. Reece, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Lubbock, said conservation measures not only protect the soil from erosion but also increase production.

"Some people are predicting farmers will bring several thousand acres of former 'set-aside' acreage back into crop production in Texas in the next year," Reece said. "This is considered to be the best and quickest way to check food and price increases."

"But it's also the quickest way to increase dust storms, sediment pollution, and other erosion problems unless sound conservation measures are installed," Reece pointed out.

"There is a lot of land in our Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District which can be used for cropland safely if managed properly," Reece said. "Yet there are other soils which are so susceptible to blowing or washing that they should never be used for crop production."

Reece said he hopes farmers will use soil survey information available from his office before putting new land in cultivation.

"Soil surveys have been made on over half the land in Lubbock County," Reece said.

"These surveys show which soils are best suited for crop production and which soils are most susceptible to erosion. They can also show which soils are most productive."

Hardin's Notice To Veterans:

Many veterans become ill and use their life savings to pay for needed hospital care before they inquire as to their entitlement to be admitted to a Veterans Administration hospital. This announcement was made today by Herbert Hardin, Veterans Service Officer for Barton-Hood Post No. 500.

Medical and hospital care are very expensive today, and most people who are regularly employed are covered by some type of health and hospitalization insurance. Many veterans fail to realize that they may be eligible for care in Veterans Administration hospitals even though they are covered by insurance.

Eligible for admission to any Veterans Administration hospital is a veteran who was discharged or released under other than dishonorable conditions from either a peacetime or a wartime period of service in the Armed Forces of the United States. Medical emergencies always have first priority for admission, followed by veterans who require hospitalization because of a disability which was incurred during service.

Some veterans must show evidence of inability to pay for the needed care before they can be admitted. This is not necessary if the veteran is seeking treatment for a service-incurred disability, if he is receiving VA disability compensation or pension, if he was released from service because of a service-connected condition, or if he is 65 years of age or older.

A private doctor may expedite admission by contacting the VA hospital by telephone. Ambulance travel will be authorized if it is required and is justified by the doctor. Application for admission may be made by mail if accompanied by a medical statement from a private physician, or the veteran may present himself at the hospital for examination to determine need for care.

Social Security Income Supplement To Start In Jan.

For more than 30 years
social security has contributed
to the financial security of re
tired people and dependents
of workers who have died. For
about one-half this length of
time the program has provided
a monthly income to workers
who have become unable to
work before reaching retire
ment age and to their young
families. Mencie King, man
ager of the Plainview social
security office, said today.
In most cases, the regular
income from social security,
together with savings and in
vestments have been ade
quate. However, the benefits
from social security is not suf
ficient to cover the basic
needs of many people whose
earnings have been low and
irregular, King said.
Beginning in January 1974,
social security offices will
begin paying a supplement to
the other income of people
who are age 65 or over, dis
abled, or blind, and whose in
come is less than \$150 a month
for an individual or \$215 a

couple, if they need help.
This is called Supplemental
Security Income, King con
tinued.
A person may own things
worth up to \$1,500 and a
couple may own things worth
up to \$2,250 and become
eligible for payments, King
said. The value of a home,
home furnishings, and a car,
all of reasonable value, are
normally not counted.
Also, a person may earn
from his work up to \$65 a
month without causing ded
uctions from the suppl
emental payments. If he earns
more than \$65 a month, only
one-half of the earnings above
\$65 would be deducted.
Social security offices are
now helping people apply for
the supplemental payments
that may begin in January.
"You do not have to be re
ceiving social security checks
to qualify for the suppl
emental security income pay
ments," King concluded, "but
if you are receiving Old Age
Assistance or disability pay
ments from the State Depart
ment of Public Welfare, you
do not need to apply."
