NEW OWNER TAKES OVER GRAHAM'S IN ABERNATHY

MOTHER'S ONLY
COMPETITORS RETIRE
AFTER GOOD LIFE
OF FEEDING PUBLIC

Ed and Sara Graham, owners of Graham's Restaurant in South Abernathy, have retired after 19 years of feeding the public.

The Grahams came to Abernathy September 10, 1946, after selling their bakery shop in Littlefield which they had operated for four previous years.

The first Graham's restaurant was located in what is now the Abernathy Floral building with a seating capacity of 30 people. As their business increased the building was remodeled to accommodate 120 people. The Graham's name grew and with their newly acquired popularity they purchased and managed two other restaurants in Lubbock - one at 4th and College Avenue in the Town and Country Shopping Center and the other at 34th and Indiana Avenue. James Graham, Ed's brother, took over at the 34th Street location and managed that business for five years. The Grahams also opened in 1950 a bakery in Muleshoe which they operated for a year.

Ed and Sara decided in 1950 to sell the two restaurants they had acquired in Lubbock and turn all their attention to the people in Abernathy. This particular move paid off for the Grahams and their business began to get too big for their downtown location. In 1964 Ed leased the building that now houses the present Graham's Restaurant.

Besides feeding the public, Ed Graham has served as mayor of Abernathy from 1954 to 1960 and also served one term as a city councilman. These years in politics brought Ed's wife, Sara, into the business. Before she had remained on the sidelines and only involved herself when and where she was needed. Sara quickly became the mainstay of the restaurant and, in a short time, made the business a two-way partnership, working along side Ed day and night until their retirement in 1974.

The Grahams have worked hard over the past years to build a business known from Texas to Canada. The business is known for its good food and friendly service and honest relations with the public. Jack Dilworth is the new owner of Graham's Restaurant. Jack is not new to the food business (he owns the Village Restaurant in Lubbock) and will have no trouble in maintaining a fine eating place for the people of Abernathy. Everyone is encouraged to meet Jack at the restaurant and make him feel welcome. The Grahams have retired from the public eye but their name will long be remembered in the circles of fine restaurant owners and just plain good people. Ed and Sara would like to thank the people of Abernathy for their support over the past 19 years. The friends they have made during these years will remain with them forever - without the citizens of Abernathy there could be no Graham's Restaurant.

"Cussin' the government" was a harmless past time, because everybody expected Congress to pass laws they wouldn't like. Maybe we need our televisions to go on the "blink" and the coolers to have a temporary break-down so we can get acquainted with people again.

Have you driven by and seen the County Line Community Club House? After nearly 18 years of wishing and wanting a club house for this community... we got it. Thanks to all the women who have believed in the present and its promises, in everything that makes life large and lovely, in the divine joy in living and helping others. It has been a long hard pull to get going and really have a club house and so we endeavor to pass on to others that which has benefited us, striving to go forward despite all the "emphatic no's" we have heard for 18 years. Donations are still coming in for the foundation and then for furniture for the club house.

FIRE MARSHAL WARNS AGAINST GAS STORAGE

IMPORTANT NOTICE in regards to the storage of gasoline:

A dangerous practice has been brought to the attention of the Fire Marshal's office. This is the storage of gasoline in and around the home. This appears to be a result of the current energy crisis. The American Insurance Association fire prevention code recommends that not over one gallon of gasoline be kept in a residence or over two gallons be kept on the outside of a residence. In either case, approved containers must be used. Approved containers are those made of metal only. Glass containers or plastic containers are not recommended. Approved metal containers must be covered and designed so that they cannot be spilled. The reasoning behind the non-approval of glass containers is in that they can be broken easily. PLASTIC containers are subject to deterioration through chemical reactions of the gasoline. The use of these unapproved containers is against the state fire prevention law. Furthermore, it is a violation of state law for any service station operator to fill any unapproved container. Do not ask service station attendants to violate this law.

Vapor from gasoline stored in the home or garage can be ignited by numerous things. Heating systems, hot-water heaters, sparks from electric motors or home appliances, etc., are especially liable to set off a fire. One gallon of gasoline has the same explosive power as do forty sticks of dynamite. The storage of gasoline in drums, such as 55 gallon oil barrels, in or near a residence is also extremely dangerous. It is also against federal laws in that such barrels do not have the P.S.I. strength required for the storage of flammable liquids.

The use of overhead tanks for bulk storage of gasoline in a residential area is not only hazardous to your family and property but to your neighbor's residence. The last major home fire in ABERNATHY was caused by less than one gallon of gasoline that had been stored in a plastic container which burst and allowed vapor to reach some type of ignition source in the home. This one fire resulted in the injury of three persons, complete loss of a home and all of its contents. The insurance company paid out a \$27,000 claim on this fire. When a claim of this sum is paid it affects everyone's insurance premiums, causing them to rise.

I urge you to think about some of the things previously mentioned when you consider storing gasoline around your home or property. Think of the safety of your family, home and neighbor's family. The storing of gasoline is not what I AM CONCERNED ABOUT but rather the safety of the citizens of ABERNATHY and the surrounding area.

FIRE PREVENTION AND SAFETY IS EVERYONE'S CONCERN.

If you should know of anyone who is violating laws by the illegal storage of gasoline, or who is endangering your family's safety, we urge you to report such violation or hazardous practice to either the police department or to the fire marshal's office. Complainants in such matters must be willing to give their names and addresses before such complaint can be followed through.


