



TRIBUTES MONDAY FOR WALTER HARP, 82, AREA PIONEER

The ranks of Abernathy area pioneers were diminished further Saturday when Walter D. Harp, 82, died at 5 p. m. in the Holiday Retirement Center in Sweetwater after a lengthy illness.

Funeral rites for Mr. Harp were conducted Monday at 3 p. m. in Abernathy First United Methodist Church. Officiating was his great-nephew, the Rev. David Harp of Mainview. The Rev. H. B. Coggan, Methodist minister of Abernathy, assisted. Burial, under direction of Chambers Funeral Home of Abernathy, was in Resthaven Memorial Park, Lubbock.

Pallbearers were Buz and Bill Albers, Joe and Jackie Barton, Edward Phipps, Herbert Hardin, Lewis Lutrick and E. J. Pope, Jr.

Survivors include his wife; a son, J. W. Harp, of McAllen; a daughter, Mrs. B. L. (Charlie Mae) Griffith, of Abernathy; a sister, Miss Pauline Harp, of Dallas; a step-son, Sam Pate of Brownsville; a step-daughter, Mrs. Bill Whittle, of Austin; four step-grandchildren, and several nephews and nieces.

Mr. Harp was a member of the Presbyterian Church in Sweetwater.

Mr. Harp was born in Atlanta, Texas, in 1891. His parents moved to the present town of Abernathy in 1892.

His father, Dr. E. M. Harp, homesteaded some land five miles north of the present town of Abernathy. His father was a pioneer physician in this area.

Walter D. Harp was married to Miss Ruth Casey, his first wife, June 2, 1917. She died in 1956.

Mr. Harp, a retired farmer, resided in Abernathy until 1965, when he moved to Sweetwater.

Elementary Registration Is Scheduled

Students enrolling in Abernathy Elementary school will register Tuesday morning, August 20, 1974 between 9:00 and 12:00, announced Gid B. Adkisson, Jr., Principal. Students who will be in kindergarten, first, second or third grades will register in the elementary building. Fourth and fifth grade students will register in the building that was formerly the junior high school building.

Emphasis at the elementary level will be placed on four "R's". These are the traditional reading, 'riting', and 'rithmetic, with the fourth "R" being a composite of respect and responsibility. Effort will be made to offer individual, or small group, instruction whenever it is needed and students in grades 1 thru 5 will have a choice of bilingual or non-bilingual education.

Students enrolling in kindergarten, pre-school programs, or entering school for the first time at the first grade level must have a birth certificate and evidence of the following immunizations:

DPT series - must have had booster shots after age 4.

Polio series - must have had booster after age 4. Measles and Rubella or Measles-Rubella.

Classes will begin at 9:00 a. m., Wednesday, August 21st. During the first two weeks of school, kindergarten students will be dismissed at 1:00 p. m. After two weeks they will be dismissed at 3:00 p. m. which is dismissal times for grades 1 thru 3. Fourth and fifth grade students will be dismissed at 4:00 p. m.

BILINGUAL EDUCATION CONTINUING

Camps Slated For Area Youth At Area Cities

Two horsemanship camps for youth are to be held in the near future, according to David Gibson, Assistant County Extension Agent.

The first camp will be a Tri-County Camp at Tulla. This camp is open to youth or anyone else interested in learning more about horses and horsemanship. The date of this camp is August 8 and 9 at the Tulla Arena. The courses will be taught by Extension assistants working through the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Registration for the camp is at 9:00 a. m., August 8. Subjects to be taught are as follows: Halter, general horsemanship, western pleasure, reining, western horsemanship, barrel racing and pole bending. Recreation for Friday night of swimming and folk dancing has been planned. A registration fee of \$5.00 is required and this includes two meals and pool expense. Equipment needed: bed roll, swimsuit, all horse equipment, your horse and feed. This is not formal, wear your work clothes.

The second camp is the District II 4-H Horsemanship Camp, at Lubbock on August 12-16. Hale County is only allowed to send four 4-H members to this camp. This camp will be done by each member working with their own horse and getting the actual experience. The four members to attend from Hale County are Martha Montgomery, Gary Nabors, Rusty Powell and Kim DuBose. After the camp these 4-H members will be available to teach others what they have learned.

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
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Abernathy Requests Tie-In

 City councilmen at Abernathy are requesting a tie-in with Lubbock's water supply system to purchase water during emergency drought periods.

