Lose To Idalou

The Floydada 'Winds' will whirl into Abernathy Friday night to play the AHS Antelopes in a District 4-AA conference football tilt. Game time will be 7:30.

High hopes for a second win of the season quickly faded out of reach Friday night at the hands of the Idalou Wildcats 19-12.
The Antelopes mustering 266 yards rushing to 150 yards for the Wildcats, saw a number of mental mistakes provide Idalou with the necessary momentum needed to control the game.
Idalou looking for its first win in the last 17 starts got on the scoreboard early in the 1st quarter. Extra point failed and the score read 6-0 in favor of the Wildcats.
The Antelopes continued to pressure Idalou on defense by way of two pass interceptions, but failed to capitalize on the opportunities until late in the second quarter. Mickey Davis took a punt and scampered 55 yards to pay dirt, a flag up field brought the play back (clipping penalty) nullifying the touchdown. The 1st half ended Idalou leading 6-0.

SECOND HALF
Idalou got on the scoreboard early in the second half by way of an interception and with 6:25 showing on the clock the score was 12-0.
The Antelopes fighting back used a 30 yard run by Mickey Davis to set themselves up on the 2 yard line. Wayne Riley on the next play from scrimmage found himself in the end zone, and the Antelopes were back in the ball game 12-6.
The fourth quarter saw the Antelope defense fighting to starve off another Idalou threat. The Antelopes managed to stop the Wildcats on downs from inside the five yard line, but gave way to a number of penalties that enabled Idalou to score their last touchdown of the night. Idalou 19, Abernathy 6.
The Antelopes still trying to pull out the victory scored their second touchdown with a 33 yard run by Mickey Davis. Extra point failed and the score was 19-12 with 1:39 left in the contest.
Time ran out on the Antelopes as they desperately attempted to score in the closing minutes of the game. Final score Idalou 19, Abernathy 12.

REGAN EARNS SCHOLARSHIP AT A & M U.

Use of radiation detection equipment by emergency personnel will be the subject of a three-day Radiological Monitor School beginning November 5, 1974 in Abernathy under sponsorship of the State Health Department's Division of Emergency Medical Services and the City of Abernathy Civil Defense Office.
The November 5-7, 1974 school will be held at the Fire Hall in Abernathy beginning each evening at 7:00 p. m. Further information may be obtained from Mr. Glen Metcalf, Director of the Abernathy Civil Defense.
The instructor from the Emergency Medical Services Division of the State Health Department in Austin will be Mr. Garland Latham and Mr. Jack Beck.
Use of radioisotopes has increased greatly in Texas, and the risks of an accident involving transportation or use of the substance also has increased, strengthening the need for emergency personnel trained in using monitoring equipment.

