AHS-TAHOKA TO MEET HERE FRIDAY NIGHT

by Sammy Hunley The Petersburg Buffaloes roamed into town from the east Friday night and trampled the Abernathy Antelopes 20-18.

The contest was the first game on the 1974 schedule for both teams. Hoping to avenge last year's one-point loss, the Antelopes tried in vain to pull the game out of the fire; but time simply ran

The Buffaloes won the toss and elected to receive the ball. This gave the Antelope defense a chance to get the young 1974 season off on the right foot. Things looked bright for the first series of downs; but the Buffs found a couple of holes in the line. With 5:40 left in the first quarter the score read 7-0 in favor of Petersburg.

The Antelopes opened their offense attack from the 35 yard line and moved the ball for a couple of quick first down plays. Things became bogged down; and the 'Lopes were forced to punt. The defense dug in; and,

with the help of an illegal procedure penalty that moved the ball back to the 18 yard line, Petersburg was forced to punt.

The Antelopes set up the offensive attack on the 32 yard line as the first quarter ended with Petersburg still leading 7-0. After a couple of plays, the offense once again faced a fourth down situation. The 'Lopes elected to go for it. Wayne Riley calmly hit Davis for a first down pass to the six yard line. Three plays later and still no results, the Antelopes turned over the ball to Petersburg just inside the three yard line.

Deep in Antelope territory, move the ball and had to punt with 5:52 left in the second quarter. The Antelopes took advantage of a short punt and with three straight first down plays, moved the ball inside the ten yard line. Wayne Riley hit Alonzo Ramos in the end zone and the Antelopes were on the scoreboard. Extra point failed. With 3:08 left in the first half, the score read Abernathy 6, Petersburg 7. The defense managed to hold the Buffaloes on downs and forced them to punt. Mickey Davis took the punt and put the Antelopes in good field position with two minutes remaining in the first half.
