1973 COTTON CROP GREAT; MADE PROFIT

It's cotton-planting time again... or almost time. Farmers and those of us who depend on the farmers... which is all of us... hope that the yield, price and weather conditions that we so thoroughly enjoyed in 1973 will hold true for the 1974 cotton crop. Chances are that all these factors that made the 1973 cotton crop so wonderful will not prevail for the 1974 crop... but we can hope for another crop miracle.

The cotton gins in Abernathy and the immediate area ginned a total of 47,068 bales of cotton from the 1973 crop. We are not prepared to say this is a record... but we believe that this figure is higher than the average yield for the area a year after year.

Gins whose figures are included in the total of 47,068 bales for 1973, are: City Gin, White Gold Gin, Hygrade Gin, Inc., Abernathy Farmers Co-op Gins, Abernathy Gin Company, Farmers Tuco Gin, Martin Gin, Mac Teakell Gin and County Line Co-op Gins.

Preliminary statistics on cotton ginnings from the U. S. Bureau of Census show the 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of Lubbock, accounted for 2,779,805 gin-run bales or 15.5 percent of a 12,594,370-bale national crop. High Plains ginnings come to 61.7 percent of the 4,500,544-bale Texas total, according to PCG figures.

WRITE-IN HITS ELECTION CODE SNAG HERE

The write-in voting for Justice of the Peace here Saturday hit a Texas Election Laws legal snag. Two write-in candidates, Willie Ruth Bradley and Billie Ann Thomas announced in The Review last week. On Friday, the day before the election, a move was started for a write-in campaign for Jack Hackler for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3, Hale County. Hackler is the rural route two mail carrier out of Abernathy.

Monday of this week, The Review editor was shown the book containing Texas Election laws. Article 13.09, paragraph B of the Texas Election Code says write-in votes cast in the first primary and in the second primary cannot be counted.

Paragraph B indicates to us that write-in votes in the November general election will be valid and will be counted and will be used to determine the winner of an office. Also, it may be possible to place a name for an office on the general election ballot as an Independent (rather than a Democrat or Republican). Legal advice on the above statements was not available until Tuesday night, too late for this issue of The Review. Therefore, the statements in this paragraph cannot be considered as fact until the legal opinion is given.

Mrs. Dayton (Jeanne) Marr's name was the only one printed on the first primary ballot for the May 4 election. Her name appeared in the Democrat column on the ballot, and she received 180 votes of the total of 353 votes cast here in the election.

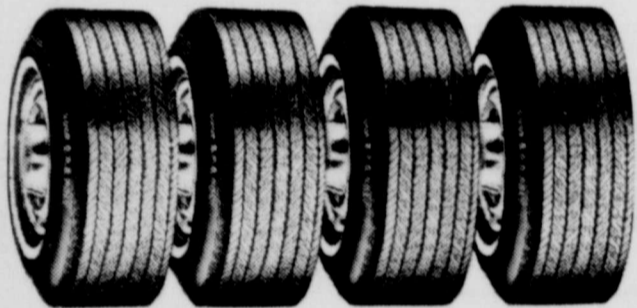

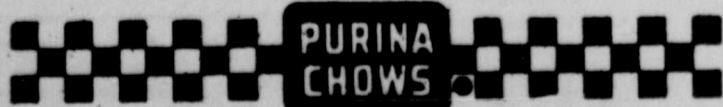


