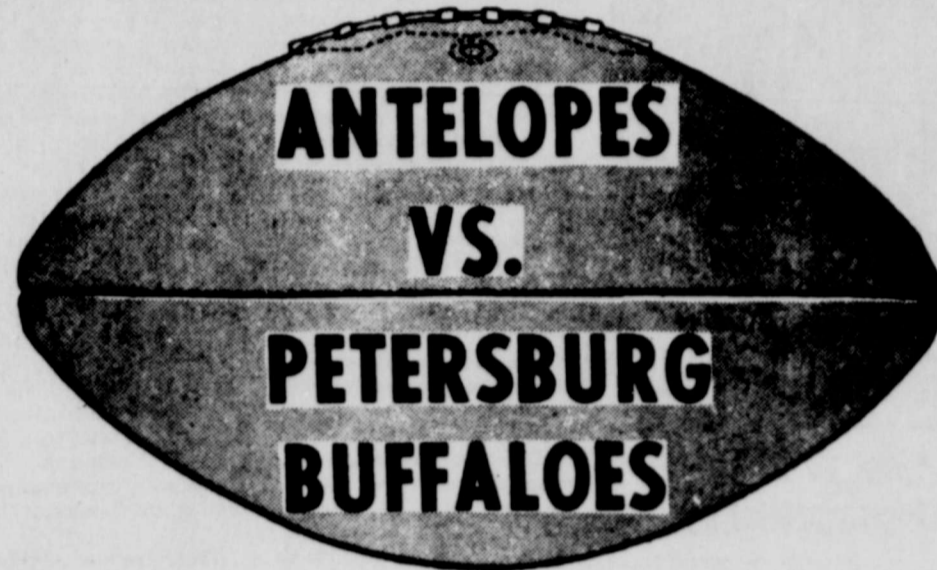

Petersburg Is Foe For Grid Season Opener

The Antelopes will be trying to improve on last year's 3-7 record; and defense could be the answer. Eight lettermen and six starters will be returning with hopes of producing a winning team.

Defense should be the main factor in the Antelope game plan. David Thomas and Robert Esquivel, a transfer from Idalou, will shoulder most of the responsibility. Both players were All-South Plains tackle and nose guard during the '73 season.

The offensive side will lack experience, but definitely not talent. Wayne Riley will handle the quarterback spot; along with runningbacks Ken Davenport, Armando Ruiz, Kent Harrison, Mickey Davis and Danny Lopez, it shouldn't take long for them to gain that needed experience. Splitend should be one of the bright spots. Alonzo Ramos, who caught a touchdown pass in all but one contest last year, can be expected to keep the opponents hopping. Ken Hendrix, Usbaldo Trevino and Robert Scott round out a fine group of catchers.

The interior line (both on the defensive and offensive side) will have Israel Garza, Thomas and Doug Rogers at tackle and Ruben Cuevas at center; Mark Burrell, Bill Teakell and Victor Garza will hold down the guard spots; Esquivel and Tommy Campbell will control the end position; Davenport, Garza, John Hill and David Rodriguez will battle for linebacker positions. The secondary should be made up of Steve Oswalt (if he recovers from knee surgery), Joe Gonzales, Riley, Ramos and Lopez.

Definitely enjoying his job a great deal, Coach Zierlein feels quite optimistic about the 1974 season and is looking forward to improving the football season in Abernathy.

Barring injury and with a little luck, this could be the year of the Antelope. A lot will depend on the enthu-

iasm and attitudes of the players, coaches, school officials and--most important--the football fan. So get ready, and let's make 1974 the year of the Antelope!
