

# Rites Held For John L. McCarty

AMARILLO--Funeral services for John L. McCarty, 73, a former newspaperman, noted author and owner of an Amarillo art gallery, were held at 10 a.m. Sept. 18 in First Presbyterian Church. Burial was in Llano Cemetery by Blackburn-Shaw Funeral

Mr. McCarty, who died early Sept. 16 in an Amarillo hospital where he had undergone open chest surgery Aug. 28, was reared in Abernathy where he starred in track and field events, as well as debate and spelling. He started his newspaper career with the old Abernathy Breeze and broke horses for extra cash while in high school.

Joining the old Amarillo Tribune staff in 1923, Mr. McCarty started work the following year for the Amarillo Globe. He was editor and publisher of the Dalhart Texan from 1929 to 1936 when he returned to the Globe-News as editor and associate pub-

lisher until 1948. He was the author of a number of books and a prolific artist. He is known for his development of artists, including Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia. Mr. McCarty also operated an insurance and public relations firm and was active in civic activities and organizations.

Summer Happenings of the "Singing Disciples"






