**BOARD HIRES NEW TEACHERS**

The employment of 9 new teachers highlighted the Abernathy School Board Meeting held June 27, 1974. Teachers employed for the coming year were: Charlotte Carter, High School English; Marilyn Stone, High School Home Economics; Marilyn Vieregge, High School English; George Riddell, Band; Jan Cryer, assistant Girl's Coach; Sherita Norris, Jr. High English and Spanish; Teresa Crisp, Kindergarten; and Max Kennedy, Elementary Physical Education.

The board also approved the transfer of Mr. Gid Adkisson from the Special Education HONDA Program to be elementary school principal for the 1974-75 school year.

Presented to the board was a budget progress report, tax collection report showing 97.9% of the taxes having been collected and a report on the board of equalization held June 13, 1974.

Bolinger, Segas, Gilbert, Moss and Company were appointed to be the fiscal auditors for the 1973-74 fiscal year. The board discussed physical improvement priorities for the total physical plant and were given a progress report on the paving project which is in progress. The paving project includes the area to the band hall and cafeteria, the elementary playground east of the elementary school, and a new 900 square yard area to be paved south of the junior high gym which will be used for outside activities of physical education and will have two outdoor basketball and volleyball courts. The high school parking lot, the bus barn area and the parking area east of the 4th and 5th grade building will be patched and seal coated.

The State Board of Control recommended that buses be ordered 12-14 months in advance of need and the local board authorized Abernathy Schools to purchase two buses for the 1975-76 school year to be delivered next summer.

In other action, the board set August 12th for the public hearing of the budget and again appointed Thomas Y. Pickett as evaluation engineer.

The next regular meeting of the board will be August 5th at 8:00 p.m. Those in attendance at this meeting were: L. J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice-president; Joe Lovelace, secretary; Lon Carmickle, David Pison; Joe Orwalt; Bob Riley; Mr. Earl Carter, business manager, and Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent.

"I. S. farm income will level off (at a good high level)," an International Harvester Co. executive predicted Thursday night.

"Crop prices should remain steady at a slightly lower level that will benefit livestock raisers who are having a rough time right now," J. E. (Pa.) Kaine, president of IH's Agricultural/Industrial Equipment Division, told 400 IH dealers and customers at a meeting at Lubbock Country Club.

"We see a continuing and increasing demand for U. S. meat both here and abroad," Kaine said, as he expressed optimism about the future of U. S. agricultural economy because of population growth, especially overseas where millions of new customers will have increased purchasing power.

International Harvester plants are working round the clock to meet the greatest demand for farm machinery since the end of World War II, the IH official said.

This year, he said, IH is producing 15 to 20 percent more finished machines and 50 percent more service parts than last year, but is still faced with "serious shortages" of both.

To help alleviate the situation, Kaine said, his company has recalled IH people from retirement to expedite parts from suppliers, is buying components all over the world at premium prices to keep assembly lines going, is restricting exports to only 1.8 percent of total production, and is increasing capital expenditures for expanded production. He cited a \$14 million investment, announced just last week, which would increase Farmall tractor production by one-third.

The U. S. will export \$20 billion worth of agricultural products this year, nearly 20% of the nation's total exports, Kaine said, and "that's going to buy us a lot of petroleum and other products we must import to sustain our high standard of living."

Commenting on foreign tractors being sold in the U. S., Kaine said his company has never sought import restrictions as protection against foreign competition.

"If we can't build a better machine and provide better service to the U. S. farmer than they can, we don't deserve your business," he declared.

Despite the fact that Americans spend a smaller proportion of their income on food than any other people in the world, Kaine pointed out, "there is a firm, ever increasing in food prices."

He said price controls on food would be "ineffective" and would "discourage investment in the production of food and fiber which have not shared fully in the economic advances of other segments of the economy."

The IH executive criticized "self-appointed stewards of the public" who seek to manipulate our business and personal lives, and "artificial headline grabbers" who seek to destroy American business.

Citing the vital importance of agriculture to our business, Kaine said "no single industry has a more significant

