SUZAN BENN GILL

(Editor's Note: Granting The Review's request, Arno Struve prepared the following story on a former Abernathian, who is making her mark in the world of art. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Benn of Abernathy, Mrs. Suzan Gill.)

HAPPINESS IS:

Being Suzan Gill! Having two fine sons and a husband (or vice versa)!

And being well on the road to a successful artistic career. Women's Lib notwithstanding, it is a realistic combination.

The first (being Suzan Gill) is not just being some selfish entity dedicated to "self-fulfillment", but being a whole, balanced person, a Christian, whose face and eyes reveal a personality interested in the world, the whole of creation and its welfare ... giving the lie to the old saying that an only child need be spoiled and selfcentered.

Suzan began life in Abernathy March 1, 1941, the only child of Barbara and Clyde Benn. She grew up in this secure household that faithfully attended the Baptist

The world of Disney cartoons excited her ambitions before she was old enough to go to school, and she resolved to one day be a Disney artist. No art classes were available to her in the schools at Abernathy, but she was able to take private lessons from

Ruth Neighbors of Lubbock. The administration and faculty of Abernathy High School gave her the Citizenship Award the year she was a senior. Upon her graduation in 1959 the Abernathy PTA gave her a college scholarship because of her exemplary citizenship and because of her expressed interest in

becoming a teacher. Suzan chose West Texas State for most of her college work. By this time her aritstic talents had proved to be more than a child's whim and her technical training there has proved very valuable. Her independence as an artist became evident during her college years when her teachers, whose leanings were toward abstract art, tried to influence her in the direction of "modern" art; but, happily, she wenther own way and followed her own bent. Suzan also attended Texas Tech and East Texas State at one time or another but she claims West Texas as her alma mater. Her degree from West Texas was completed in 1962.

Her teaching career start-

ed in Denver where she was employed for three years. From Denver she went to Dallas and taught art for three years. Her teaching career continued for two and one half years in Lafayette, Louisiana, until the twin arts of painting and rearing a family claimed all of her time.

Her husband, Donald Gill, was a fellow student at West Texas; but they started dating when both were teachers in Denver. They were married in August of 1964. Suzan and Don have two delightful sons, Chris Allen and Bradley Lowell, whose ages are 5 and 3 respectively. The sons are obviously the product of a happy home where love is the ruling characteristic. A sidelight of Suzan's attitude toward children was expressed by Suzan when she chided her mother, "You never told me babies were fun! I thought they were just diapers, bot-

tles and bathing. ' Suzan and Donald Gill now live in Lafayette, Louisiana. Her artwork has been brought to national attention by Mr. Kenneth Reasoner, owner of Le Meilleur gallery in Lafayette. This gallery has contact with hundreds of dealers throughout the United States and thereby Suzan's work has gained wide attention and numerous showings having been arranged. When her paintings are placed on exhibition she often appears in

person with her work. Suzan's husband, whose education has brought him to the Ph. D. level, is associate professor of English and Linguistics at the University of Southwestern Louisiana at Lafayette. He has recently been granted "tenure" which means that his position security at the University has been made certain. Also recently his name has officially been added to the "list of linguists" by the international organization of that profession. His work requires knowledge of languages, both modern (such as French and German) and the classic Greek and Latin. Dr. Gill has done work in what is called "Onomastics" which is the study of the origins and forms of proper names of persons and places. This work is fostered by the National Place Names Institute, an organization in which Dr. Gill is active. Dr. Gill's doctoral dissertation was on the Place Names Origins of the Texas Panhandle. The preparation of such work must give Dr. Gill a rich background in history as well as Onomastics. Currently, Dr. Gill is working on research on the Place Names of Louisiana and has

prepared and presented a

paper entitled "Louisiana Place Names with a Touch of the Unusual. " Which sounds like an interesting approach. Eventually this research will lead to the production of a "Dictionary of Louisiana Place Names." Dr. Gill lived part of his life in Lovington, New Mexico, so that Donald and Suzan have somewhat similar backgrounds. Don is the nephew of J. L. Miller, , of Abernathy.

