4th Of July Celebration Offers Fun For Family

Fourth of July plans are rapidly coming to a close and the result could be one of the most successful in the history of Abernathy.

To get things rolling on the Fourth, David Pinson will chair a what some have called the greatest bicycle races ever held in this part of the country. The races will start in front of Joe Thompson Implement Company on south Avenue D and run to Main Street—ten blocks long. The entire course will be covered from start to finish with various local commentators adding wit to the tiresome and dangerous trek. Age limits for the races, which start promptly at 9:00 a. m., are five years to 95 years. If you have a grudge with your neighbor or friend, challenge him/her to a bicycle race; and let the results tell the tale.

9:30 will see the float judging and parade line up take shape. Kicking off at 10:00 a. m., this year's parade will have two main themes—patriotic and humorous. First (\$100), second (\$50) and third (\$25) place money will be awarded in each category; so, build a float and take some money home. Prize money and trophies will be presented by Dave Cavitt.

J. D. Vineyard, a member of Abernathy Riding Club, will be Marshal for the July 4th parade here.

10:40 will start the flag-raising ceremonies and patriotic speech under the direction of local Boy Scouts and V. A. Dodson. 11:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon will contain various events and challenging activities such as a pie and cake auction sponsored by the Girl Scouts, the Lions Club Ducking Board

and horseshoe pitching under the direction of Steve Hill and Sam Hunley. A St. Isidore's Catholic Church group will handle a dart throwing contest under the supervision of Mike Valdez. The annual Ring Throw from the city water tower will take place at 11:30. \$125 in prizes will be given away to lucky ring catchers—if Dave Pinson is able to climb the water tower.

The Bar-B-Q lunch will take place at noon in the school cafeteria under the excellent catermanship of James Graham. The cost will be \$2.50 per plate. The cafeteria will also be air conditioned.

1:00 p. m. will kick off the Old Fiddlers Contest; and, if it is anything like the one last year, success should be certain. Pete Thompson, Mayor, is chairman for the popular event.

The fire department will cool off the hot afternoon with their annual Water Polo Contest under the (wet) leadership of Ed Crow.

After everyone has had sufficient time to rest from the day's activities, the local Riding Club will round out the day with various rodeo events beginning at 7:30 and lasting until late. J. D. Vineyard and L. G. Montgomery will co-chairman the riding events.

FIREWORKS WARNING GIVEN

A reminder on the explosion of fireworks: With the 4th of July holiday coming up we must remind the citizens of Abernathy that it is illegal to explode fireworks within the city limits. This illegality is created by our ordinance number 76.

There are several important reasons why the explosion of fireworks has been made against the law. Basically these reasons are excessive noise, fire hazards, and the danger involved to persons exploding fireworks and/or other persons.

We must remember the ill, the elderly, and persons who need peace and quiet. We must consider the fire hazards and the safety of individuals.

The danger of exploding fireworks, as related to individuals, range from simple cases of burned fingers to the loss of eyesight, life or limb. We offer in example, the case in California where a young man who had just recently been drafted to play pro football lost both legs in a fireworks accident.

We must ask that you refrain from the practice of exploding fireworks during the upcoming holiday (both the traditional date and the revised date).

Since the patrolman on duty cannot be in all parts of the city at all times, we suggest that, should neighbors disturb you by exploding fireworks, you call the police department and the person violating the ordinance will be contacted.