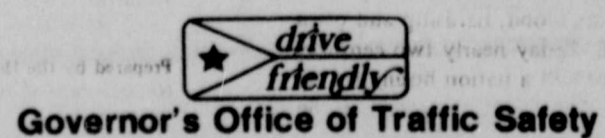

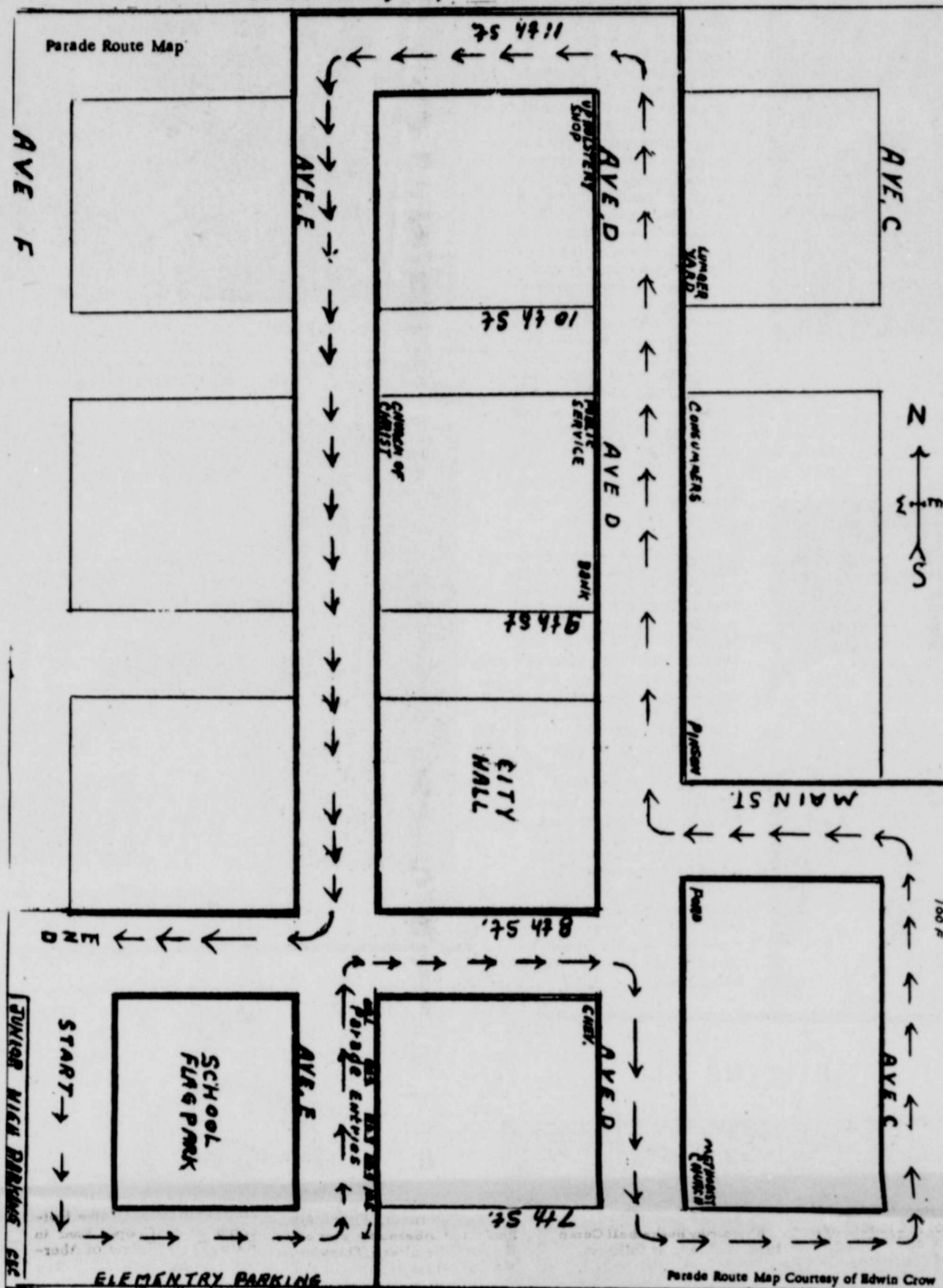

## 1st PLANE TO LAND IN CITY WAS IN 1918

Report by the Review's Roving Reporter

The day was bright and clear following a good June cotton rain which left the people of Abernathy in high spirits because they were to welcome the first "flying machine" to town. The year was 1918 and the promotion of sales for the Liberty Bonds was uppermost in the minds of the patriotic citizens. Most of the population had gathered on the east (Avenue D) side of the "Old Blue Building" which faced south and stood on the present location of our First State Bank. The west end of this building was occupied by Jones Drug Store (Mrs. Thea Wesley's father) and the east portion was the Stambaugh Grocery. There was no paving at the time and borrow-ditches handled the drainage for the town.

Advanced information had been passed out concerning the U.S. Army plane making a sales trip starting in Amarillo and following the Santa Fe Railroad south to Sweet-

water. Teams were unhitched, watered and securely tied to the hitching rails and posts wherever they could be found because everyone knew that an unmuffled "Liberty-Lycoming" motor overhead would cause much excitement among the animals. Dan Brandt's team did later break away and cause several "run-aways". The alleys and area behind Struve Hardware and over to Weldrite Shop furnished meager room for the parking of wagons, buggies, hacks and teams.

As usual, the arrival time was delayed and restlessness began to be noticed, in fact some disbelieved the possibility of such a heavy object being able to fly. But soon the sound of a powerful motor could be heard approaching from Hale Center. The highly polished wooden propeller and the "doped" linen cover flashed in the sun rays as several circles were made over the town while the pilots dropped handbills promoting the Liberty Bonds. After disappearing from sight the plane made a very rapid approach from the east making a power dive at the collected populace. Many thinking "that

thing" was falling, made a mad dash for safety. The water-filled borrow-ditches were no deterrent. Women and children dashed through them despite being dressed in their best "bibs and tuckers."