Suzan's work as an artist includes the use of several media, her favorite being watercolor because she gets more brilliance and depth of color from its use. She prefers acrylics to oils, and she enjoys doing vignettes. Presumably a vignette is the use of a limited subject, simple in nature, that tells a much larger story by its detail of composition. Suzan also likes to do pen and ink work because of the high contrast.

Suzan paints many things in the woods near her home, which is complete with wild plants, animals, and birds, and is surrounded by a rusty barbed wire fence supported by beautiful cypress posts. Working in a rustic scene such as this leads to one subject suggesting another.

Her favorite sketching place is around an old cypress house near her home. The old barn nearby is full of rotting ropes, old tools such as scythes and shovels with hand made handles. Found in the barn are old horsecollars, long unused. Nearby is an old wooden keg, cut down on one side and just waiting for a hen that used to lay eggs there many years ago. The fence posts are twisted cypress branches which are a considerable contrast to the smooth cedar types we have in West Texas. The red rusted barbed wire still has horse hair clinging to it that it grabbed many years ago. Hanging to one of the posts is a rusty bucket with the bottom gone and the sides thinned by age and weather.

The unpainted gray house has been standing for 120 years, unharmed by the hurricanes of Acadia. It is surrounded by huge oak trees and year-around green grass that is kept mowed by the few horses and cows still remaining. A cistern beside the house collects some of Southern Louisiana's 72-inch rainfall. The old couple who lived there for so many years has recently moved to a nursing home. They are both over ninety years old. They sold the heavy dark tester beds and other valuable antique furniture, leaving the rest for vandals to scatter. Useless bank statements, broken picture frames, coat hangers, and a few personal belongings lie in disarray on the floor. In one room on a wire strung across a corner hang unwanted old clothes. Two rocking chairs, not even valuable to vandals, still stand in the screened-in porch looking out toward the oak trees.

Suzan writes, in addition to the description of the old house, that she does her art work from nostalgia, looking back into a simple life uncluttered by speeding cars, television, and too-busy schedules. She feels sure that the appreciation of the simple ways of life, even with its hardships, comes from loving and living on the land that her grandfather first tilled, and seeing her own sons run across the same vard where her father played as a child, and feels that this is evident in her work. In addition to this heritage she feels that her maternal heritage has provided a talent to put her thoughts on paper. She has two aunts who are artists. Suzan feels fortunate that the public, too, seems to appreciate the simplicities of yesterday in the

complex society of today. Suzan speaks of her parents as being two wonderful people who kept her life happy and uncomplicated, who were strict with guidelines, but trusting, and who created an environment free from

worry and want. She feels that her art career has just begun and expects to attain a broad area of acceptance for her work in

the future. One might wonder how an artist can be compensated onetarily for his work. One

method is the outright sale of originals. Another is the authorization of the production of prints of the originals which make it possible for many people to enjoy good work. Print-making itself is a fine art and must be done with extreme care by specialists who work as carefully as the original artist. Suzan has chosen to "market" her work by both methods. Her "patron". Mr. Kenneth Reasoner, has chosen a print maker famed for high quality work. However, the number of prints actually made are limited in number in order to maintain a significant commercial value, and thus a "Limited Edition" is born. The pringing is done by using negatives and lithographic plates which are destroyed when the "Limited Edition"

has been completed. An art lover may thus invest in fine art he can enjoy and at the same time can have the satisfaction of seeing its market value increase. It is common for prints of a talented artist to multiply in value many times in a very short time. Discerning investor-art lovers might well be doing themselves a favor by considering the work of Suzan Gill. Incidentally, Suzan's originals are going at prices in the multiple hundreds of dollars. Naturally the prints are much less.

A recent addition to Suzan's career has been the inauguration of a weekly television art appreciation series which she hosts. This program is designed to help listeners be more knowledgeable and appreciative of all art--the Old Masters, Contemporary Art, European Artists, American Artists, Limited Edition Prints, etc. There will be opportunity on her TV show to interview nationally known

artists from time to time. It sounds like an interesting and richly rewarding life.
