## Public School Week Everyone Invited To Visit Schools

Due to late shipment of carpet for the new building, plans have been changed regarding the open house for the Texas Public Schools Week. Open house will be held in all three school buildings on Friday, March 8, 1974, from 7:30 to 9:00 p. m.

As in the past, all parents and friends of public education are invited to visit the schools. Refreshments will be served in the school cafeteria as in the past. Visitors are urged to sign the guest registers.

Carpet for the new building has been shipped from Georgia but will not arrive in time to be laid for the March 8th Open House. Plans will be announced in later editions of The Abernathy Weekly Review concerning dates and times for showing to the Abernathy public.

## ANTELOPE TRACK SQUAD RESULTS

The young Abernathy Antelope track team finished third with 71 points in a strong field at the Wildcat Relays in Idalou last Saturday. First place went to Roosevelt while Lubbock Cooper edged the Antelopes with 76 points. Abernathy finished ahead of district 4-AA opponents Ralls, Idalou and Tullia. Tullia is the defending district champion. Floydada and Lockney were not at the meet.

The Antelopes scored their first points of the meet in the morning field events with a fourth place finish by Senior Darrell Blevins in the shot put, third and sixth place finishes by Freshman Lorenzo Lara and Senior Albert Dominquez in the pole vault, and a fourth place finish in the high jump by Junior Steve Oswalt.

In the morning preliminaries, the Antelopes qualified for the afternoon finals in four of the six running events. The sprint relay team (made up of Steve Oswalt, Freshman Ken Davenport, and Sophomores Usbaldo Trevino and Mickey Davis) qualified with a time of 47.3 seconds. Junior Israel Garza qualified in both the 120 yard high hurdles and the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. Mickey Davis also got into the finals of the 220 yard dash with the second fastest qualifying time of 23.2.

In the afternoon finals, Abernathy started by placing fourth in the sprint relay. Freshman Danny Lopez replaced Oswalt, who had earlier pulled a muscle. Israel Garza picked up 16 points with second place finishes in the 120 High Hurdles and the 330 Intermediate Hurdles. Mickey Davis gained 10 points for the Antelopes with an impressive win in the 220 over Blackwell of Roosevelt in a time of 23.1. Blackwell had beaten Davis in the morning preliminaries. Darrell Blevins added to the Antelope point total with a second place finish in the discus.

Abernathy and Cooper were even going into the final two events, the long jump and mile relay. Senior David McClendon on his last jump went from third place to first place with a personal best jump ever of 20 feet 7 inches. The mile relay was the last event of the day and Cooper's senior and junior team defeated the Antelope team made up of Ken Davenport and sophomores Usbaldo Trevino, Pete Stracener, and Mickey Davis. This victory gave Cooper their narrow margin over Abernathy.

The Antelopes have an excellent chance of winning the Abernathy track meet scheduled to start at 9:30 a. m. this coming Saturday. The meet will last all day.

## Top Farmer Chosen

A Halo County farmer for the past eight years, Tommie H. Wages, today was named as the "Outstanding Resident Farmer" during the annual Soil Fertility meeting underway at the Agricultural Center.

The accolade was given by the Soil Conservation Service, which annually recognizes a farmer whose work in farm operations and in soil conservation is exemplary.

Wages grew up on a farm in Lubbock County. About six years ago, he purchased a 240-acre farm east of Abernathy. This farm held 70 acres of "marginal" cropland, two small irrigation wells and low crop production.

Since beginning his operations, he has installed a grassed waterway with diversion terraces and a complete system of

parallel terraces on the marginal land.

In addition, he has drilled two new wells and connected all four with more than a mile of underground pipeline. Presently he rents an additional 440 acres and carries out good conservation practices throughout his land.

Analytical Farming "The day of the shotgun approach to farming is gone," says Tommie. "I don't like to guess about fertilizer or chemical application rates, so I use an exact analysis, rather than a soil analysis."

Heavy fertilization and "making the most out of short water supplies" are Tommie's guidelines for outstanding crop yields. To make the most of short water supplies, he preplants, irrigates and waters every other row.

Aside from farming, Tommie's interests include his family and church organizations. He is married and has two children. His wife's name is Bobbye and his two children are Cody and Leigh Ann. They are members of the Baptist Church, with Tommie serving as Sunday School class instructor.

Both Tommie and his wife have been active members of the Young Farmers' Organization and other business ventures.

In making the award officials said of Tommie: "He has influenced other farmers his age, in planning and carrying out conservation practices through his own experience and hard work. All of his farm land reflects a progressive conservation-minded farmer."
