## TALK IN PRINT

If I had money to buy stock on the market, I'd load up with stocks in manufacturing firms that make measuring devices (the weighing scales). The United States will "swap" inches, pounds and gallons for the metric system of measurements and weights. I read the change, but the "powers that be" in Washington say that the U. S. A. is the only major industrial nation in the world using inches, feet, ounces, pounds and pints, quarts and gallons. This change will be phased over a period of ten years or less, and will be a bonanza for firms making weighing and measuring items.

For a while, I had doubts that President Richard Nixon would serve out his current term. Now, I wonder. He is fighting back through the same media that is bent on ousting him from office, the television networks.

Reports indicate that President Nixon plans to step up the frequency of television appearances during the next few months. He used television, and a friendly audience, in Chicago Friday to effectively espouse his cause. Although the audience, convention of business executives, was friendly, it did put to him the whole bag of problems, Watergate, income tax, energy problems and inflation in a question-and-answer session that lasted one hour. He was very effective and convincing in his answers.

This is being written Friday afternoon before the President's scheduled appearance in Nashville Saturday night. That event, dedication of the \$25-million "Country Music, U. S. A." entertainment complex, should be a fun-thing rather than a problem-packed gathering.

The President was candid in his answers at the Chicago appearance. He said that when it comes to Internal Revenue Service investigations that he is in the same position as any citizen. Due to a technicality, in dates, he said that might not be given a tax deduction for contributing his vice presi-

dental papers to the government, and that he may have to pay more income tax. Reports say that he was urged by IJ to donate the papers to earn a tax deduction. And, the report further stated that IJ may have saved several millions in income taxes by donating his papers to the government.

Speaking of paying income taxes, an Abernathy business man has an attitude that is very rare. "I am happy that I have made enough money to have to pay income tax," he stated.

Mentioning Dwayne Taylor reminds me of a statement he made in 1964, when he drilled the city's water wells on the airport section four miles east of town. At that time, Dwayne told the city that the wells would produce a sufficient amount of water for the town for ten years or longer. This is the 10th year, and I checked with City Manager Glen Metcalf on the water supply from those wells. He says the wells are still strong producers, and that engineers now predict that the wells will produce for 15 more years. Hope they are right.

A few years ago, Abernathy City Council made a wise move when they bought the McKenzie farm northeast of town as a possible source of city water in the future. At present, the city is not taking water from that land. The farm, 200 acres-plus, is leased to Tommie Wages. Ralph Wolf told the city manager that the well on that place will be producing as long as there is underground water in South Hale County and North Lubbock County. And, I hope he is right in this prediction.

## RED CROSS GIVES WARNING

FRAUD ATTEMPTED AGAINST RECIPIENTS

The newly-begun SSI program has been marred recently by fast buck thieves taking advantage of elderly and unfortunate citizens. The clever robbers call on people eligible for SSI and offer to prepare the short SSI application and "pay the fee." The catch is that there is no fee for application or information on SSI or any other Federal, state or local aid program.

Since the beginning of Social Security there have been occasional instances of people charging for documenting SS applications or offering SS information for money. Such documentation and information is, of course, available from all Social Security offices free of charge.

SSI is a payment to blind, disabled (children or adults) or elderly people (65 or over) in need. Benefits are for those not working whose income is below \$160 a month (\$230 for couples) and for those working whose income is below \$365 a month (\$505 for couples). People on Social Security are eligible for SSI. SSI also qualifies people for Medicaid, regardless of age. Those who believe they are eligible should contact the Red Cross or Social Security office.

## Tornado Information

COLLEGE STATION --- Tornado season is approaching in Texas, and certain precautions can save lives, warns Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Tornadoes are violent windstorms that usually grow out of threatening thunder clouds. In Texas, the peak tornado season is during the months of April, May and June, but tornadoes may occur anytime.

"Although tornadoes may occur at any hour of the day or night, they are most frequent during the warmer hours of the day," points out Keese.

When the possibility of a tornado exists, the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Missouri, sends out a tornado watch to the threatened area. The message is teletyped to radio, television and National Weather Service stations in the area.

"A 'tornado watch' alerts people to the possibility of a tornado," explains the Texas AGM University System specialist. "When a watch is announced for your area, there is no need to interrupt normal activities except to listen for weather advisories and watch for threatening weather. Be sure a battery-powered radio is available in case power is lost."

A tornado watch identifies a specific time and area, but everyone in the general area should be alert for threatening conditions.

"When a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar, a 'tornado warning' is issued. The warning tells where and when a tornado was sighted, the direction it is likely to move, and the time it is expected to move through the warned area," explains Keese.

If a tornado warning is issued for your area, move immediately to a cellar, basement or civil defense shelter. If you are in a home or other building with no basement, go to the lowest level in the center of the house or other building. Take shelter in a small room or closet or under heavy furniture.

Keese also lists other safety precautions.

At home, open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes. Then find shelter.

Stay away from windows and buildings with wide, free-span roofs.

In open country, escape by moving at a right angle to the tornado's path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in a ditch or ravine but do not stay in your car.

Get far enough away from a trailer or mobile home to avoid injury if it is overturned.

When you observe a tornado, report it promptly to the nearest law officer or National Weather Service Office. Otherwise, do not make calls so that lines can be kept open for emergency information.

After a tornado, always wear shoes and gloves in cleanup operations and damage inspections. Watch for hazards like broken or downed electrical wires and broken gas pipes. When entering a storm-damaged building, watch for ceilings and walls that may be ready to fall.

Never light a match, smoke or carry open flames into a building until you are sure there are no gas leaks.

Do not sight-see in disaster areas. Your presence will only hamper rescue and cleanup operations.
