



AREA NATIVE IS ARTIST OF NOTE, STRUVE REPORTS

(Editor's Note: "It should be done, and I'll do it when I get around to it." That's what has been kicking around in the back of my mind for the past couple of years. And, our thanks to Arno Struve for "getting around to it" for me and Review readers. He wrote the following story.)

"CAN ANYTHING GOOD COME OUT OF NAZARETH?"

John 1:45 and 46: Phillip found Nathanael, and said to him, "We have found him of whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph." Nathanael said to him, "CAN ANYTHING GOOD COME OUT OF NAZARETH?" Phillip said to him, "Come and see."

Yes, even out of Abernathy great things may come! Who says there is less talent potential here than anywhere else in the whole world?

It has been this reporter's happy experience recently to learn about such a talent, born and raised right here among us. Who knows how many more may have gone out from here to make a name in the world without the "homefolks" being aware of it?

A budding artist of considerable productiveness and growing recognition is rising above the horizon. And in the happy circumstance of being able to combine an artistic inner drive with the ability to be recognized sufficiently to earn a living in the work so loved.

This is the son of Hilburn and Wava Barrick, their youngest, the boy we know as Billy. His work is signed BBarrick and is owned by collectors all over the state of Texas.

Quoting from a Central Texas newspaper, "Mr. Barrick recently participated in a show in Austin featuring the ten best professional artists of the Southwest." This gives one some idea of what critics think of Billy's work.

He has had a number of one-man shows around the state. In the City of Bellville, for instance, the Austin County Bank and the Bellville Art Gallery joined in co-sponsoring a special showing of Billy's works where he was present and able to meet art aficionados and talk with them.

On November 4th of this year he had a showing in the City of Dallas where all his works placed on display were sold. Subsequent showings will be as follows: Austin Country Club, Austin, Texas; Westwood Country Club, an exclusive club in Dallas; a

Mrs. Mathis is well-liked and respected by local people of all races. She has done a wonderful job of raising her children under difficult circumstances. She is active in a number of groups in the community. Her son, Harry, is a member of the faculty of Abernathy Schools.

Hartlingen, Texas, show, and another Austin show at Las Colinas Gallery. This is just a partial list of his current demand. His work is on continuous display at Western Galleries in Austin where he is permanently employed. Art groups within driving distance of Austin are calling on him more and more to give demonstrations. A recent such demonstration was given to the Highland Arts and Crafts Guild at Marble Falls which organization includes retired Abernathy-ites, Velma and Ray Pison.

Describing Billy's work, Margaret Taylor Dry, art writer for the Austin American-Statesman, "In a style which is starkly realistic, he portrays in varying media and with an excellent both of perspective and composition, the things he loved, and which surrounded him as he grew up, old houses, cotton gins, fields and fences, which made this land pictorially attractive."

He was trained in watercolor technique, has experimented with many other media, but is now concentrating his efforts in the use of the acrylic medium. Demand for his work is in conflict with his regular employment in that there isn't sufficient time for both. As a consequence he is behind on his commissions given him by people anxious to own examples of his paintings. His snow scenes are currently in greatest demand. His portrayal of a snow storm in progress makes one feel that he is actually seeing snow driven by swirling winds.

Some have described his work as being starkly realistic, and so it is; but never does one get the feeling of seeing a photograph while viewing a particular scene. An experience or a lifetime of human experience is evident in every representation he puts on canvas. Tragedy, failure, effort, waste, transcendence of the human condition, all these things and many more appear in his pictures, revealing a depth of philosophy in the

artist and an intuitive understanding of human troubles. This is more remarkable in view of the fact that the artist himself has been spared the actual experience of grave difficulties having grown up during a time of relative affluence.

Billy kept a notebook of sketches that he filled from memory and observation. This notebook must surely be a great source from which he can draw his inspirations. While a teacher in the Tutia Schools he drove a school bus and thus acquired a rich store of observation of the countryside in that area as well as hereabouts as he grew up in the Abernathy community. In addition to this he has traveled in the older settled regions of Texas and Oklahoma where the remnants of past viable communities still remain.

Billy admits to being and having been a dreamer. Summer fieldwork that was supposed to be done to help produce the family's crops often suffered, he says, because the beauty of the clouds often raised his eyes away from his work.

Born in 1945 and raised on a farm he had little opportunity in the work that now consumes his life. No art training was available in the local school and often he was chided for wasting his time sketching when there was "work" to be done. Naturally the early discouragement is remembered by Billy with a great deal more poignancy than by those surrounding him at the time. Not until he went "off to school" was he really able to pursue what his heart drew him to. He began his higher education at West Texas State University, wedged in a semester at Texas Tech, but returned to West Texas where Dr. Caballero was his greatest inspiration. After finishing at West Texas he attended North Texas.

His first employment after graduation was in the Tutia Schools and later he taught at Grand Prairie. In the last year of his teaching contract it became apparent to him that the "demand" for his work was greater than the time he had to produce paintings so he ended his teaching career and became a full time painter.

Billy takes a special interest in the children that come to the gallery where he works. He cannot forget the time he, as a youngster, was starved for artistic feeding; and, because of this, he takes the time to talk to the children and encourage them if they show talent.

Billy's wife, Martha, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vic Struve. Martha and Billy have two very lively sons, Jeff, 5, and Cody, 3. Two