A slow disappearance over the school building and a low circle indicated a landing south of the present football field and bus barn. Two army officers with their helmets and knee length laced boots climbed out of the open cockpit and removed their goggles and white silk neckerchiefs in preparation to assist the local bond salesmen.

Fuel capacities were small and the pilots enlisted the aid of several men to bring them some gasoline from a local filling station. After approximately an hour of good sales and a thorough inspection of the plane by those present, the pilots "popped cranked" their motor and slowly moved to the extreme corner of the area. The take-off was rough, noisy and dirty. One circle above the crowd and a dipping of the wings announced their intentions to follow the Santa Fe railroad to Lubbock as instruments other than compass, oil pressure and temperature were practically unknown. These

John Adams, second President of the United States, wrote of July Fourth—"It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of the country to the other, from this time forever more."

Our nation has survived much, from minor upheavals to major corruptions, to bloody civil war. But that Declaration and that Constitution remain intact. We still pledge to them our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

And in these troubled times, more than ever, we might take heed of one of our most prominent contemporary constitutional lawyers, Louis Nizer, who in a recent address at New York University Law School, said:

### A DAY TO HONOR AMERICA July 4th, 1974

John Hancock of Massachusetts signed the Declaration of Independence with a bold, elaborate and most legible flourish. It was followed by the signatures of 55 others from the 13 American colonies, 198 years ago today.

And in signing this document they called their erstwhile colonies, "FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES", by appealing to the Protection of divine Providence (the capitals are theirs) and did "mutually pledge to each other our lives, our Fortunes, and our Sacred Honor."

On July 4, 1776, this was no empty pledge. It meant very starkly that each signer had affixed his signature to his own death warrant. Each inscription convicted its perpetrator, automatically, of treason.

Yet such was the overwhelming strength of their patriotism in their fledgling nation that they pledged their all that it might be achieved.

And in years of battle, blood, hardship and often despair, it was achieved. Today nearly two centuries later, we of America are still a nation bound by the principles set forth in that Declaration and in the

The reason for this law and ordinance is that such vehicles are found to be detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tending to reduce property values, to invite vandalism and theft, to create fire hazards, to constitute an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the HEALTH AND SAFETY OF minors and are detrimental to the economic welfare of the state. Such vehicles are therefore declared to be a public nuisance.

The following types of vehicles and circumstances have been determined to be within these laws:

I. Abandoned vehicles: A. Any motor vehicle that is inoperable and over eight (8) years old and is left unattended upon a public street or other public property for over forty-eight (48) hours.

B. Any motor vehicle that has remained illegally for over 48 hours on public property, regardless of condition or age.

C. Any motor vehicle that has remained on private property for over 48 hours without the consent of the property owner or the permission of persons in control of such property, regardless of age or condition.

II. JUNKED VEHICLES: Junked vehicles are those which are inoperative, and do not have both currently valid license plates and motor vehicle inspection stickers providing that such vehicle is either wrecked; dismantled, partially dismantled, or discarded.

We sincerely hope that everyone within the city will cooperate and that we can do this in a gentlemanly way with a minimum of friction between the police department and the general public. The law is going to be enforced even though many will be displeased by such actions.

State law gives officers of the City of Abernathy the right to enter onto private property to inspect and examine vehicles to obtain information as to identity of vehicle and to make the determination as to whether the vehicle falls within this law. Furthermore the Police department has full authority to go onto private property and impound such vehicles found in violation of these laws. We most certainly hope that we are not forced to take legal actions against property owners for assaults or other abuses against an officer who is performing his duty in regards to this matter.

The laws do provide for the right to a hearing in regards to such actions, however such rights will be explained within the letter of notification sent to persons found in violation of house bill 1181 and city ordinances.

## JUNK CAR LAW TO BE ENFORCED

PUBLIC NOTICE IN REGARDS TO JUNKED AND ABANDONED VEHICLES IN ABERNATHY

A decision has been made by the City of Abernathy in regards to junked and abandoned vehicles. This decision is that all junked vehicles within the city must either be removed from public property and/or private property, or enclosed within a structure which will shield it from the view of persons on public property or other private property. This decision is based upon state law (house bill 1181) and city ordinances.

In weeks to come everyone within the city who has junked or abandoned vehicles on their property, will be contacted and advised that they must comply with the state law and city ordinances.

After such notice has been given they will be allowed ten days in which to comply with these laws through the removal and abatement of such nuisances. After the expiration of those ten days the vehicle will be impounded and disposed of in the legal manner.

Every single individual within the city will be subject to the same notification and follow up procedures. Absolutely no exceptions will be made.

The reason for this law and ordinance is that such vehicles are found to be detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tending to reduce property values, to invite vandalism and theft, to create fire hazards, to constitute an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the HEALTH AND SAFETY OF minors and are detrimental to the economic welfare of the state. Such vehicles are therefore declared to be a public nuisance.
