School Transfer Information:

AUSTIN--Parents who wish to transfer children from their children from their home school district to another area for the 1974-75 scholastic year should make necessary application to the receiving district by May 1, 1974. Leon R. Graham, Texas Education Agency assistant commissioner for administration, announced Thursday (January 31).

The May 1 deadline for requests will enable school districts to file summary reports with the Texas Education Agency by May 15, Graham points out.

These reports will be reviewed by the Agency to make sure none of the transfer requests violate U. S. District Court Order 5281 issued by Judge William Wayne Justice in Tyler on April 2, 1971. Under this order, any transfer of students from one school district to another must not change the racial or ethnic balance in either the home or receiving district by more than one percent.

If the balance is altered by more than one percent, the transfers will be denied, Graham adds.

Court Studies Vote On Bonds

Hale County Commissioners, during a called session early today, agreed to retain the First Southwest Company of Abilene as financial advisers for a proposed bond issue to be called for the purchase of highway right-of-way.

The right-of-way purchase involves proposed widening of Highway 70 west, commissioners reported.

Today's action by the commission represented the initial step in calling a bond election in the near future.

The commission plans to seek funds of either \$70,000 or \$1 million in conjunction with the proposed highway project.

Joe Smith, a representative of First Southwest Co., will work with the county in financial advisory capacity.

PRE-PLANT IRRIGATION

"Pre-plant irrigation time is here again," states W. Y. Reece, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, Lubbock. Soil profile borings made by the Soil Conservation Service on many farms indicate one of largest volume of irrigation water is needed to fill the plant root zone that will be required this year.

Plants such as cotton and grain sorghum secure their water needs from approximately 4 foot depth. Soil boring shows this depth to have much less than 50% of available water now in this zone. Soils hold 2" of water per foot of depth that is available to the plants and will need a pre-plant irrigation application of from 5" to 6" of water.

Another factor to be considered by the irrigation farmer is the available supply of irrigation water and the amount of time it requires to irrigate. The minimum amount of irrigation water needed to pre-plant irrigate a tract of land is three gallons per minute per acre. A producer with 160 acres of land to pre-plant irrigate would need a minimum of 450 to 500 gallons per minute to get this job done before planting season.

Last but by far the most important factor in pre-plant irrigation is the proper management of the water when the application is being made. Apply the proper amount of water evenly distributed throughout the plant root zone without waste.

Soil Conservation Service technicians working through local Soil and Water Conservation District will be happy to assist you in measuring the amount of water needed as well as the amount being applied.

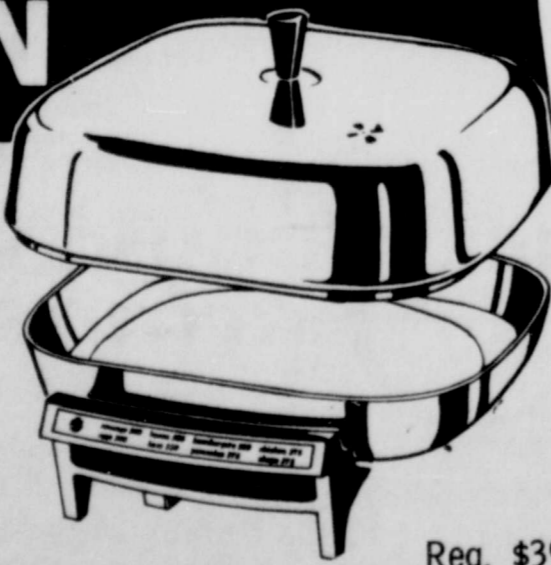