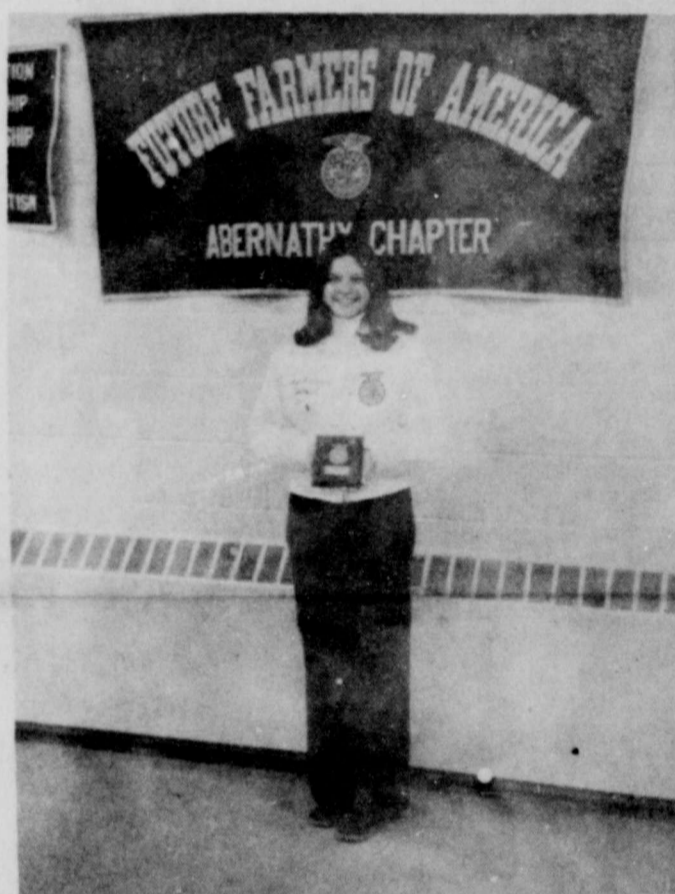

Subject areas covered include: Animal Science (animal reproduction, genetics, breeding, wildlife, wildlife management, economic and ecological factors affecting wildlife, and field trips to wholesale and retail merchandising facilities for slaughter of livestock); Plant Science (plant breeding, harvesting and identification of field crops, fruits and vegetables); Agricultural Mechanics (farm electricity, small gas engine overhaul, tune-up and repair; tractor maintenance - operation, daily care, service checks, cooling, fuel, ignition and electrical systems and lubrication; farm level - use of level, running contour lines, terraces and ditches; concrete - mixing, pouring and finishing; welding - advanced arc, acetylene and aluminum.); Agricultural Management (records, economics, finance and planning.); Leadership (stock shows, contests, public speaking and skills contests.)

HEART ATTACK IS NEVER SUDDEN

A heart attack is often described as "sudden"; yet there are no sudden heart attacks—only those that seem to happen suddenly.

A stroke is often described as "sudden; yet accidental". It's not an accident in human terms. Underlying causes build over the years.

Both have their roots in basic risk factors: high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol and excessive cigarette smoking. Others include heredity, lack of exercise, a diet high in saturated fats and cholesterol and obesity.

"Some risk factors can be avoided by an alternation of lifestyle," says Mrs. Jay Laird, President of the Hale County Division of the American Heart Association. "Others can be minimized by an awareness of them. But equally important, we should know and heed the early warning signs that often precede a heart attack or stroke." The Heart Association spokesman lists the warning signs which are published in material supplied by the American Heart Association. They are:

Heart Attack:
*Prolonged, oppressive pain or unusual discomfort in the center of chest behind the breast bone.

*Pain may radiate to the shoulders, arms, neck or jaw.

*Pain or discomfort is often accompanied by sweating.

*Nausea, vomiting and shortness of breath may also occur.

*Sometimes these symptoms subside and then return.

Stroke:
*Sudden temporary weakness or numbness of the face, arms or legs.

*Temporary difficulty or loss of speech or trouble understanding speech.

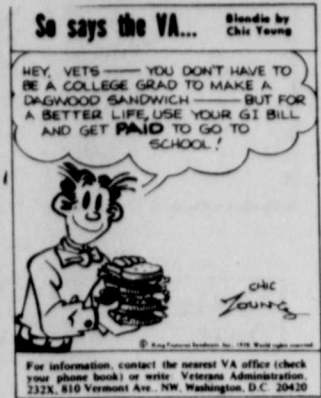
*Temporary dimness or loss of vision, particularly in one eye.

Weed Seeds Germinate After 50 Years

Weeds are the original di-harders in civilization. Scientists who ran germination tests on weed seeds buried for up to 50 years came up with startling proof of this. They reported that 51 of 107 weed species tested still had viable seed after 20 years. Weed seed with the

greatest longevity were dock and pigweed. Scientists said 52% of dock seed buried for 50 years germinated, while 66% of pigweed seed sprouted after 40 years. Tests also showed that 74% of morning glory seeds germinated after 5 1/2 years, and 29% of Johnson grass seed after 3 1/2 years. The reason these seeds remain in the soil for such a long period without sprouting is apparently related to environmental conditions. According to the scientists, some seeds need just the right combination of moisture, temperature, and nutrients before they will germinate. This is why, they add, that farmers may suddenly be confronted with a weed problem they thought they had cured years earlier.