They join the New Deal Water Supply Corp., which is asking that water from Lubbock be the primary source of supply for New Deal residents.

Both requests will be considered at 11:30 a.m. Thursday by the Lubbock City Council.

New Deal officials have said they need up to 200,000 gallons of water per day from Lubbock to meet their needs since two of their three water wells have gone virtually dry.

Abernathy, on the other hand, is looking to Lubbock for periodic water supply when demand exceeds the capacity of its well system.

"At the present time, an emergency water condition does not exist for our city," Abernathy city officials stated in a letter delivered over the week-end.

"But the rapid rate at which the underground water formation is being depleted is reason for concern," the letter continued.

The cities of Shallowater and Sudan have had tie-ins with Lubbock's pipeline from the Bailey County well field. Lubbock water is well to those communities on an emergency basis.

Should similar tie-ins be approved for New Deal or Abernathy, the connection would be made with Lubbock's water supply from Lake Meredith, north of Amarillo.

In a memo to city council members, Lubbock Mayor Roy Bass said Monday "the council's first responsibility is to provide adequate service within the corporate limits of Lubbock."

However, Bass said, if neighboring communities have an emergency need for water and if Lubbock can meet that need without neglecting its first responsibility "we might consider some sort of permanent arrangement" to satisfy their needs.

In such an arrangement, Bass said, "we ought not to send city funds to pay for a water line or any pumping equipment and any agreement should provide for a price structure that will ensure no loss (to the City of Lubbock)."

Attention To Needs
 In considering the needs of New Deal and Abernathy, Bass said, "we should go ahead now and give attention to Lubbock's long-range water needs and plans to meet these needs."

An engineering study of Lubbock's domestic water needs through the year 2020 was presented to the council in late 1971. That report estimated that development of existing and new water resources during the next 50 years would cost more than \$80 million, at 1970 prices.

PIONEER FAMILY LANDHOLDERS TO BE HONORED

AUSTIN--Farmers and ranchers in Hale County whose families have held the same land since 1874 or before will be honored by the Texas Department of Agriculture's "Family Land Heritage Program," according to Commissioner John C. White.

The program, which will be initiated July 1, will "pay tribute to those families who have proved their respect for and dedication to the land," White said.

The county has some of the oldest establishments in the state, with a long history of dedicated service to the agricultural community and he hopes that every qualified family will take this opportunity to be recognized by the people they have served, White said.

Applications and rules for the program may be obtained by writing Commissioner White, P. O. Box 12847, Austin 78711.

Any family who is certified by Judge Henry Heck will qualify for the honor. An applicant need only show a continuous family relationship between the founder of the homestead and the present owner.

The land must have been in use for agriculture by the family since 1874 or before, must be at least 10 acres and producing \$50 or more from agricultural products.

Those who do qualify by August 31 will be recognized in a special ceremony at the State Fair this year and short history of their family and land will be published in a land heritage directory. In addition, local recognition will be provided to the families for their long dedication to agriculture.

HALE IN TOP 10 COTTON PRODUCERS

AUSTIN--Hale County ranked in the top ten upland cotton producing counties last year according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Cotton farmers produced a total of 162,500 bales and averaged 522 pounds per harvested acre.

Total cotton acreage for Hale County was 149,500 harvested acres.

Texas led the nation in production of upland cotton with a yield of 4,673,000 bales.

Dawson County ranked first in Texas upland cotton production with 315,300 bales.

The High and Low Plains are the largest cotton producing areas in Texas, and last year's combined production was over 2.7 million bales.

"Ideal growing and harvesting conditions produced one of the best quality crops last year on the Texas Plains," White said.

Farmers Should Certify Crops Before Aug. 15

To avoid any loss of allotted cotton acreage, Hale County farmers must certify their acreage with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Plainview.

Deadline, officials reminded this week, is Aug. 15 -- a new deadline set by the ASCS "because of the slow response by farmers to the earlier cut-off date of July 15."

If farmers do not certify as required, they stand to lose: 20 per cent of allotted acreage; one third of a farm's established yield; all eligibility for disaster payments and price deficiency payments.

The 1974 program authorizes disaster payments of 12.7 cents per pound -- times a farm's established yield, if planting is prevented by drought or if crops are lost to hail or other adverse weather conditions.

Although farmers may not receive any payments or benefits for the 1974 crop, ASCS officials say it is important for them to preserve allotments and yield history for the remaining three years of the program.
