RED CROSS GIVES WARNING

FRAUD ATTEMPTED AGAINST RECIPIENTS

The newly - begun SSI program has been marred recently by fast buck thieves taking advantage of elderly and unfortunate citizens. The clever robbers call on people eligible for SSI and offer to prepare the short SSI application and "pay the fee." The catch is that there is no fec for application or information on SSI or any other Federal, state or local aid

program. Since the beginning of Social Security there have been occasional instances of people charging for documenting SS applications o offering SS information for money. Such documentation and information is, of course, available from all Social Security offices free of

charge. SSI is a payment to blind, disabled (children or adults) or elderly people (65 or over) in need. Benefits are for those not working whose income is below \$160 a month (\$230 for couples) and for those working whose income is below \$365 a month (\$505 for couples). People on Social Security are eligible for SSI. SSI also qualifies people for Medicaid, regardless of age. Those who believe they are eligible should contact the Red Cross or Social Security office.

Tornado Information

COLLEGE STATION ----Tornado season is approaching in Texas, and certain precautions can save lives, warns Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension

Service. Tomadoes are violent wind storms that usually grow out of threatening thunder clouds. In Texas, the peak tornado season is during the months of April, May and June, but tornadoes may oc-

cur anytime. "Although tornadoes may occur at any hour of the day or night, they are most frequent during the warmer hours of the day," points out

When the possibility of a tornado exists, the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Missouri, sends out a tornado watch to the threatened area. The message is teletyped to ra-dio, television and National Weather Service stations in

the area. "A 'tornado watch' alerts people to the possibility of a tornado," explains the Texas A&M University System specialist. "When a watch is announced for your area, there is no need to interrupt normal activities except to listen for weather advisories and watch for threatening weather. Be sure a batterypowered radio is available in

case power is lost." A tornado watch identifies a specific time and area, but everyone in the general area should be alert for

threatening conditions. "When a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar, a 'tornado warning' is issued. The warning tells where and when a tornado was sighted, the direction it is likely to move, and the time it is expected to move through the warned

area, " explains Keese.

If a tornado warning is issued for your area, move immediately to a cellar, basement or civil defense shelter. If you are in a home or other building with no basement, go to the lowest level in the center of the house or other building. Take shelter in a small room or closet or under heavy furniture.

Keese also lists other safety precautions.

At home, open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes. Then find shelter.

Stay away from windows and buildings with wide, free-span roofs.

In open country, escape by moving at a right angle to the tornado's path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in a ditch or ravine but do not stay in your car.

Get far enough away from a trailer or mobile home to avoid injury if it is overturned.

When you observe a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law officer or National Weather Service Office. Otherwise, do not make calls so that lines can be kept open for emergency

After a tornado, always wear shoes and gloves in cle anup operations and damage inspections. Watch for hazards like broken or downed electrical wires and broken gas pipes. When entering a storm-damaged building, watch for ceilings and walls that may be ready to fall.

Never light a match, smoke or carry open flames into a building until you are sure there are no gas leaks.

Do notsight-see in disaster areas. Your presence will only hamper rescue and cleanup operations.

NON-LICENSED DRIVERS ARE GIVEN WARNING

NOTICE: To non-licensed drivers and to the parents of non-licensed drivers

There are numerous persons in Abernathy operating motor vehicles who are unlicensed. There are others who are operating vehicles on restricted driver's licenses. State law dictates that this is illegal. This law was passed by our state legislature and is supposed to represent the opinions of the people of this state and this city. The Abernathy Police is charged with the responsibility of enforcing these

Since we are charged with that responsibility we must take steps to insure that such violations cease. We cannot enforce this law on a basis of who the violator is. The law must be enforced impartial-The time has come for the full enforcement of these

In order to be fair about this law we are first presenting this warning. After March 20, 1974, the Abernathy Police Department will start holding driver's license checks at various points and times within the city. If your son or daughter, or even yourself, should be checked for your driver's license and none can be presented that person will be cited for a

violation. In the meantime if you are stopped for other reasons and fail to have a driver's license, you will be cited. If you get caught driving without a license you may blame the chief of police, if you so desire, but you must also remember that it was not the police department who passed this state law but rather it was your

state legislature.
If you honestly feel that the Abernathy Police Department is being unjust in this matter, we suggest that you write your state legislator and tell him that the laws should be changed. Until such time as the legislature deems it practical to repeal the driver's license laws, we have no other alternative but to enforce the laws as they