Current figures show there are 209,000 farms in Texas, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

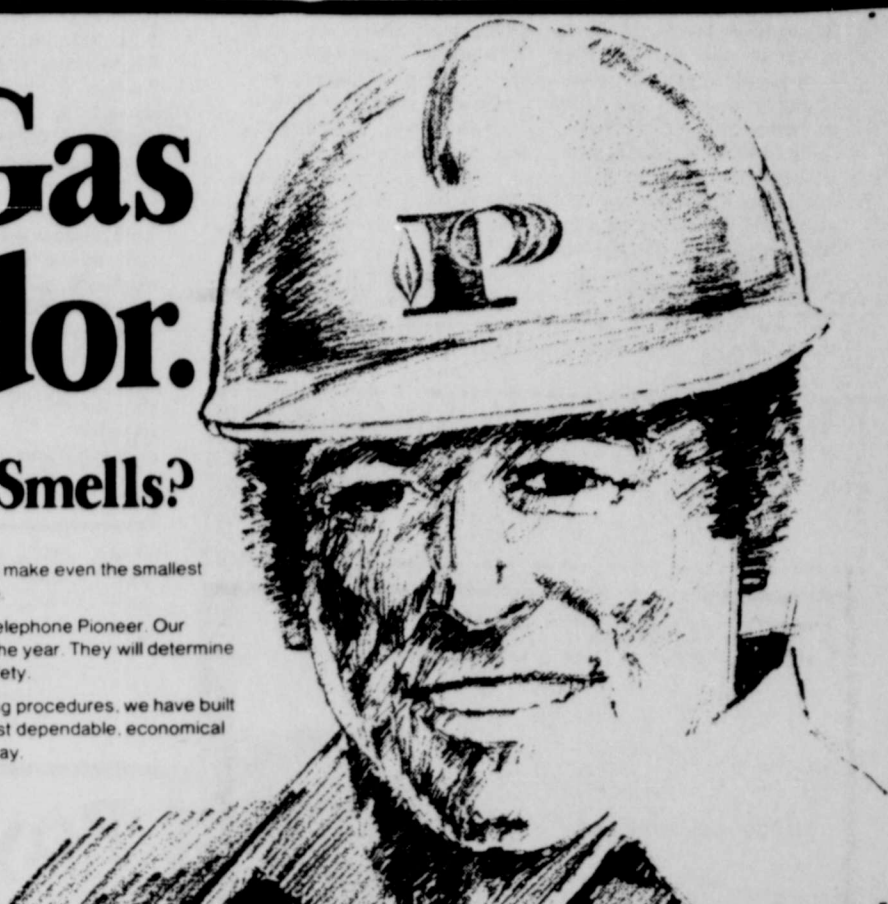

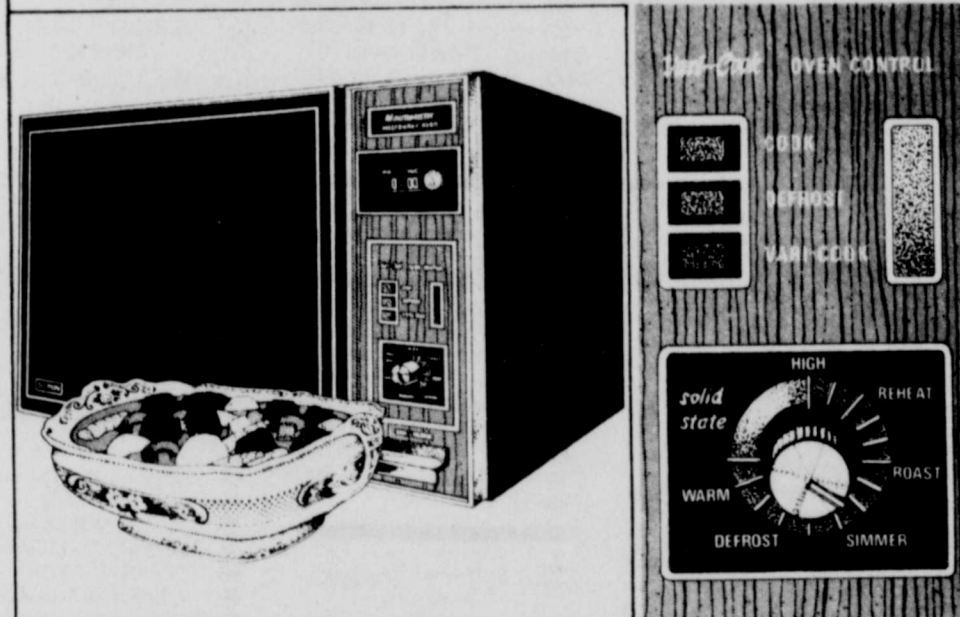

RULES GIVEN FOR HANDLING DOG COMPLAINTS

NOTICE: In regard to the dog situation in Abernathy

Effective as of the date of publication of this article. The following suggestions are made in reference to the handling of dog complaints.

Step #1. Notify the chief of police of your complaint. If you know the name of the owner of the dog or dogs about which you are complaining, advise the chief to whom the dog belongs.

Step #2. After such notification the chief of police will personally contact the owner of such dog or dogs and advise him to keep the dog enclosed or on leash.

Step #3. After such notification has been made to the owner or person having

custody of such dog or dogs, and such owner or person having custody fails or refuses to comply, the chief of police will subpoena such person into court to show cause why he will not comply. Failure to comply will result in a fine being levied against the person having custody of such dog or dogs.

It should be noted that such person who is complaining of the action or actions of dogs must give their name to the chief when making complaints since the owner, according to the laws of this land, are entitled to be confronted by witnesses against them. This procedure does not mean that dangerous or vicious dogs will not be handled immediately.

There is a reason for this procedure. That reason is simply that dogs are difficult to catch. A police officer who is supposed to be watching traffic, preventing burglaries, investigating crimes, handling family disturb-

- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 10-oz. can condensed onion soup
- 1/2 c. water
- 1/2 c. chopped canned tomatoes
- 2 tsp. soy sauce
