## Rites Held For John L. McCarty

AMARILLO--Funeral services for John L. McCarty, 73, a former newspaperman, noted author and owner of an Amarillo art gallery, were held at 10 a. m. Sept. 18 in First Presbyterian Church. Burial was in Llano Cemetery by Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Directors.

Mr. McCarty, who died early Sept. 16 in an Amarillo hospital where he had undergone open chest surgery Aug. 28, was reared in Abernathy where he starred in track and field events, as well as debate and spelling. He started his newspaper career with the old Abernathy Breeze and broke horses for extra cash while in high school.

Joining the old Amarillo Tribune staff in 1923, Mr. McCarty started work the following year for the Amarillo Globe. He was editor and publisher of the Dalhart Texan from 1929 to 1936 when he returned to the Globe-News as editor and associate publisher until 1948.

He was the author of a number of books and a prolific artist. He is known for his development of artists, including Kenneth Wyatt of Tulsa. Mr. McCarty also operated an insurance and public relations firm and was active in civic activities and organizations.

Her honors and activities include: Head twirler for the Antelope Band, Future Homemakers of America, Future Teachers of America, 4-H Club and Drama Club.

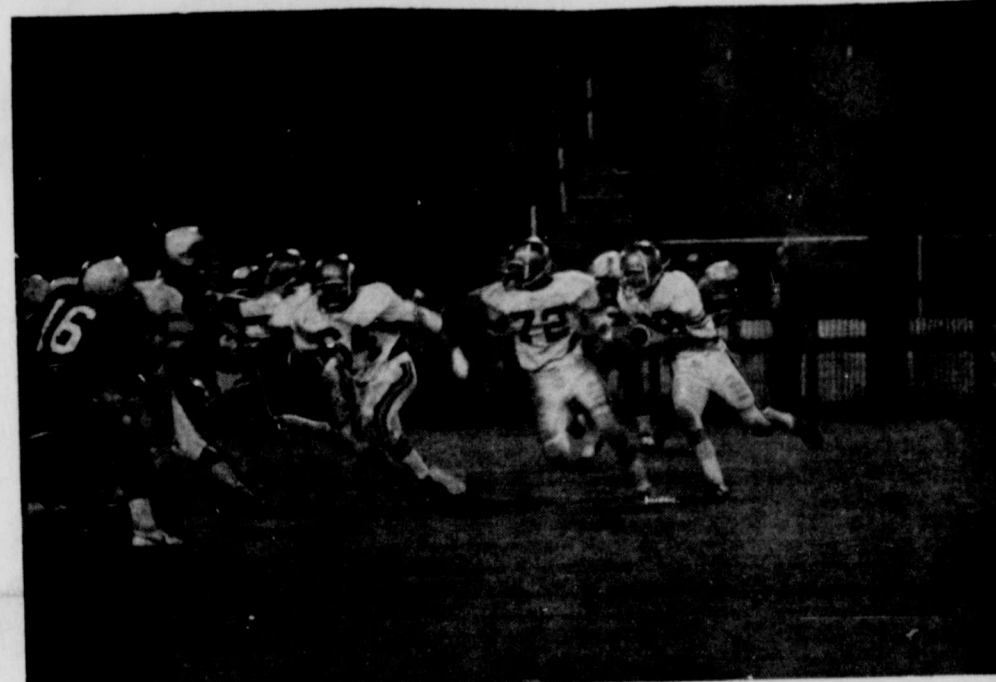

The Antelopes came alive in the second quarter, and after blocking a Hale Center punt found themselves in good field position. Ken Davenport jumped on the chance and put the Antelopes on the scoreboard with 7:00 minutes left in the first half. The score read Owls 27, Lopes 6.

## SECOND HALF

The Antelopes playing catch up football got on the scoreboard early in the third quarter with a 22 yard romp by Ken Davenport. Extra point failed and the score was Hale Center 27, Aber-

**Pioneer Land Surveyor Is Recognized**

Historical Quarterly Features Pioneer Hale County Surveyor

The August issue of Hale County History, quarterly of the Hale County Historical Society, features articles on W. J. "Jeff" Williams, Hale County Surveyor. One was written by his son, the late Ben Williams.

Williams, who was born in 1881, served Hale County as surveyor from 1902-1906 and 1920-1973. In addition, he also served as Potter County surveyor at one time and also as owner of the Amarillo Daily News.

His accomplishments were legion. He relocated Hale County's famous "bottle corner." He was involved in part of the XIT re-survey which regained over 59,000 acres of land for the state. In the 1920's he surveyed the subdivisions of Sod House and Yellow House ranges and plotted the townsite of Amherst. Finally, he was largely responsible for resolving the controversy over ownership of land in Swisher County.

As a surveyor, he ranked among the best. He died knowing that he had labored hard, had kept good records and had left an indelible mark on the area in which he lived.

Funds for the Great Plains Conservation Program are now available to assist producers apply their needed soil and water conservation practices.

Practices that are eligible for cost-share include parallel terraces, land leveling, waterway shaping and establish to grass, diversion construction, pasture planting, tailwater recovery systems, and recreational area development. Cost-share assistance range from 50% to 80% of the cost of installation.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a long-range conservation program whereby a producer can plan and apply the needed conservation practices over a long period of time. This enables a producer to do some long range planning and be assured funds and technical assistance is available to carry out his programs. Contact your local Soil Conservation Service office for further details.

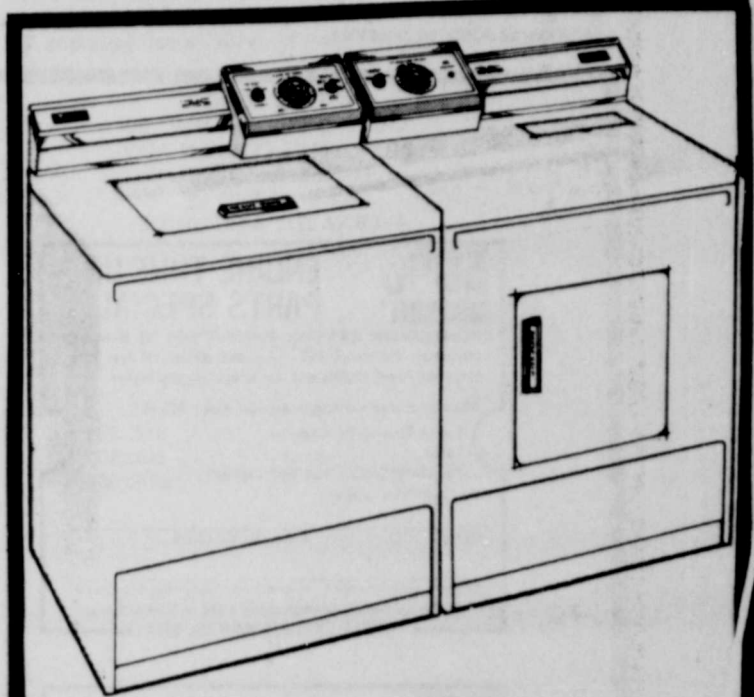
