

BAND WINS SWEEPSTAKES!



ANTELOPE BAND COPS TOP HONORS AT U. L. L.

Under the directorship of Mr. Jerry Bartley, the members of the Abernathy High School Antelope Band returned April 25, 1974, with the coveted University Interscholastic League Band "Sweepstakes Award". This award is given only to Texas bands which have achieved the highest ratings throughout the school year. This includes a Division-I (one) in marching, concert playing and sight-reading. The Antelope Band last achieved the Sweepstakes Award in the spring of 1967. Last year, the band received a special award rating at the U. L. L. event. This awarded the band a Division-I in concert playing and sight-reading. The concert playing includes a warm-up march and two selections from a prescribed list printed by the state. Sight-reading includes playing a selected number chosen by the state music committee. The purpose of sight-reading is to see if the band director is teaching music fundamentals also, not just devoting most of the year toward the three concert selections.

This year, the Antelope Band performed a British march entitled "Brighton Beach". The two concert selections (both contemporary) were "Sonus Ventorum", which translates "Sounds of the Wind", and "Overture in B-flat". Jerry Bartley, band director, quotes a few comments from the criticism sheets as follows:

"March--an overall good job. Sonus Ventorum--here we did many nice things, rather good interpretation and done in good style." Lynn Low, band director at Cisco High School and one of three judges, commented, "You have a fine band and a fine director, congratulations!"

SPRING CONCERT MAY 17
Highlighting the band year will be the annual Spring Concert scheduled for May 17 in the high school auditorium at 7:00 p. m. Included in the concert will be performances by the high school stage band, the tonette band, sixth grade band, junior high band, and ending with the Antelope band. Each year, the Antelope band keeps the public in suspense as to what surprise awaits them at the beginning of their concert. This year, the program theme will be "Sweepstakes for Keepsakes... A Year to Remember!"

RECORD ORDERS TAKEN
Also included as a result of winning the coveted "Sweepstakes Award", Jerry Bartley announces, "Earlier this school year, I mentioned to the Antelope Band that if

we make a Sweepstakes Award, we will make a record for you and the public to preserve as our history of the year." Record orders will be taken in the auditorium lobby during the concert. Also, Mr. Bartley has designed an Abernathy band decal which will be sold to any person who so desires. Ruth Fulton, Antelope band assistant, will display pictures of her music programs taken throughout the year. Color prints of these programs will be available in the lobby.

AWARDS TO BE GIVEN
The John Phillip Sousa Award, as well as others, will be announced during the Antelope Band Concert. This award is chosen by the members of the band and given to the person who has contributed the most time and talent to the band. They will receive a lapel pin, desk paperweight of John Phillip Sousa, a wall certificate and their name engraved on a plaque in the band hall.

A reception for visiting band directors, visiting bands, and music salesmen will be given in the band hall after the concert. No admission is charged.

PRIMARY VOTING IN TEXAS MAY 4 Write-In Campaign For J. P.

Texans will go to the polls Saturday, May 4, to vote in the first primary election, both Democratic and Republican.

To date, no report has come in concerning Republican primary voting in The Review coverage area.

Democratic primary voting in Hale County will be at Abernathy City Hall and at Lakeview Methodist Church. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Election officials urge you to vote, and to vote early in the day.

Democratic primary voting in Lubbock County will include voting boxes at Joe Thompson Implement Co. in Abernathy; at the New Deal Clubhouse and at New Deal School. Balloting at Becton will be at Becton Gin Co., owned by Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Tudor. Polls in Lubbock County will open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. Election officials in Lubbock County also urge you to vote, and to vote early in the day.

Voting will range from offices of U. S. Representative, the Texas Governorship and other high state offices to the smallest geographical office area, that of Justice of the Peace.

Dolph Briscoe has strong opposition from Sissy Farenthold for the office of Governor. Mrs. Farenthold ran a pretty good race for that office in 1962. Her image, for some, has been enhanced since her first try for that office. In the Democratic National Convention in Miami Beach, Mrs. Farenthold was in the race for the vice presidential nomination, and did pretty well in the voting, considering that she is not a nationally known figure.

Two races in Hale County are holding the local spotlight. Four ladies (J) are seeking the office of District Clerk in Hale County. The incumbent, Eleanor Harris, is not a candidate for re-election. Ms. Harris, who has made a good District Clerk, plans to move to California after her term expires Dec. 31, 1974.

The other race that is drawing attention in Hale County is the one for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3, which includes the Hale County portion of the City of Abernathy. The incumbent, Delbert Beaton, who has been JP here since Feb. 1, 1958, announced in the Review last week that he will not be a candidate for re-election, and that he will retire at the end of his current term, Dec. 31, 1974. Also reported in last week's Review was the fact that only one name will appear on the ballot for the JP office. The name is Mrs. Dayton (Jeanne) Marr. This week, Mrs. J. B. (Willie Ruth) Bradley announced as a write-in candidate for the JP office in the May 4 election.

Also, there was talk of others considering the write-in vote route to the JP office in the May 4 election.

After the above was written, Mrs. Harold W. (Billie Ann) Thomas announced that she will be a write-in candidate for the Justice of the Peace office in Precinct 3, Hale County, which includes Abernathy.

A large voter turnout is expected in Texas May 4. If the candidates for various offices have not generated interest in the election, there is one thing that has... parimutuel betting on racing, horses and dogs. The strongest (in numbers) church denomination in Texas, the Baptists, are leading all churchmen of the state in all-out battle against parimutuel betting. They are asking the voters of Texas to vote against this issue.

LUBBOCK, Texas -- The Texas Tech University spring 1974 commencement exercises will be held in Jones Stadium, weather permitting, otherwise in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum May 11, when more than 2,000 candidates from the six colleges and the Graduate school are scheduled to receive their degrees.

Eighty-eight graduates of the Law School will receive degrees May 17.

Of the total, 1,651 are candidates for bachelors degrees, 303 for masters degrees, and 74 for doctorates.

When this record grain movement started in mid-1972, many predicted the rail industry would not be able to handle the job. Despite no advance warning and severe problems of port congestion that hampered the handling of cars with export wheat, Santa Fe and many other railroads have set records of moving grain while keeping other traffic rolling. This great transportation job was accomplished by skillful, dedicated Santa Fe people, and through the wonderful cooperation of all shippers. Grain continues to move in a big way and a bumper crop is expected at harvest time. That is why we are now hard at work planning ways to apply Santa Fe facilities and resources to move increasing volumes of traffic this year without serious car shortages."

Big moves are not unusual on the Santa Fe. Citrus, potash, coal, sulphur and various manufactured products move by the trainloads. But grain tops them all, especially wheat.


This year marks the one hundredth anniversary of Turkey Red Wheat in the United States. Through the efforts of the Santa Fe back in 1874, the Mennonites emigrated from Russia and brought with them a few sacks of their wheat. It thrived in the Midwest and parts of the Southwest to develop that area into the breadbasket of the world.