- 1 large green pepper in strips
- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
- 2 Tbsp. water

Hardin's Notice To Veterans:

Many veterans become ill and use their life savings to pay for needed hospital care before they inquire as to their entitlement to be admitted to a Veterans Administration hospital. This announcement was made today by Herbert Hardin, Veterans Service Officer for Barton-Hood Post No. 500.

Medical and hospital care are very expensive today, and most people who are regularly employed are covered by some type of health and hospitalization insurance. Many veterans fail to realize that they may be eligible for care in Veterans Administration hospitals even though they are covered by insurance.

Eligible for admission to any Veterans Administration hospital is a veteran who was discharged or released under other than dishonorable conditions from either a peacetime or a wartime period of service in the Armed Forces of the United States. Medical emergencies always have first priority for admission, followed by veterans who require hospitalization because of a disability which was incurred during service.

Some veterans must show evidence of inability to pay for the needed care before they can be admitted. This is not necessary if the veteran is seeking treatment for a service-incurred disability, if he is receiving VA disability compensation or pension, if he was released from service because of a service-connected condition, or if he is 65 years of age or older.

A private doctor may expedite admission by contacting the VA hospital by telephone. Ambulance travel will be authorized if it is required and is justified by the doctor. Application for admission may be made by mail if accompanied by a medical statement from a private physician, or the veteran may present himself at the hospital for examination to determine need for care.
